

Garden Club Flower Show Scheduled Here Friday

The annual spring flower show of the Cross Plains Garden Club will be held in the Garden Center at 644 Beech Street Friday, April 24.

"Floral Fiction" has been chosen theme for this year's exhibition.

Chairman of the standard show is Mrs. Leo Franke. Mrs. N. V. Gibbs is garden club president.

An amateur gardener is eligible to enter an exhibit in each class, show officials stated.

The following entry deadlines were announced on Monday.

Container-grown plants must be delivered between 2 and 6 p.m. Thursday and any entry will be accepted at that time.

Entries other than container-grown may be entered Friday between 8 and 10:30 a.m. and be ready for placement at 11 o'clock.

Judging by national council accredited judges will begin at 11:30 Friday morning.

Entries must remain until 5 p.m. Friday, April 24, and should be removed after that hour.

Sections of Division II Artistic Design are "Big Valley," "As the World Turns," "Diff'Rent Strokes," "Family Affair" and "Exhibition Tables."

Division I Horticulture has been titled as follows.

Mickey Huffman, athletic director and head coach at Cross Plains High School the past two years, tendered his resignation to school officials Tuesday. He presented the following letter to the Review, explaining his decision to the public.

"Although I still have a year left on my contract as head coach and A.D., it is the wish of the present school board that I resign my position, so I will yield to their wishes.

"Due to recent hard decisions, it would be impossible to run a smooth program. Rather than have the young men of C.P.H.S. divided in loyalty and uncertainty, it is to the best interests of the athletic program at C.P.H.S. that I bow out.

"I have never been associated with a finer bunch of young men and women, than these here. I thank you for the opportunity of being head coach and A.D. at C.P.H.S. I'll carry lots of good memories with me. Thanks to everyone who gave their support, to help improve the facilities at the school. It's no disgrace for coaches to move on sometimes. There's always another hill to climb, and I'll do some more climbing somewhere."

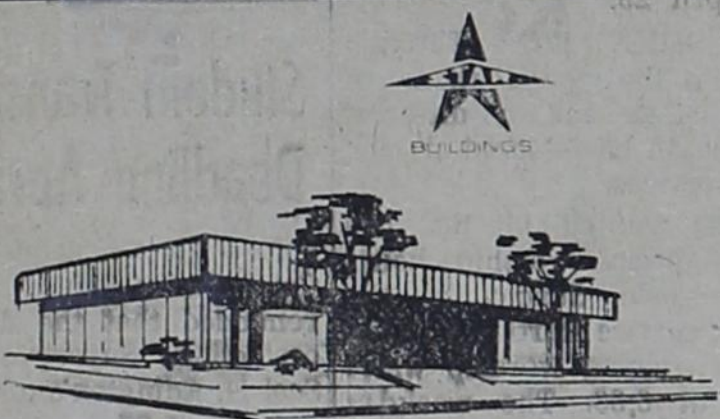

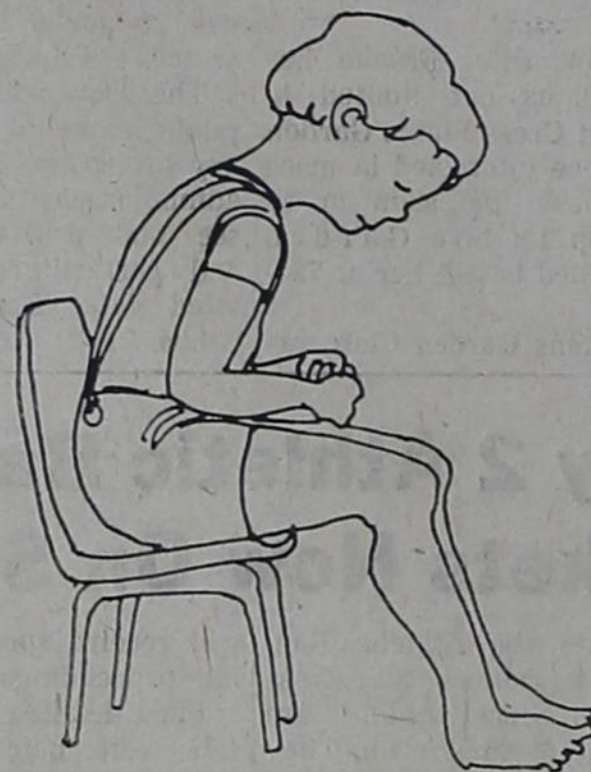

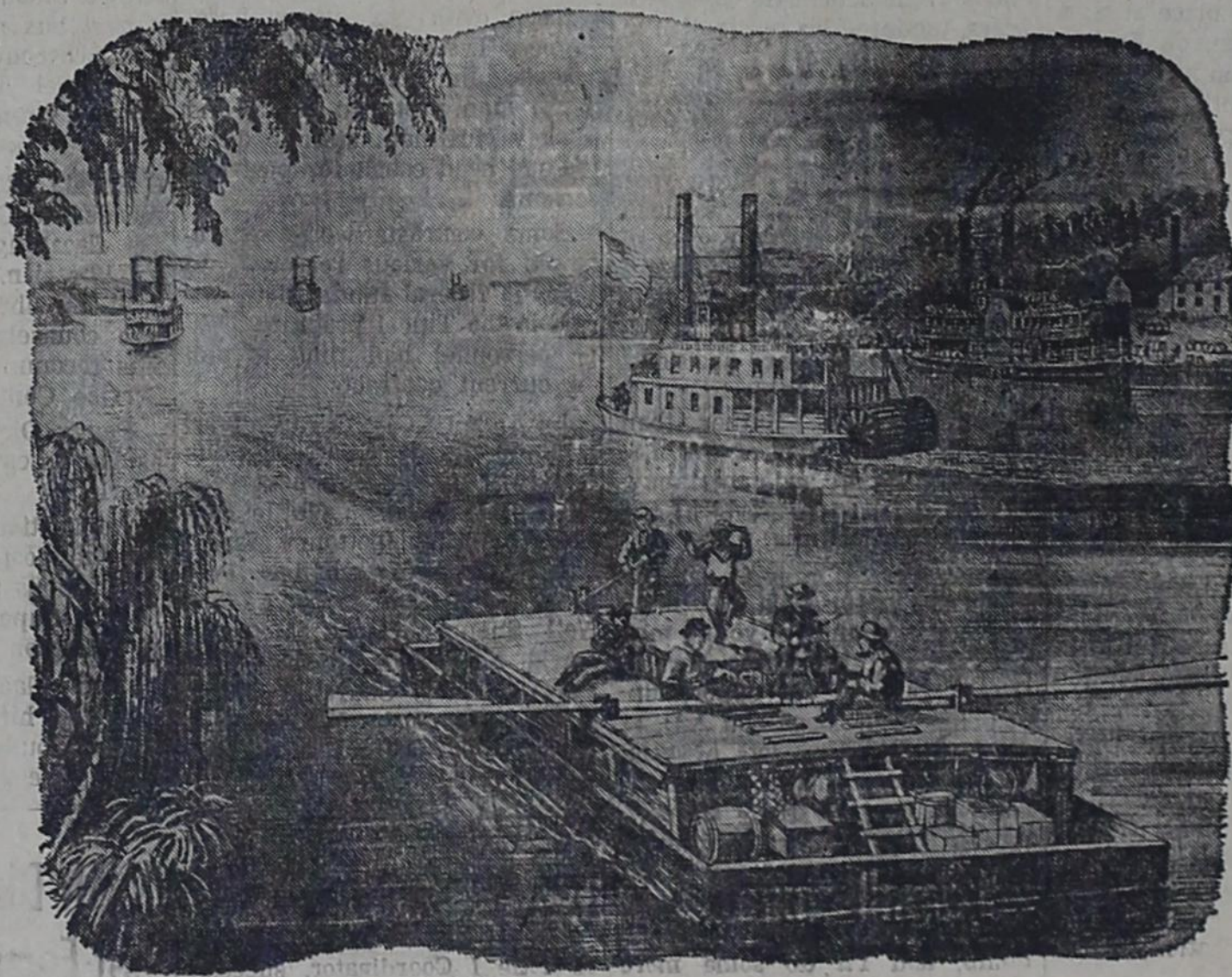

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"BUT THE BIBLE SAYS"

WHY DO THOSE IN THE CHURCHES OF CHRIST SAY THE BIBLE DEMANDS UNITY IN RELIGION, YET THEY ARE FILLED WITH DIVISION THEMSELVES?

"BUT WHAT DOES THE BIBLE SAY?" This is a very good, and overlooked, question today and demands an honest Biblical answer. Many have said, "DO AS I SAY — NOT AS I DO", by their actions long enough on this issue.

First off we must make clear one major point. Many in the religious world today are seeking UNION in religion but not UNITY. Ponder this for a moment, because there is a great difference. If I were to take a piece of metal and cut it in half I would have division of the original whole. Now if I glue the two pieces back together I have a UNION of the two pieces. If I melt down the two pieces and re-pour them into one piece then I have created UNITY. Therefore in religion we must be melted and molded together if we want to obtain Biblical UNITY and ONENESS.

To the question at hand I must say the Bible demands religious UNITY. Those who are a part of non-doctrinal division will be very alarmed on the judgment day for their actions. The Bible is clear on God's view of division and its sin. There are two key Biblical contexts that make this clear in my mind among the many passages found in the Bible. In the Old Testament we read: "THESE SIX THINGS DOETH THE LORD HATE: YEA SEVEN ARE AN ABOMINATION TO HIM" (Proverbs 6:16). Do you know or recall which one he abhorred? "... HE THAT SOWETH DISCORD AMONG HIS BRETHREN" (Proverbs 6:19). The one of many passages found in the New Testament I would like for us to consider is: "NOW I BESEECH YOU, BRETHREN, BY THE NAME OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, THAT YE ALL SPEAK THE SAME THING, AND THAT THERE BE NO DIVISIONS AMONG YOU; BUT THAT YE BE PERFECTLY JOINED TOGETHER IN THE SAME MIND AND IN THE SAME JUDGMENT" (1 Corinthians 1:10).

I believe these two passages alone make it very clear God's view concerning division. Those in the Churches of Christ, as our question asked, are wrong when they cause what the Lord died for to be divided and filled with factions and disharmony. But this does not explain nor okay the religious division the world over. We read in EPHESIANS 4:5 "THERE IS ONE LORD, ONE FAITH, ONE BAPTISM". Almost everyone will agree there is one Lord. Yet the Bible says there is ONE faith too, but how many churches, denominations, doctrines, religions, or faiths do you know of? My friend, some 500 faiths exist but the Bible says there is but ONE. Note the passage above (1 Corinthians 1:10), where we read we are ALL TO SPEAK THE SAME THINGS and BE OF THE SAME MIND in our unity. Do these 500 denominations or faiths do this? I don't believe anyone would say they do. Consider this last point on this subject. Do you recall Peter's testimony of Christ and then the Lord's reply? "AND I SAY ALSO UNTO THEE, THAT THOU ART PEER, AND UPON THIS ROCK I WILL BUILD MY CHURCH ..." (Matthew 16:18). Again we see ONE church or faith proclaimed. In other words, my religious friends, we can all be WRONG, but we can not all be RIGHT. Our Bibles just proved this point to us all.

As I pen this article I do so with great JOY and HUMILITY. The reason is that the Church of Christ in Cross Plains, which has been divided for seven years, has now been unified. We are all now worshipping under one roof and one leadership, and in complete UNITY and HARMONY.

Through the work, study, and prayers of a few brethren from both congregations this long and hard struggle has found the UNITY it had once lost. Yes both sides had to humble themselves and admit wrong before UNITY prevailed. Do you recall Paul's words to the Christians at Colossae? "FOR HE WHO DOES WRONG WILL RECEIVE THE CONSEQUENCES OF THE WRONG WHICH HE HAS DONE, AND

THAT WITHOUT PARTIALITY" (Colossians 3:25). I don't believe anyone wants to let wrong doings go without doing what the Bible commands. We obeyed the command of JAMES 5:16. Christians do fall from God's grace and we must pray about it. Please read this passage in YOUR Bible. We do not seek or accept any praise, for we are reminded of Paul's words to those at Philippi, "NOW TO GOD OUR FATHER BE THE GLORY FOREVER AND EVER. AMEN" (Philippians 4:20).

Each of us want the community to know of our JOY. The Lord no doubt is pleased as another victory is won for His Kingdom. As the psalmist David wrote, "BEHOLD, HOW GOOD AND HOW PLEASANT IT IS FOR BRETHREN TO DWELL TOGETHER IN UNITY" (Psalm 133:1).

May we all study our Bibles much, much more in the future than we have in the past. "NOW THESE (BEREANS) WERE MORE NOBLE THAN THOSE IN THESSALONICA, FOR THEY RECEIVED THE WORD WITH GREAT EAGERNESS, EXAMINING THE SCRIPTURES DAILY, TO SEE IF THESE THINGS WERE TRUE" (Acts 17:11). I hope everyone will search out God's Word, because ALL answers are within its covers. Don't put your faith in some, or preacher, (like me), study to see if the things you have been told are 100% true.

If you have a Bible question you would like answered, or if you would like to study the Bible, feel free to call me anytime. I only ask that no one get mad over something that we hear or read, let's study it out together with OUR Bibles, and seek that honest Biblical reply.

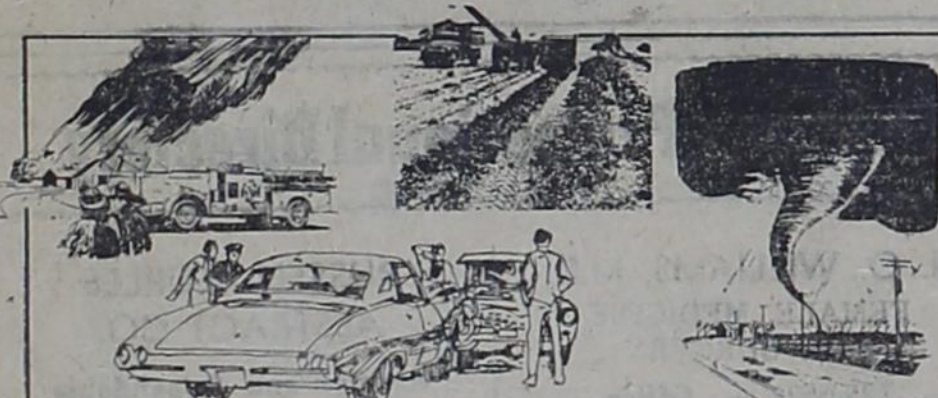

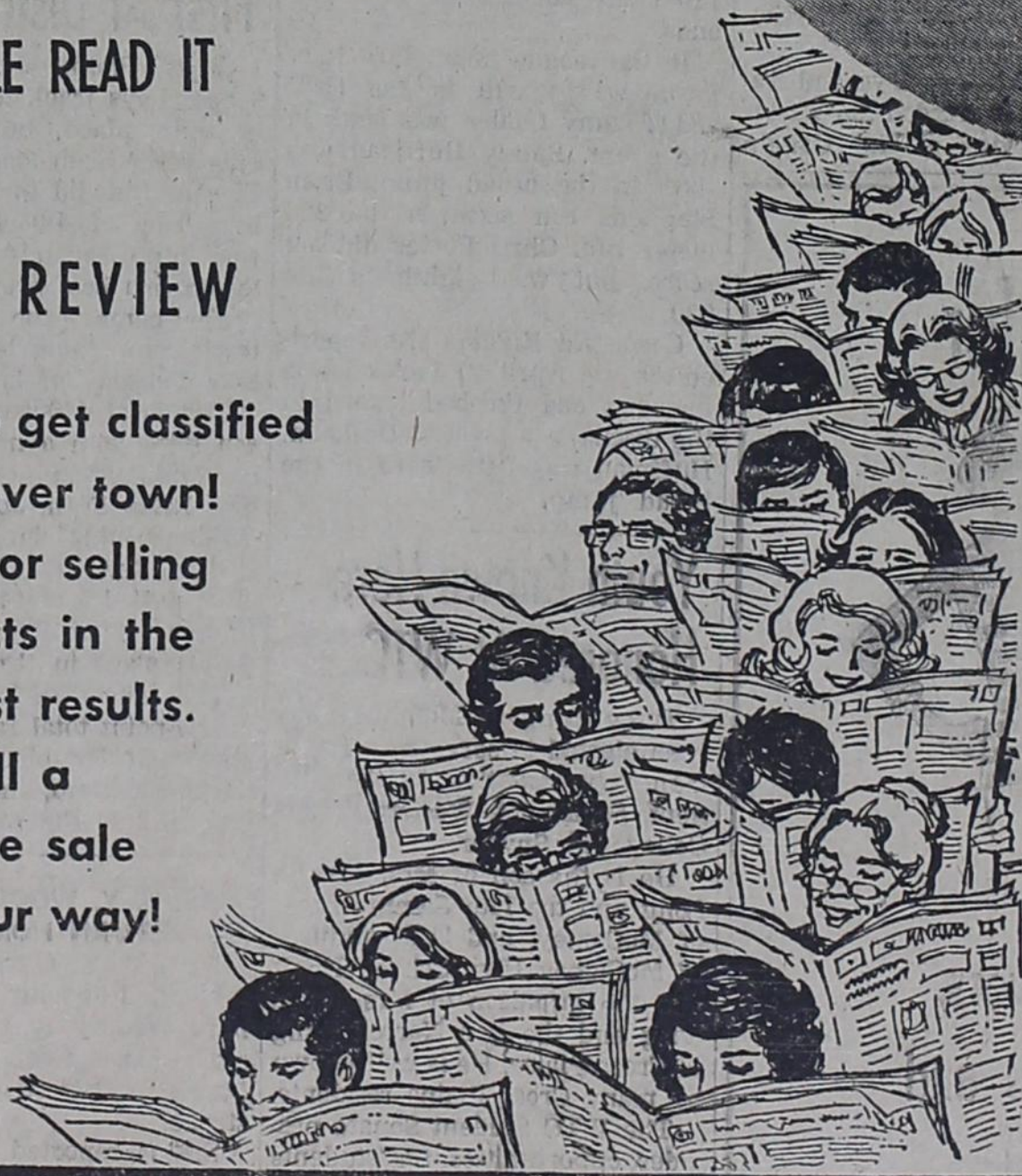
