Carolyn's Corner

Tornado season is well upon us again. A tornado may occur at anytime but the storms are more common from March through July. Notional Weather Service Statistics show an average for the United States of 106 twisters in April, rising to 150 in May before dropping to 142 in June and 75 in July according to an article which appeared in the April 3 issue of the Abilene Reporter News. The article also stated that this year some NWS meteorologists are expecting tornadoes to crop up in record numbers.

Following are some danger signs to watch for and some safety rules to follow in case of a tornado. They were published in the same issue of the Reporter News. The danger signs include severe thunderstorms with frequent lightning, heavy rain, strong winds or power failure; hail; roaring noise (a crashing thunderous sound, like a hundred railroad locomotives); funnel cloud. Besides watching for signs, the NWS advises listening to television or radio.

Safety rules include: Stay away from windows, doors, chimneys and outside walls and protect your head no matter where you are. In homes or buildings, go to the basement or an interior part on the lowest level, closets interior halls or bathrooms. A basement is the safest place, but in houses without basements the central portion of the house in an area away from the approaching tornado is the best location. In a split-level house choose the central or northeast section on the lowest level. Get under something sturdy, like furniture or stairwells. In schools, nursing homes, hospitals, shopping centers and factories, go to the designated shelter areas. School safety rules are available according to Dave Harmon of the Abilene National Weather Service. In high rise buildings, go to interior small rooms or halls and remember to cover your head. In mobile homes or vehicles get out and go to a substantial structure. Evacuation is a must, the NWS emphasizes. If no shelter is near, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine or culvert with your hands shielding your head and because flash floods often follow tornadoes, Harmon said, leave the low spot as soon as the twister passes. Don't bother opening windows in an effort to prevent the house from exploding as air pressure drops suddenly outside, Harmon said. Time spent opening windows is better spent seeking safety, experts say, and the change in pressure caused by raising windows in minor.

City Lets \$109,288 Bid For Community Building

City of Cross Plains let two bids totaling \$112,573 for a Community Center Building—and a portable dozer shed after opening 14 bids in a called meeting at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Successful bidder for the Community Center Building was low bidder Cavalier Building Systems on the offer of \$109,288. Eight other firms submitted bids.

The structure will be built on several acres of land purchased recently north of the Multi-Purpose Center, and will become a part of a planned parks and picnic area. Most of the funds came from the HUD grant approved for

Cross Plains, but it was noted that some of the money was also provided by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

It was not known when construction would start, but it is expected

in the next few days. Construction can be finished in 110 days, it was reported.

Successful bidder for a portable shed for the city's bulldozer was Don Callaway of Brownwood. That amount was \$3,385, only \$90 lower than Bench Mark of Abilene at \$3,475. It will be used at the city's landfill operation.

Runner-up bidder for the community center building was also Bench Mark of Abilene at \$114,455.16.

Other individual bids on the major project as reported to the Review were in order: Lone Star

Construction \$115,749; Burl Nash Contractors \$116,526; Earl Thompson Construction, Breckenridge, \$122,624; Associated Contractors of Abilene \$123,753; Brownwood Construction \$126,840; Abilene Construction Co. \$135,083; DLS Contractors of Abilene \$136,624.

The community building is to be made of metal construction with a brick veneer.

Other three offering bids for the portable dozer shed were reported as Oil Patch Solution Service of Abilene \$4,400; Abilene Construction \$5,400 and Rick Potter of Cross Plains \$5,697.

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State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

With less than two months left in 140-day legislative session, lawmakers are openly discussing raising taxes to replace dwindling state revenues.

And House Speaker Gib Lewis, who seems to step into a new flap weekly, is taking criticism for a growing sentiment among legislators that the House is unorganized and moving at a snail's pace.

As of last week, Lewis was way behind on referring bills to House committees and senators are concerned the traditional end-of-the-session logjam will reach historic proportions within a few weeks.

The Senate is pushing to get important bills out early to facilitate House action.

With the session more than half over, only one bill passed by both chambers was originated in the House, the rest began in the Senate.

Last week, senators publicly jibed Lewis and his leadership team. "As I recall it, we (the Senate) sent a committee to the House several months ago to tell members the Senate was organized and ready to do business," Sen. Carl Parker said. "Do you think we should send a committee to inform them again?"

"We could call it a search committee," echoed Sen. John Traeger.

Severance, Fuel Taxes

The lawmaker's dilemma is deciding whether to raise taxes to make up for \$2.3 billion revenue shortfall or cut the state budget. The recession, the recent drop of worldwide oil prices and the loss of federal funds have all contributed to the problem.

Gov. Mark White has proposed an \$800 million increase in "sin taxes" (on alcohol, tobacco and amusement machines).

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby favors temporarily increasing oil and gas severance taxes to finance a \$2 billion endowment to state universities and colleges.

Comptroller Bob Bullock favors a nickel increase in the gasoline tax which would raise \$850 million.

Two other proposals to raise

\$100 million by raising fees for state services and licenses and \$313 million—one time only—by speeding up tax payments, are already working their ways through the legislative process.

Special Session

The action of the House in the next few days is all-important because only the House can initiate a tax bill. Speaker Lewis so far has been adamant against raising taxes, opting instead to try and cut \$1.5 billion out of the budget. While some lawmakers fear that seven major legislation will be sacrificed while they struggle to get a tax increase, others are predicting quietly that it's already too late. A special session will be needed to finalize the state budget.

As if matters weren't complicated enough, Bullock is expected this week to lower the state's revenue estimates even more, triggering either more cuts or more taxes.

Bullock said last week the real crunch for state government will come in 1985.

His gloomy predictions have prompted a good many lawmakers to consider delaying approval of the budget or approving only a one-year budget to buy time. If in time his predictions prove too low, they can avoid raising taxes unnecessarily.

The House

Last week a House committee voted to add a \$10 million surcharge to employers' taxes and allow the state to continue to borrow federal money to pay unemployment benefits to 650 thousand unemployed Texans.

The five percent surcharge on 1982 unemployment taxes would finance the interest on the borrowed funds, and would equal about \$1.80 per employee for the average Texas business.

The bill was backed by a coalition of major business groups.

The House also passed a proposed constitutional amendment giving state banks the same privileges and rights as national banks.

It would include the authority to open branch banks in Texas if federally chartered banks are given that power, as financial experts predict.

Opponents of branch banking argue the system removes money from community banks where it is deposited so it can be loaned at higher interest rates elsewhere.

The Senate

The Senate last week passed legislation which would:

—Allow creation of local employment commissions to handle hiring discrimination complaints. The bill would also create a state commission to oversee local action, thereby moving the federal government out of the picture.

—Make it tougher for a defendant accused of a violent crime to be found innocent by reason of insanity. The defendant would be required to prove he was suffering mentally and did not know right from wrong at the time.

—Allow prisoners the opportunity to earn extra time off for good behavior.

College Desegregation

Two weeks ago a federal district judge threatened to cut off Texas' federal funding for state colleges because the state had reneged on a promise to eliminate racial segregation from higher education.

In response, Gov. Mark White resubmitted a two-year-old plan to desegregate Texas colleges and avert loss of \$300 million in federal aid.

The judge gave Texas 45 days to negotiate a settlement with the U. S. Department of Education.

Pioneer News Items

On April 15, 1954, the following Devotional was given by a pupil, at the Cross Plains High School. (First Period)

The Joy of the Cross
Bible Readings John 19: 16-42 and 20: 1-31.

There is danger that we miss the joy which runs through the lives of all great christians who have really entered into the deeper meaning of the cross. They think in terms, not of what they have given up for christ and humanity, but of the fun they have had in their adventures of self-giving. So Mary Slessor, timid and bashful girl, became a missionary to the cannibals of Calabar and looked back on her work with so much satisfaction that she said, "I am the happiest and most grateful woman in the world."

Livingston had the same attitude when he said, "People talk of the sacrifice I have made in spending so much of my life in Africa. It is emphatically no sacrifice. It is a privilege."

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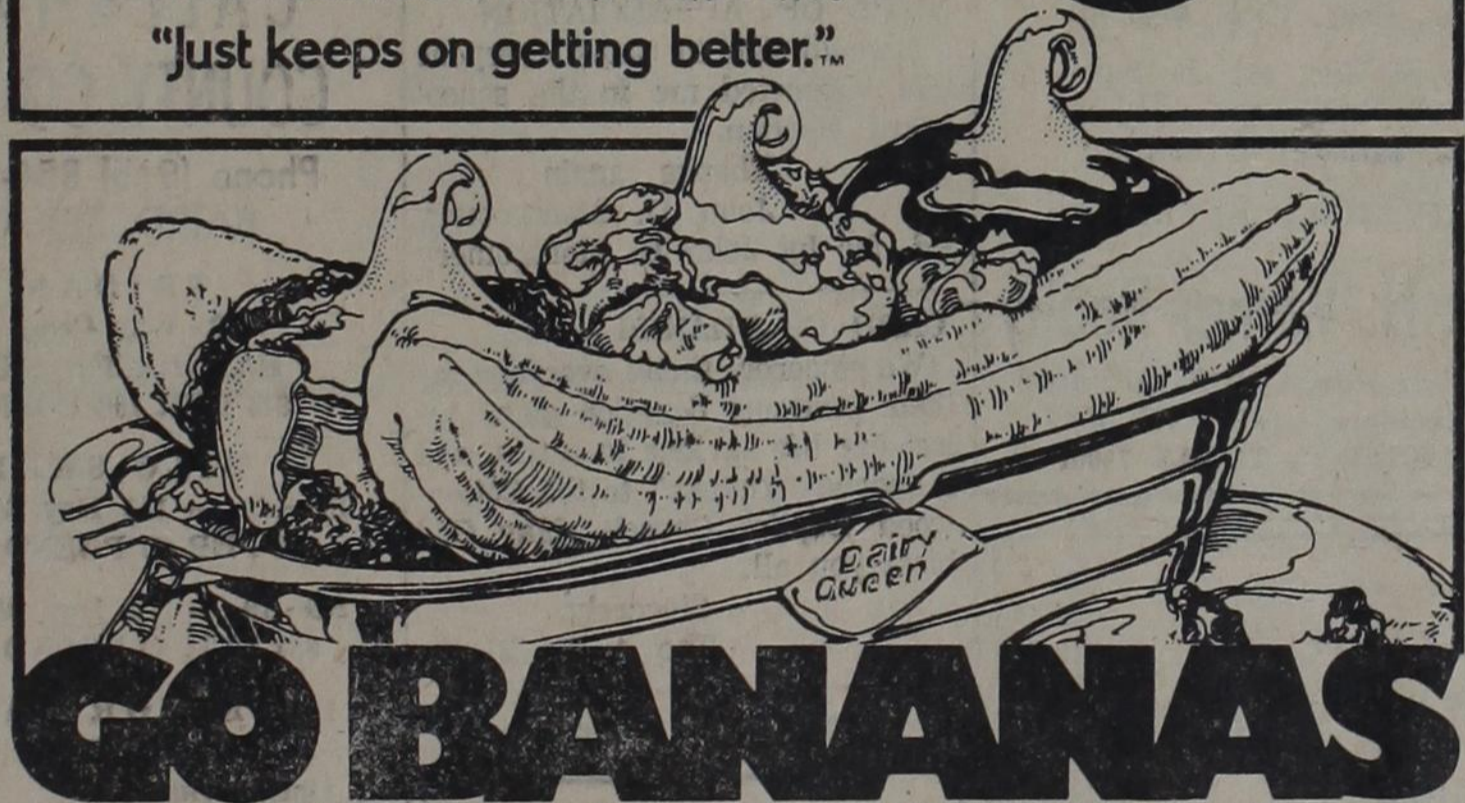

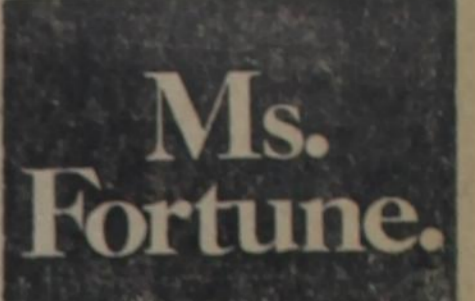

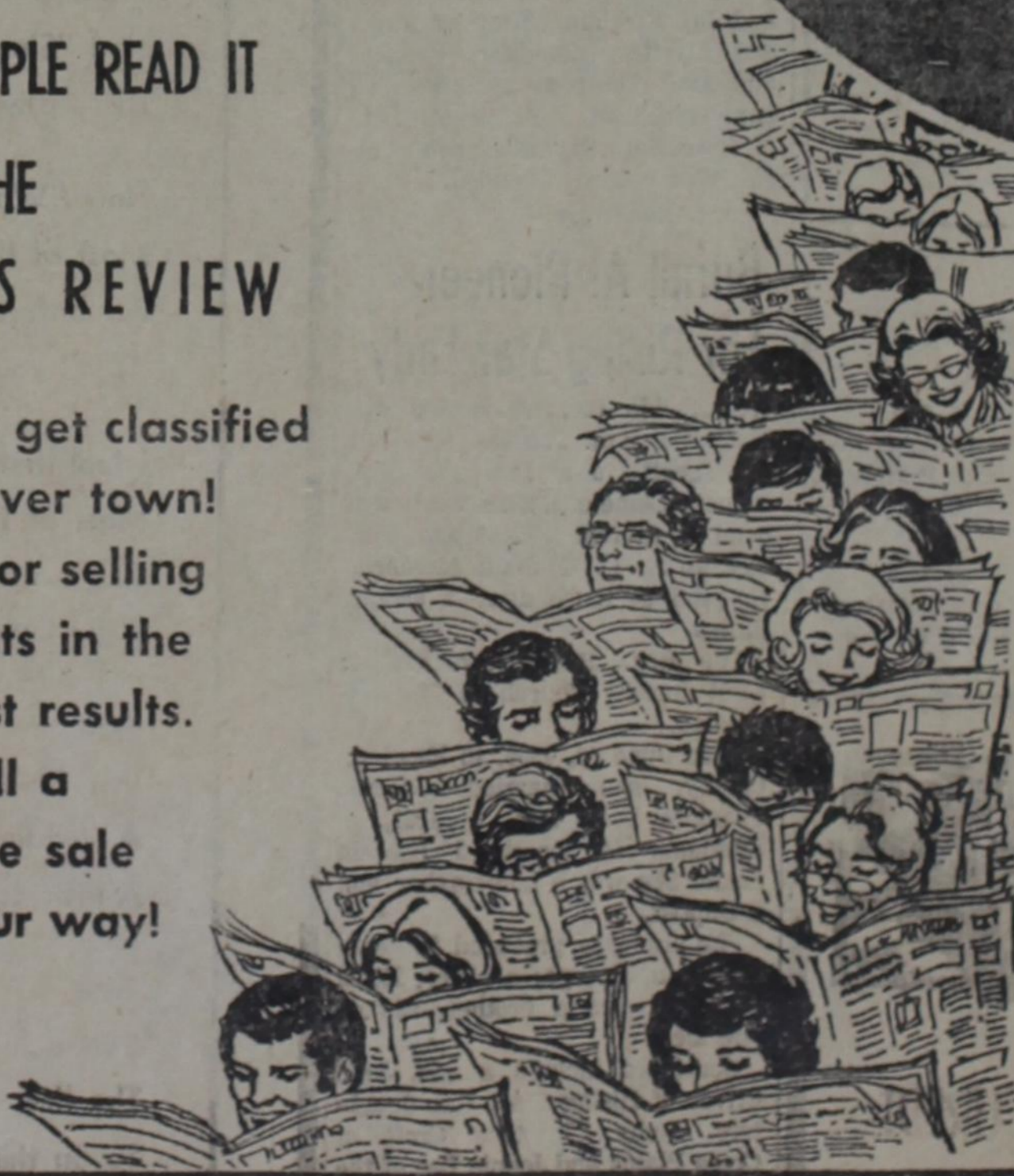
