Cross Plains Buffaloes baseball team captured the District 10-A baseball championship with a 10-4 win over Eola last Thursday in a game played at Wall.

Bisons had earlier beaten Eola 4-1 in a contest played in Cross Plains.

The Buffs didn't waste any time gaining the upper hand by scoring five runs in the first inning. Eugene Ford, John Schlittler and Randy Huffman singled with Ford scoring or Huffman's hit. Wes Hilburn then flied deep to center, scoring Schlittler for the second run. Tommy Conlee was hit with a pitch, and Dennis Koenig then singled, scoring Huffman. Bobby Phillips hit a hot shot that Eola first baseman misplayed for an error, letting Conlee and Koenig both score. The Herd scored two more runs in the fourth, one in the fifth and two in the sixth to wrap up the contest.

Meanwhile, Huffman was allowing only four hits. He lost his control momentarily in the sixth when he walked four batters, coupled with one of their hits, they scored three runs. But the Bisons had already sealed the verdict with a 10-1 lead.

Ford, Schlittler and Huffman had two hits each and Hilburn and Koenig had one each. No definite date had been set Tuesday morning, but Coach Mickie Huffman said the bidistrict playoff game will probably be held Monday, May 25. Cross Plains will test Morgan,

Rabies has been prevalent in many areas of Texas during the past several months, and state laws dictate that personal pets must now be vaccinated for rabies.

Crop Disaster Provisions Explained By ASCS Office

Editor's Note: Following is an article received by the Review Tuesday morning from the Callahan County ASCS Office. It explains 1981 crop program provisions.

"The disaster provisions are in effect through the 1981 Crop Year for program crops (wheat, barley, grain sorghum, corn, cotton). It is our wish not to receive any disaster claims this year, but we will probably receive some due to adverse weather conditions.

"Besides the weather, severe losses due to insect infestation are also recognized, provided acceptable control measures are carried out. For many years cultural practices were the main methods to prevent or reduce infestations of forage crop pests, and are still helpful as a first step in prevention. Measures such as destruction of crop residues and volunteer plants, variation in time of planting or harvesting and crop rotation are a few of these practices. In recent years, more efficient insecticides and application equipment than formerly were available have been developed. When applying for disaster credit,

producers should be ready to site measures taken to prevent the insect infestation, or the reasons why the loss was beyond control. In other words, unless preventive measures are made when the loss is attributed to insects, no disaster credits will be given. It is believed that there are a number of measures that can be adapted to meet each individual's operation.

"Due to our mild winter, a host of insects have emerged this spring. Greenbugs have already made their mark on wheat, and most recently, reports that armyworms have been spotted in Coleman County, southern Taylor county, and isolated portions of Callahan County. The newly hatched larva begin feeding immediately on foliage and can do a considerable amount of damage in a very short time, according to the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. Generally, the greater the acreage, the more concentrated the insect damage will be.

"If producers have questions concerning any of the above disaster provisions, they are encouraged to contact the ASCS Office, second floor of the courthouse in Baird."

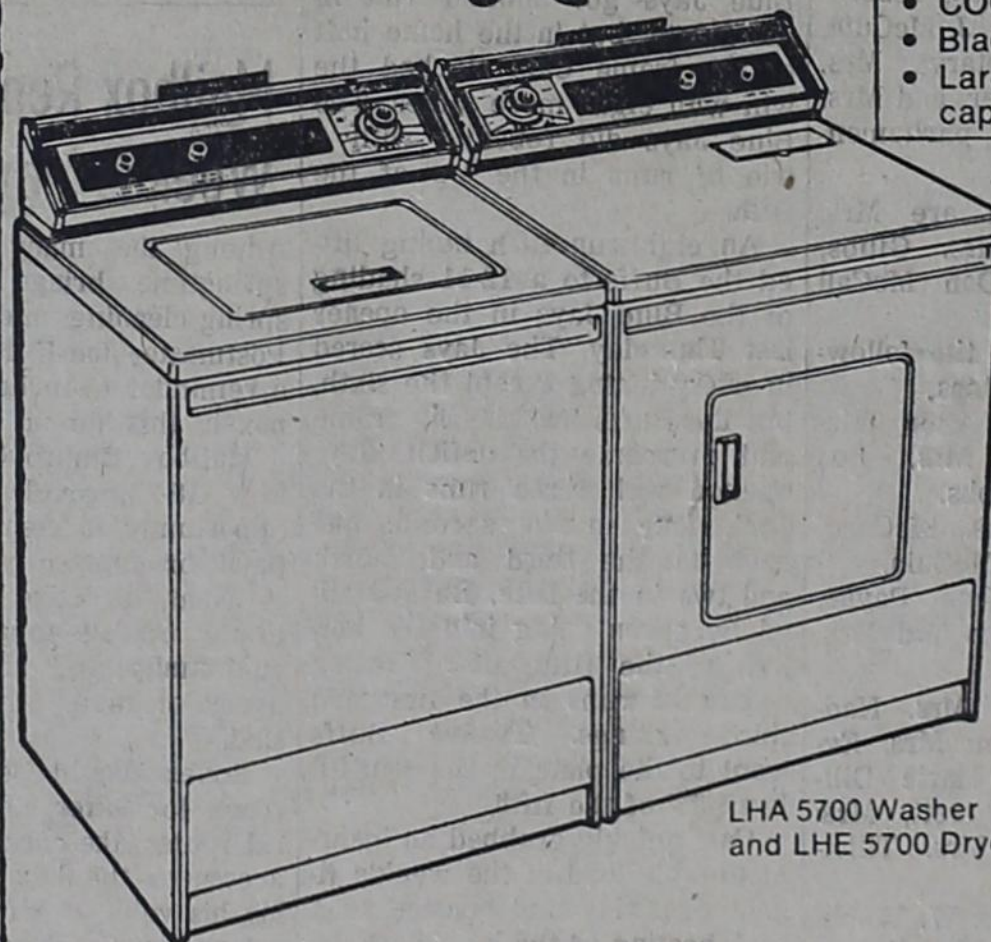

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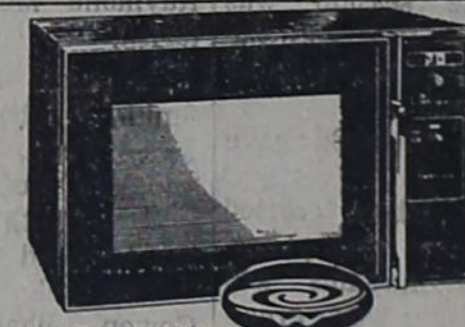

County Small Grain Tour Slated Friday

The Extension Crops and Forage Committee is sponsoring a small grain tour to be held on Friday, May 15, at 1:30 p.m. Starting place will be on Jack Farmer's place, one mile west of Eula.

Dr. Willis Gass, Area Agronomist from San Angelo, will present information relative to the various wheat varieties that we have in our demonstration, says Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent of Baird. In one of these test plots we have some of the newer varieties that have been released over the past two to three years and data will be available on last year's demonstration results, the agent noted.

"Because of increasing concern over army worms and leaf-worms in the area, I have invited Dr. Tom Fuchs, who is our area entomologist from San Angelo, to be with us on the tour to give information concerning these insects and their control," Gerngross stated. He will be discussing the greenbug infestation in sorghums and grazer fields. The meeting is open and any interested person is invited to attend.

SSI Reviews Slated For Correct Data

The Supplemental Security Income program provides for periodic reviews of eligibility for supplemental security income payments. These periodic reviews, or redeterminations, are conducted to assure that supplemental security income payments are made only to eligible persons and that the past, current and future amounts of any supplemental security income payments are correct.

Often changes occur that can affect a person's eligibility for supplemental security income or the payment amount. These changes include increases and decreases in income, gifts (either in cash or in-kind), changes of address, changes in marital status, changes in household size or composition, changes in resources, etc.

"Although we usually try to complete the redetermination in a face-to-face interview, it is not always required. If you can't come to the office to complete your redetermination, call us. Many times the necessary information may be obtained through telephone interviews or by mailing forms to you for completion," says Glyn Hammons, district office manager of Social Security Administration of Abilene.

"Remember, the redetermination process does not relieve you of your responsibility to report any changes as they occur. The redetermination process is simply a device that helps assure that we get the right check, to the right person, at the right address on time!" Hammons emphasized.

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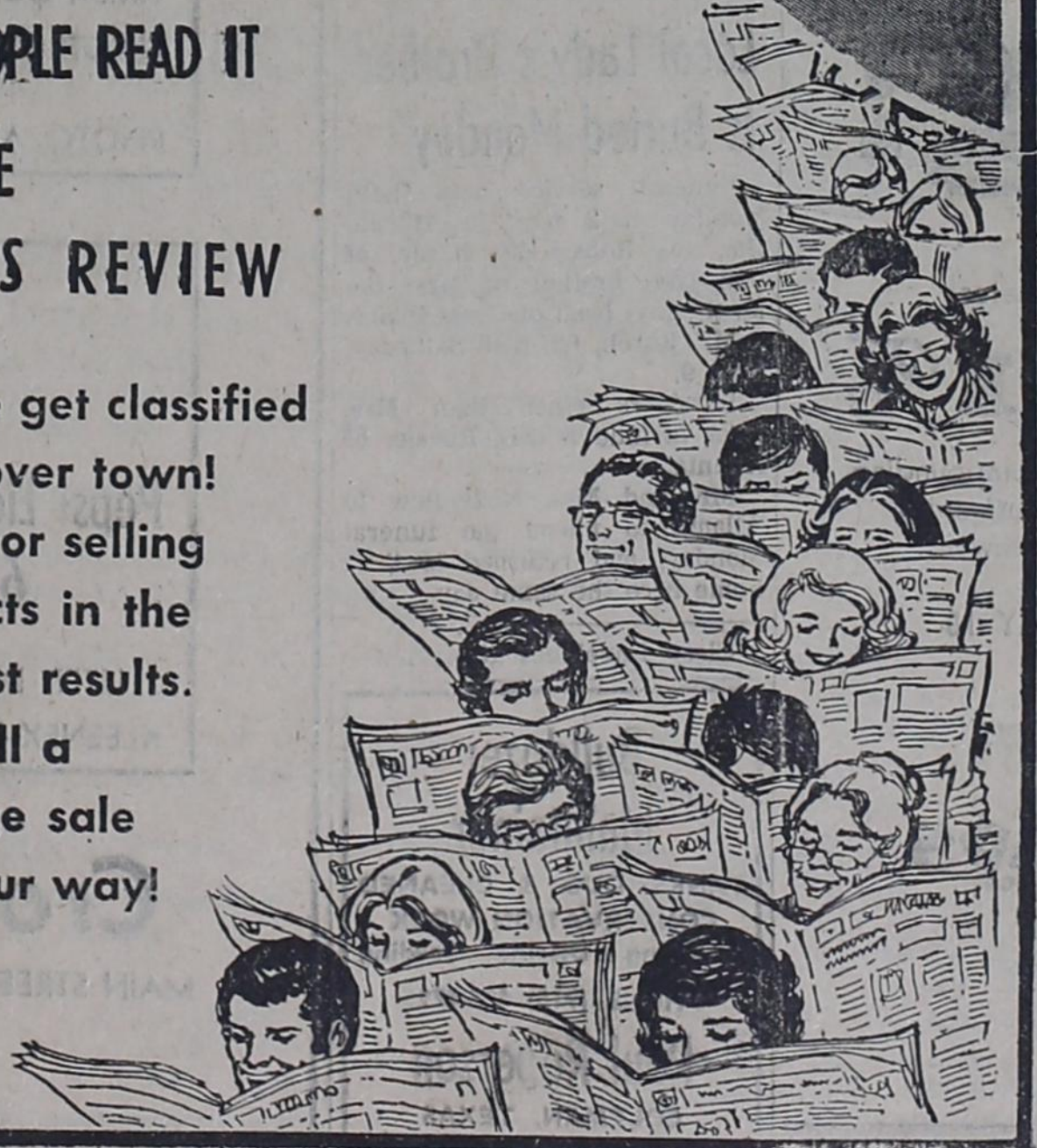

Armyworms Threat To County Fields

Small grain and forage producers in Callahan County should be on the alert for armyworm infestation, according to Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent. Armyworms are being found in wheat fields, corn fields and other forage crops the past few days and they can do extensive damage in a short time, the agent advises.

Armyworms are the immature stage of dull-colored night-active moths. They range in color from pale green to brown black and are often striped with white to yellowish lines from head to tail.

Approved insecticides applied by aerial or ground methods effectively control most species of armyworms.

Suggested insecticides include Methy Parathion, Parathion, Toxephene, Dylox, Lannate and Sevin.

Observe all label recommendations when applying any insecticide, Gerngross cautions.

Producers are invited to attend the small grain field day to be held on Friday, May 15, at 1:30 p.m. located one mile west of the Eula Store to obtain more information on the armyworm.

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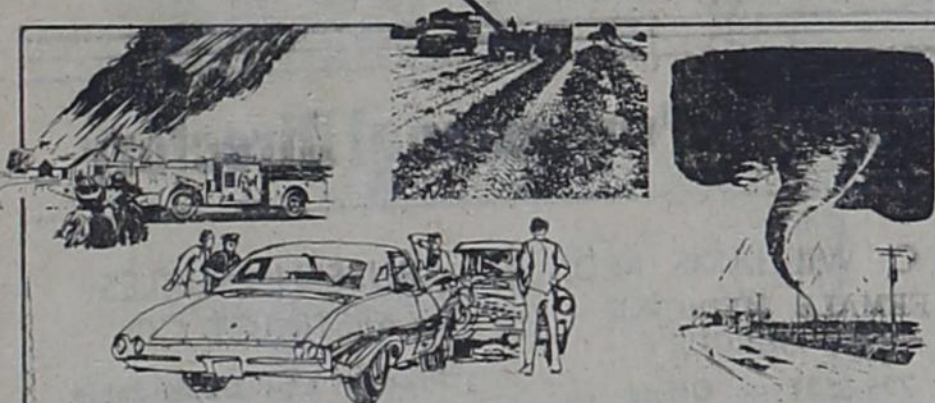

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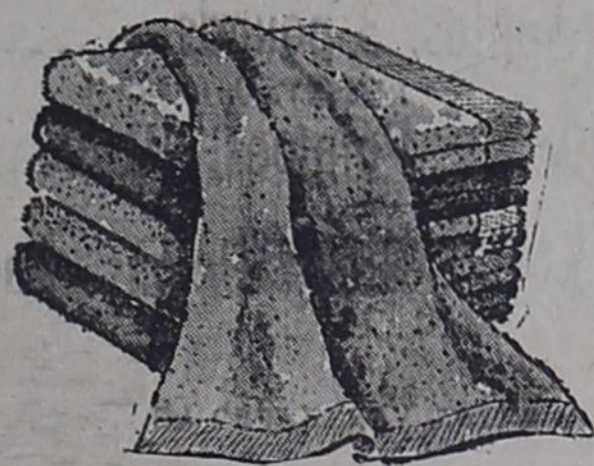
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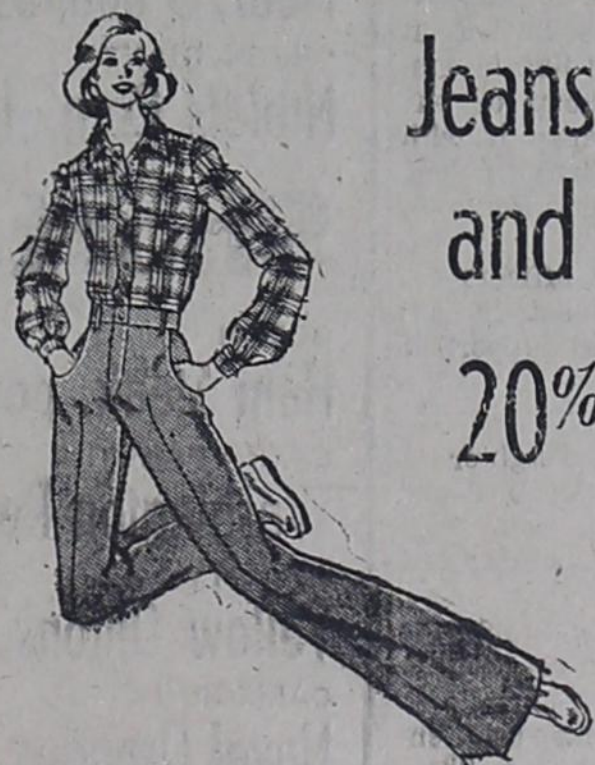
