Grain Harvest Resumes After More Rain Falls

Harvesting of small grain crops in the Cross Plains area was getting into full swing Tuesday after rains Thursday through Saturday added to already soft and damp earth.

Some combines began in fields Monday, but many more joined in the harvest Tuesday after hot temperatures and drying wind dried the area Monday and Tuesday.

Very few producers have completed the harvest, so yields are inaccurate, but most observers seem to think the wheat is making less than was expected. One producer said that he believed average yield to be

in the low 20-bushel range. Another producer said that he believed a combination of rains, rust, some wind and advanced maturity is causing the lower than expected yield.

Although there was very little stormy weather in the moisture which fell here beginning early Thursday morning. The rain received here during Thursday totaled 1.15, according to one Cross Plains gauge. Another .20 of an inch was measured here Friday and on Saturday .40 of an inch fell.

The week's 1.75 aggregate brings to 16.07 the total for the year to noon Tuesday.

'Monster Madness' Begins At Library This Morning

Ex-Local Is Outstanding Art Educator Of Texas

Editor's Note: Following is a news article concerning Ida Nell Williams of Austin, who is well known in Cross Plains where she was reared. Miss Williams is a sister of two Cross Plains residents, Mrs. Garrett Fomby and Roger Williams. The article follows.

At the recent National Art Education Association Convention held in Chicago, Ill., Ida Nell Williams was honored as the outstanding art educator from Texas.

In presenting the award, the following information was given regarding her contributions to the profession of art education:

"As an art teacher in the public schools, as the first state director of art education, and as an organizer and leader of the Texas Art Education Association, she has been an example of the determination and dedication characteristic of our finest art educators. Because of her initiatives, changes in the quality of state adopted texts occurred, brochures on art and its relevance to education

were published, and a slide tape presentation on art education was distributed throughout the state, and she was further responsible for the development of art curriculum guides for the elementary, junior high, and senior high school levels. In 1973 she organized the first meeting for local art supervisors and has remained a significant force in that group. Ida Nell Williams served as president of the Texas Art Education Association from 1964 to 1967 and remains an active and significant leader in that organization. In recognition of these outstanding contributions to the quality of art education, the Texas Art Education Association has nominated Ida Nell Williams for this honor at the 21st Annual Convention of the National Art Education Association."

Ida Nell, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Williams, lives in Austin but frequently visits her brother, Roger, and other relatives in Cross Plains.

Son's Trusting The Lord Cheers Mama In 1915

Mrs. John Miller of the Pioneer community has a letter written by her grandmother to her father upon her learning of the latter's trusting the Lord as Savior.

The writing, in remarkably good condition considering it will be 66 years old June 15, carried an Admiral, Texas, postmark and had Admiral, Texas, on the date line on the letter, but the return address was listed as Cottonwood, Texas.

The envelope, which in addition to the postmark of June 15, P.M., 1915, also carried an Abilene postmark of June 16, 1915. The envelope, which was purchased at the post office, had a two-cent postage stamp embossed on the envelope.

The three-page letter was written by Mrs. J. H. (Julia Ann) Brannan to her son, Mr. (Richard) Henry Brannan.

An Attempt was made to reproduce the pages for printing in the Review, but the reproductions were not of good enough quality to be used.

Mrs. Miller wished to share the letter anyway, and it is printed hereunder.

Admiral, Texas
June 15, 1915

Mr. Henry Brannan
My Dear Boy

I received your cheering letter yesterday and it seemed to be the best letter I ever re-

ceived in my life to know you have trusted the Savior and now prepared to live a useful life. May God's richest blessing rest on you, may you be the means of leading other lost souls to Christ do wish I could have been with you (Second Page) great is the power of God and his Spirit It seems like the Lord has to make some think they are dying before they will give up their sins now you may say you are well and happy, and there will be a better way provided for you but guard against temptations for Satan will try you. I had papa to phone the good news to Jewel I know he will rejoice he is enjoying life better since he moved his membership near home. but Albert put his letter in the trunk. (Third Page) We are still having rain every few days but the crops look very well and gardens the fruit is only tolerable good year pa has gone to Admiral with a few apples and apricots to try to sell some we are getting plenty of milk now as news is scarce will ring off for this time all join me in sending love and best wishes may you grow in grace is a mothers prayer write soon

Cats Claim L.L. Top Spot Giants-Braves Share Title

Two teams were crowned champions and another claimed undisputed possession of first place in Little League action here last week.

Giants and Braves ended the season with identical 8-4 records in the Pee Wee League and agreed to share the championship.

Cats thumped the Buffs 15-4 on Tuesday of last week and grabbed sole possession of first place in the senior Little League loop. Rain early Thursday left the field too soft for play that night. Those games are scheduled to be played Tuesday, June 16.

In regular season finales Tuesday of last week, Giants defeated the Angels 3-0 in the first game, and in the second contest the Braves nipped the Cubs 3-2.

In a playoff game between the Giants and the Cubs, which had been tied at 4-4 on May 19, the Cubs claimed a victory. That left the Braves and Giants with 8-4 marks. They were crowned co-champions. The Cubs victory over the Giants gave that team a 4-8 record, and the Angels shared third place with that unit.

Cats and Buffs were battling for the league lead in the opener Tuesday of last week. Both units tallied one run in the first. Cats sent seven runners home in the top of the second. Buffs could not score in the second, and Cats brought three more runs home in the top of the third. Buffs countered with a trio of scores, but in the fourth four more Cats came home for the final 15-4 count.

In the nightcap, the Blue Jays and Kilowatts staged a high-scoring performance with the Blue Jays rallying for seven runs in the fourth to finally win the 14-13 contest. Kilowatts started with four runs in the top of the first and added three more in the second before the Jays countered with five in the bottom of the frame. Three more Kilos came home in third to give the visitors a 10-7 advantage after three full innings. Kilowatts were blanked in the fourth, then the Blue Jays rallied for 7 runs and

Oil Derrick Fall Is Fatal To Abilenian, 19, Here

Harley Craft, 19-year-old Abilene man who had worked in the oil field two days, died at 11 p.m. Thursday night when he apparently slipped and fell from an oil derrick between Cross Plains and Burkett.

Harley Craft was pronounced dead upon arrival at Coleman Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital apparently due to extensive chest and internal injuries, according to Vaughn Pirtle, a member of the Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service team who helped get Craft to the hospital.

It was noted that the accident site was about five miles south of Cross Plains on the Kenneth Walker place, land formerly owned by Lon Gray who now resides in Coleman. The oil rig was, according to Pirtle, owned by Jones Drilling of Albany. Pirtle continued that heavy

The thoughts and inspiration I wish to share with you are not new to me, but only renewed from reading a unique book co-written by Pat Ellis Taylor and Jewel Babbs. "Border Healing Woman" is none other than Jewel Babbs, herself; self-styled and self-made, one so typical of a few women I have known.

One should not expect the mind-refreshing experience of reading about an ordinary person and her contribution to society, when you read the book. Border Healing is an 80-year-old Anglo woman, born in South Texas, living in the Mexico border area most of her life; a drop-out from sixth grade, one who loves home-made quilts, clean beddings, goats (all breeds) people and her God. Though a rugged unconventional person who lived a nomadic life with her parents during the early years of her life, she feels such affinity with her God and the world of His protecting spirits, that she has complete freedom from fear. Fear she might have had of the many kinds of people who came to her "tie house" in the desert, or to the rooms of the hotel and hot springs which she owned and operated for a period of time. (H. L. Hunt bought the hotel and springs after he experienced a degree of healing himself. Her method of healing was to sit across a room from her patient and with uplifted hands and complete silence in the room, the patient would feel the healing of the disease. Most any disease is partially healed or completely healed, except cancer.)

Though demonstrative religion is not her style, her life and ministry are evidence of "the fruits of the spirit" as given in Gal. 5:22 and 23. A paraphrased quote from Jewel Babbs is "Work will hurt none, only stress kills." Very fitting into the philosophy of the book are some quotations from George Plagens, a newspaper columnist: "We must love people into the Kingdom of God."

"It was Jesus Himself . . . that won people in His day. Their hearts were captured and won by the radiance of a face that shone with all the light of God's glory on it. Whenever Jesus was around, people felt something like the peace of God, the love of God and the power of God flow through their lives. "It was His presence that communicated this. To us communicating means using words. To Set. Augustine, as to Jesus, it challenge, and most hopeful was one loving, heart kindling another. "To walk with Jesus and be quiet — could this be the secret we should learn? To uncover that secret is mankind's greatest promise."

The book reminds me again that God wants His people to be well, and that he gave us a nature that has a great power to heal so many of mankind's ills; maybe more power than the sometimes conflicting effects of modern medicine.

If you have not read "Border Healing Woman," read it. It provokes thought about our (lack of) sense of values in this troubled but beautiful world, in which we live.

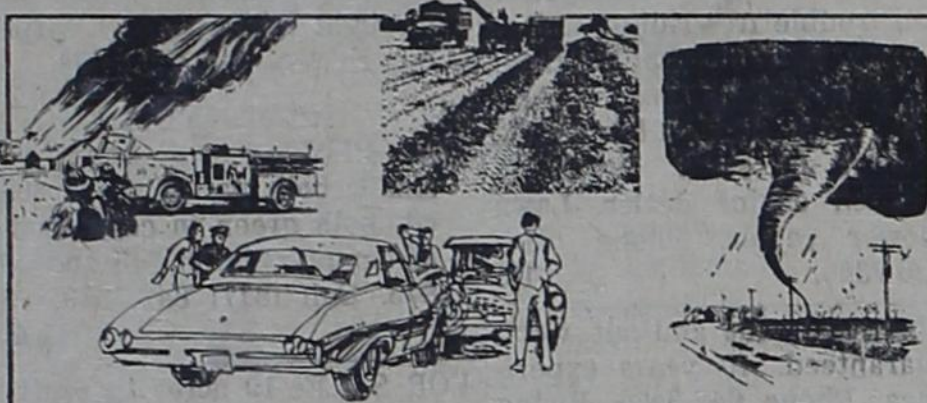
