

## Saturday Funeral Held Here For Howard Cox

Funeral service was held at 2 p.m. Saturday at the Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel for J. H. (Howard) Cox, retired Callahan County Deputy Sheriff, who died unexpectedly at his home at 5:15 p.m. Thursday.

Mr. Cox had been in ill health for some time, but his death was not expected by family and friends.

Dave Collier, minister of the Cross Plains Church of Christ, officiated the final rites. Burial was in Pendergrass Cemetery at Sidney under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home of Cross Plains.

Born June 26, 1912, in Sidney, he married Cremona Ritchie Dec. 20, 1930, in Marietta, Okla. He was a World War II veteran and a retired Callahan County Deputy Sheriff. He held that position, stationed at Cross Plains, for 12 years. He also served many years as a Callahan County School Trustee. He was a member of the Cross Plains Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Carole Drennan of Abilene; a granddaughter, Jane Underwood of Abilene; and two sisters, Ada Pederson of Kenedy and Lola Feril of Sidney.

Pallbearers were H. D. Welch, Callahan County Judge Mack Kniffen, James Alexander, Cowan Hutton, Tommie Harris and Ivan Clark.

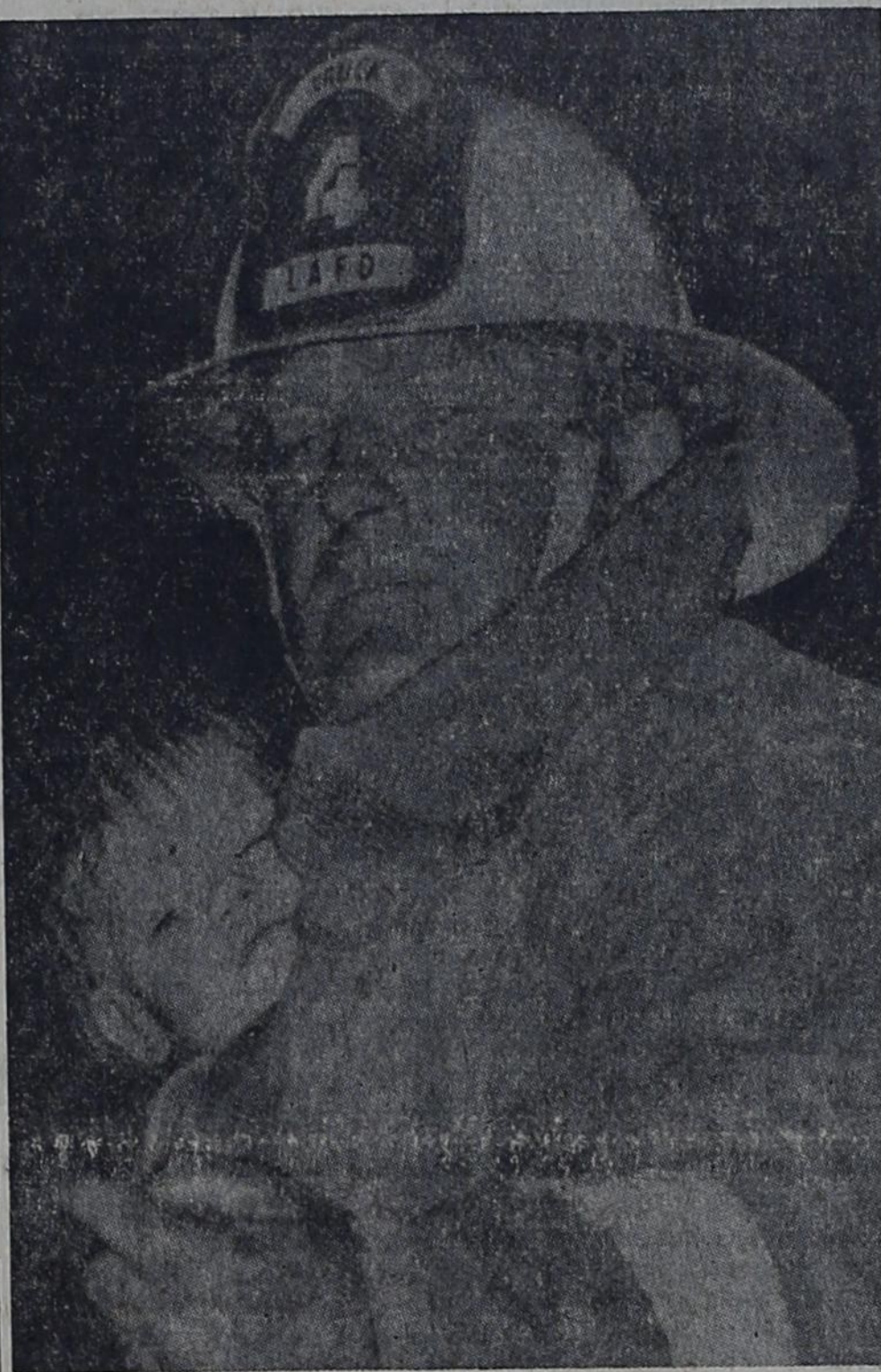

## L.A. Fireman Known Here Helps In 5th Floor Rescue

Los Angeles, Calif., newspapers were recently filled with fire news about the brush fires around the city and a hotel fire from which some daring rescues were made.

One Los Angeles newspaper, not identified to the Review, pictured Jim Bryan, shown above, with a year-old baby tucked into his firefighter's coat while leading the infant's mother and grandmother to safety, along a two-foot wide ledge on the fifth floor of a burning 200-room residential hotel in Los Angeles.

Bryan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Day, (she is the former Lena Teague), and is the grandson of the late Ida Wooten of Cross Plains.

A portion of the story, which was attributed to the Associated Press in the clipping received here, follows.

"A year-old baby was safe today after being tucked into a firefighter's coat while he helped her mother and grandmother walk some 70 feet along a 2-foot-wide ledge on the fifth floor of a burning 200-room residential hotel in Los Angeles.

## Baptists To Hear Native Of Russia

Mrs. Walter (Nena) Magness of Abilene, a native of Russia, will speak at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains Sunday morning during the Sunday School hour and the regular worship service.

Burlie W. Taylor, pastor of the church, said that all persons are invited to the service, as they are to every one held at the church. Mrs. Magness is reported to be "a very capable speaker" as she promotes freedom in America and exposes the dangers and threats leading to Communism.

Born in Russia to a Russian mother and German father, as a child Mrs. Magness had to flee Russia because of Communist persecution, going to Poland and later to East Germany.

Rev. Taylor said that Mrs. Magness is now an American citizen and proud to be an American. She has lived in Abilene past several years and is the wife of a retired military officer who is now a certified public accountant.

"Jimmy R. Bryan, an 18-year veteran of the Los Angeles Fire Department, reached through the hotel room window to scoop Elizabeth Ann Foster from the arms of her mother, Helen Foster, after a fire broke out at about 11 p.m. in the hotel's second floor, according to witnesses.

"With the baby secure in the front of his jacket, Bryan then guided Ms. Foster and the baby's grandmother, Violet Brown, along the narrow ledge that led to the fourth floor roof, fire department spokesman Ted Aquaro said.

Bryan was the last to leave the roof, waiting until many of the hotel's 400 residents were evacuated by a fire escape to the second floor and then down ladders to the ground, witnesses said.

"Aquaro said the greater alarm blaze was fought by 18 companies of firefighters who were "bone-tired" from their day-long battle against a score of brushfires fanned by Southern California's record-breaking heat and high winds."
