On August 7, 1956 President Eisenhower signed into law the bill authorizing the long-term conservation program. At the time, he delivered a special message to Congress in which he stated: "The goal to be achieved is a more stable agriculture, more dependable sources of income, and a progressively satisfactory livelihood for people of the region." The program is available to producers in the Plains states from North Dakota to Texas.


