

## Area United Fund Drive Falters Short Of Goal

Cross Plains Area United Fund campaign has been underway for almost two weeks and is still short of the \$4,000 goal. It's not short much, only \$16.50, but still short.

The campaign began with a bang with about 50 volunteer workers covering the City of Cross Plains and surrounding areas collecting a total of \$3,936 in the first four days of the drive, with one of those being a Sunday. Since Tuesday of last week only \$47.50 has been turned in to the treasurer, Bettie Cavanaugh, local banker.

It was not immediately clear if all rural areas had reported, but it was believed that most repeat calls had been made within the city. Again it was not certain whether all pledges had been collected or not, but still additional funds are needed to reach the established quota of \$4,000.

Mrs. Raymond DeBusk, campaign chairman, and Dale Bishop, United Fund president, both have invited any local resident who was

missed to phone and the donation will be picked up, or gifts may be left at the Citizens State Bank for deposit to the United Fund account.

Mrs. DeBusk said, "We want everyone who wishes to have a part in the United Fund campaign." Bishop and the campaign chairman both again thanked the workers and the donors for the generous contributions. Both also still expressed belief that the goal will be reached although it has slowed to a crawl. "People of Cross Plains have always responded to see a worthwhile job through, and they will again," said Mrs. DeBusk with confidence.

The \$4,000 budget was broken down as follows: West Texas Rehabilitation Center \$1,300, M. D. Anderson Hospital Tumor Research \$700, American Red Cross \$200, Salvation Army \$200, Texas Mental Health Association \$100, Southwestern Diabetic Foundation \$200, Christmas Cheer \$300, local and transient relief \$600 and unallocated funds \$400.

## Horns Nip Herd 14-13; Eden Due Here Friday

Visiting Cross Plains Buffaloes twice led, but the home-standing Bronte Longhorns prevailed in taking 14-13 win over the Herd in the District 7-A football opener last Friday.

The loss dropped the Bisons season mark to 1-5, while Bronte moved up to a 3-3 record.

Cross Plains tallied two touchdowns in the first half and led 13-7 at halftime, but Bronte countered in the third quarter to post the one-point margin of victory. An attempted field goal by the Herd in the final quarter, when the Bisons were at the Longhorn 8 yard line, failed to prevent the hosts win.

Head Coach Ed Higgins said, "We were beaten on small errors of our own." He added that his Buffaloes played decent offense to a point, but he also emphasized, "The defense was not good." Adding, "It (the defense) did not impress me at all." He further stated that blocking in the line was good at times, and at other times, bad.

Although the defense did not impress the head coach a few players did draw words of praise. Scott Taylor did a good job in the line, and John Fred McWilliams had a good performance at defensive end. Eugene Ford was also credited with a good defensive job, and John Schlittler drew praise both on offense and defense.

Offensively Coach Higgins said he was pleased with the efforts of Tommy Johnston at tailback, and the blocking and running of Tommy Conlee and Dennis Koenig. Wes Hilburn was credited with a top job in the line on offense.

Coach Higgins also noted that it was his decision to go for the field goal with about three minutes left in the game.

According to statistics which accompanied a story in the Abilene Reporter-News, Bronte gained 15 first downs to 9 for Cross Plains. The Longhorns badly out-rushed the Buffaloes, 193 to 69 yards, but the Herd held a big bulge through the air, gaining 136 yards to 9 for the hosts. Total yardage slightly favored the Bisons 205 yards to 202. Cross Plains completed 9 of 22 aerials, while the Horns caught 2 of 6.

Buffaloes did not surrender the ball on a fumble or a pass interception. Bronte, however, gave the pigskin up to Buffaloes once on a fumble and once on an errant pass.

Individual figures show Conlee the top ground gainer with 50 yards on 10 carries. Johnston had 26 yards on seven totes, Richard Clark 23 yards on four carries and Koenig 16 yards on three rushes.

In the passing department Koenig was the top receiver with 71

yards on three catches and Schlittler had the 46 yards on the one touchdown reception. Mike Newman was the top defender with nine tackles and Conlee and Ford had eight each.

Buffaloes scored on first possession on a 46-yard pass and run from Quarterback Clark to Schlittler. Koenig booted the point from placement for a 7-0 lead. The drive covered 78 yards.

Bronte knotted the score in the second period, but the Herd moved back into the lead later in the stanza when Clark hit Koenig with a 14-yard pass. A fumbled ball on the attempted conversion kick left the score at 13-7 at halftime.

Bronte went ahead 14-13 in the third canto, and made the thin margin stand.

Cross Plains made a bid to win the game in the final quarter with a long drive, carrying to the Longhorn 8 with about three minutes left. Key gainers on the march were about a 38-yard romp by Conlee and a 12-yard run by Johnston. On fourth down at the Bronte 8, a field goal attempt from the 15 yard line was blocked. Although the Herd re-gained possession of the ball later, long passes were not effective.

Buffaloes will host the Eden Bulldogs Friday with the kickoff slated for 7:30 p.m. in the District 7-A encounter. Eden is 5-1 on the season and 1-0 in conference play, while Cross Plains has exactly the opposite record, 1-5 on the season and 0-1 in loop action. Eden defeated Santa Anna 26-13 last week.

It was noted that the Bulldogs are very quick and aggressive. According to scouting reports by Coach Dave Kautz, Eden is probably the quickest team the Buffaloes have faced all year. Coach Higgins stated that although Eden is not extremely big, the team is very quick and is an experienced squad.

## DALE GARY GROWS GIANT 9 1/2-POUND SWEET POTATO

There are usually some fine specimens of sweet potatoes grown in the Cross Plains area each year, but this year may be a record.

Although it is difficult to remember the extra large ones which seem to be produced annually, Dale Gary has one on display at the Review office which will be hard to beat.

He brought in a Golden Jewell variety specimen which weighed 9 1/2-pounds, and measured 26 inches in circumference.

Gary has about one acre of the potatoes and were irrigated, although he explained that they could have used more water.

## Weigh Station Due On West 36 Here

Bids are scheduled to be opened by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in this month for a truck weigh station on State Highway 36 in Callahan County.

The project will provide a 28-foot-wide paved area on both sides of the highway. Adequate transition lanes will be provided for safe and orderly movement of traffic off and onto the existing highway.

The location is approximately 3.0 miles west of Cross Plains. Abilene District Engineer Roger Welsh said Joe Higgins of Abilene will be the department's engineer in charge of supervising the work.

# Heavy Rains Fall Locally; Atwell Gets 11.40 Inches

Heavy rains have fallen throughout the Cross Plains area and Central Texas during the past week, and widespread flooding has been reported.

Although most of this immediate area has thus far (Tuesday afternoon) escaped flood damage, heavy showers during the past week, Tuesday, Oct. 6, through Tuesday, Oct. 13, have dumped up to 11.40 inches in the area.

That was the total reported by Roy Neil Tatom Tuesday afternoon at Atwell as the Review updated figures on the rainfall. Tatom reported 5.50 inches last week with light showers or drizzle on occasions through the week. Monday morning he poured 2.70 inches of rain out of his gauge, and at mid-afternoon Tuesday he had measured another 3.20 inches for a grand total of 11.40 inches.

"There has been surprisingly little washing damage," the farmer-stockman said, "although expected damage from that much water is apparent such as water gaps being washed out." He added, "I had a tank I had never seen full, but it is now."

There was wide spread flooding in some surrounding cities. Abilene, Eastland, Breckenridge and possibly others were hard-hit. School was reportedly cancelled in Clyde due to high water. Mrs. Ollie Smith of Admiral reported a total of over 12 inches of rain Tuesday morning.

Seemingly rainfall was heavier in areas north of Cross Plains,

both to the east and west. Harold Garrett of Cross Plains who has property interests in Abilene reached Abilene Tuesday, but at mid-morning had not been able to get to his office. He had concluded, however, that his 25 rent properties in that city were not under water, although he could not confirm that by sight. He also reported that the Pecan Bayou was overflowing its banks at the point where State Highway 36 crosses it, but the highway was not under water. There was water running across 36 in two spots early Tuesday morning, Garrett explained, both north and south of the Potosi turnout.

Reports reaching the Cross Plains Justice of Peace Office stated that Highway 36 was closed for a while Tuesday morning, but was re-opened that afternoon. Travel within Abilene was still out of the question according to word received here Tuesday afternoon.

Water damage in this immediate area was not heavy, although some road damage was reported in the Cottonwood sector from the rains last week. J. P. Clark had measured 6.80 inches of rain at mid-afternoon Tuesday. 4.60 of that fell last week, and the other 2.20 was gauged Monday and Tuesday.

Similar totals were reported at Pioneer where over six inches had fallen during the week. Most of that came last week, 4.50 inches at the Pioneer Co-Op, and another 1.70 was measured there Tuesday morning.

Almost identical figures were reported by G. T. Dawkins in the Sabanno community, explaining a little over six inches as a week's total, coming in showers netting over four inches last week and about two inches first of this week. At Rowden the rain totals ranged from 4.50-inch total at the N. V. Gibbs place south of the Rowden Store to better than seven inches at the Warren Price home about five miles north of the store.

In the Cross Cut community Mrs. Les Byrd reported about five inches, three of which fell last week and about two being received this week.

Cross Plains had measured 6.50 inches during the week. Tuesday and Wednesday of last week 3.65 inches fell, and during the week and week end another .15 of an inch was recorded. Showers Monday and that night and Tuesday's rain totaled 2.70 inches for an aggregate of 6.50 inches. That brings the year's total to 29.79 inches, above normal.

While stock tanks in many areas were brim full and running around, some in other sectors, such as the Cross Cut locality, there is room for more water.

Overall the rains brightened the agricultural outlook in this area.

## Firemen Get \$850 In Gifts As Project Costs Mount

Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department has recently received gifts totaling \$850, according to a report from Alvin Hutchins, secretary of the fire fighters.

That amount of donations coming within a short time is unusual, although the people of this city and especially the surrounding

countryside have always generously supported the organization which gets little monetary aid from governmental units. The donations could not have come at a better time, Hutchins indicated, because costs of building up a water truck is running more than expected.

The company is reconditioning a former gasoline tank truck to use as a water truck on rural fires. Often times a shortage of water, especially on rural fires, hinders or stops efforts of fire fighters. The project is costing the local fire company several thousand dollars.

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

### Callahan Shares In Lateral Road Monies

State Treasurer Warren G. Harding has announced that early this week \$25,770,675.15 will be distributed to the 254 Texas counties. These funds are the Lateral Road Fund administered by the State Treasurer's office as allocated by the sixty-seventh legislature.

The Callahan County allocation is \$78,170.30, and the funds will be used for the construction and improvement of county roads. The lateral road fund is comprised of monies derived from gasoline taxes collected at the pump. The county allocations are based on the county square mile area, the rural population, and the county lateral road mileage. Expenditures of the funds are reported by the counties to the State Treasurer.

Treasurer Harding stated that the distribution includes money appropriated for fiscal years 1980, 1981, and 1982, as well as interest earned on these funds. The 1982 funds are being distributed now rather than at the completion of the fiscal year.

# Why Bny Vehicle Liability?

Editor's Note: Following is the first part of a two-section story concerning liability automobile insurance. The article was authored by Linda McCormack, a member of the Texas A&M Extension Service. Part one of the article follows.

Do you have "liability insurance" on your car or truck?

If you're in an auto accident and it's your fault, your liability insurance pays for personal injury you caused to the people themselves, and it pays for property damage you caused.

Texas law now requires "compulsory insurance" — that is, under the law, all car owners must carry liability insurance, but beyond that, it's also a wise thing to do, says Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist.

McCormack is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

What If No Insurance?

What happens if you do not have liability insurance?

Obviously, if you cause damage to persons or property, if they sue you and if you are found responsible, the court probably will order you to pay for the damages. If you have no insurance to pay the bills for you, then the money likely will come "out of your

pocket," McCormack explains.

On the other hand, if you fail to prove that you are able to pay for the damages you caused, either with the money itself or through a liability insurance policy — then you may be subjected to a penalty. This penalty might be a fine of not less than \$75 — or it could mean having your driver's license revoked if you are convicted of failure to maintain financial responsibility, the specialist adds.

Who Must Pay Damages?

Who is responsible for paying damage claims in automobile accidents?

Almost always the car owner is responsible, McCormack says, even if someone else was driving the car at the time of an accident.

"It is a universal rule that an automobile owner is liable (responsible), right along with the driver, in cases concerning negligent acts of the driver (if he was operating the car with the owner's permission).

That owner-responsibility rule includes the following situations:

- (1) When the driver is an employee of the owner and acting within the scope of his job duties.
- (2) When the driver is acting as an "agent" of the owner, or when the driver is on an errand or mission for the owner.
- (3) When the owner has entrusted the auto to a known incompetent or reckless driver.

Protection for Owner

How can car owners lessen chances of being liable and how can they avoid costly lawsuits?

McCormack offers three suggestions:

- Allow only competent and safe drivers to operate the car.
- Maintain the car in highway-worthy condition.
- Have an adequate liability insurance protection policy.

How 'Liability Policy' Works

Liability insurance protects the insured individual (the car owner) from the risk of financial disaster resulting from his being found liable for injuries to others due to an accident, McCormack explains.

When a person buys liability insurance, his insurance company agrees to protect him against accident claims, to defend him in court, and to pay damages to the person suing the car owner, if the car owner is found guilty.

This type of insurance does not provide for the car owner's own losses such as damage to his own car or personal injury, McCormack notes. (Another coverage, "collision," pays for damage to the car owner's own car.)

Liability insurance, instead, protects the car owner financially — by defending him against the claims of those he has injured in an accident.

Two parts usually comprise a liability insurance policy: bodily injury and property damage.

Under the bodily-injury section, it protects the car owner in claims involving injury to the "other car" driver and his passengers or injury to pedestrians injured in an accident with the car owner's automobile.

Under the property-damage section, the policy protects the car owner against claims which involve damage to another person's property or automobile.

How Much Coverage?

In Texas, the minimum liability limits are 10-25-5 — meaning coverage up to \$20,000 for all persons injured in an accident but limited to \$10,000 for each individual and \$5,000 for property damage.

# USDA Changes Policy On 'Additional' Peanuts

Peanut processors who buy back farmers' "additional" peanuts from the CCC Loan program now will have to pay prices more reflective of market conditions, under a change announced by Everett Rank, executive vice-president of the P. S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation.

"Additional" peanuts are those grown on a farmer's peanut acreage allotment in excess of the farmer's poundage quota. Additional peanuts carry a price support level of \$250 per short ton versus a price support of \$455 per ton for quota peanuts. Normally, additional peanuts are forward contracted either for crushing or for export. However, a provision in the law allows peanut processors to use additional peanuts in the domestic edible market, such as in the production of peanut butter, if processors buy the additional peanuts at the quota loan price, plus handling costs.

In 1980, the domestic market price of peanuts increased substantially above the quota loan value, thus permitting some handlers to purchase additional peanuts at prices below the market price, Rank said. He said this change sets the quota loan value plus handling costs as only a minimum market price. In the future, any premium agreed upon by a handler or processor and a farmer in excess of this minimum will be paid directly to the producer, Rank said.
