

Gas Supplier, Distributor For City Meet, Talk Rate

Editor's Note: Cross Plains Gas Co. and Flame Gas Co., Inc., supplier and distributor of natural gas in the City of Cross Plains, personnel met with representatives of the Texas Railroad Commission at Austin last Thursday. The session was called to determine the "reasonableness of rates" charged by the supplier to the distributor within the City of Cross Plains. The story herewith appeared in the Saturday morning Abilene Reporter-News, and carried a by-line crediting Jim Davis of the Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau.

Both sides in a Railroad Commission rate case agreed Thursday that the natural gas system

in Cross Plains leaks badly, but they disagreed about the solution.

O. B. Edmondson, mayor of the small town between Abilene and Comanche, said leaks in the system "was why the council wanted to get rid of it, and it would necessitate putting in an entire new system." But the replacement by the purchaser, Flame Gas, Inc., hasn't occurred, he said.

Don Butler, Austin attorney representing Cross Plains, said the city agreed to abandon a contract for low-cost gas and to sell its municipal delivery system in order to obtain improvements.

After the sale, Butler said, the city has had "all the problems and none of the benefits."

John Hays, Jr., attorney for Flame Gas, said, however, that loss from leaks has been reduced from more than 60 per cent to about 43 per cent since the 1977 sale.

Paul Herman, attorney for Cross Plains Gas Co., an affiliate which sells gas to Flame Gas, suggested that the city wanted to rid itself of the system because of the possibility of liability from an accident caused by leaks. Everyone realizes that the city has "a leaky system . . . in bad shape," he said.

Other witnesses testified that Flame Gas is in financial trouble and needs higher rates before further system improvements can be made.

Leaks and the Flame Gas rates were side issues interjected into a Thursday hearing on the rate contracts between Flame Gas and Cross Plains Gas Co.

These issues are due closer examination during a Jan. 14 hearing prompted by the City of Cross Plains' refusal to approve higher rates for Flame Gas.

Hearings Examiners Meredith Kawaguchi and Carlos Higgins called the Thursday hearing to determine the reasonableness of rates charged by Cross Plains Gas to Flame Gas for resale to the City of Cross Plains.

They said a hearing was necessary because the Railroad Commission never officially determined the proper rate Cross Plains Gas could charge its affiliate, Flame Gas.

According to testimony, three stockholders who own 35 per cent of Cross Plains stock also own a majority of Flame Gas stock.

Since the rates charged by Cross Plains Gas to Flame Gas affect the rates charged to municipal customers of Flame Gas, the examiners must determine that rate question before tackling the larger issue of Flame Gas charges to municipal customers.

Cross Plains attorney Butler questioned Thursday whether two "advances" from Cross Plains Gas to Flame Gas were proper.

Doyle Criswell of Lubbock, a representative of Cross Plains Gas who said he handled finances for Flame Gas, testified that Cross Plains made "advances" of \$52,600 and \$10,000 to Flame Gas to allow payment of certain outstanding bills. "The intent was to keep Flame Gas in operation," he said.

Asked by Butler if he thought Flame Gas would repay the money, Criswell replied: "There's a lot of conjecture in that. Knowing Flame Gas's financial condition, I'd say no."

Criswell said an early agreement involving gas sales between the firms was, at best, informal.

He said a grocer who now lives in Levelland, prepared a contract between Cross Plains Gas and Flame Gas by taking an old contract out of a file and changing the names.

Criswell said when he and others became involved in the firms earlier this year, they insisted that all parties agree to a "memorandum of understanding" to clear up ambiguities in the contract.

One of the changes was that Cross Plains Gas would charge Flame Gas based on the average of the two highest similar contracts in the surrounding area rather than the average of all contracts in a larger area of West Texas. The charge allowed Cross Plains Gas to charge higher rates, which Flame Gas could pass on to municipal customers.

Criswell also testified that Cross Plains Gas now has contracts with Southwestern Gas Pipeline that allows his firm to sell excess gas during low-demand summer months and purchase gas during peak-use periods.

May To Dedicate 100-Year Historical Marker Monday

May, a community located on U. S. Highway 183 19 miles north of Brownwood in Brown County, will unveil a Texas Historical Marker on Monday, Nov. 30, at 3 p.m. in front of the May Community Center in the north part of town. The marker, entitled "The May Community," will commemorate 100 years of the post office. Nathan Lumpkin May, who became the first postmaster, established a trading post one mile north of present-day May in 1879, and two years later housed the new post office in it.

May was first settled in the 1870's as part of an empresario contract from the Mexican government to John Cameron, May

21, 1827, to settle 100 families in Central Texas, the north third of Brown County being in the grant. May, once a thriving town, has lost its bank, railroad, gin, drug store, newspaper, hospital, and doctors; but it still boasts a fine school system, fine churches, a general store, cafe, post office, garage, and a peanut plant.

Pat Coursey, past president of the Brown County Historical Society, will serve as Master of Ceremonies. Rev. Estill F. Allen, retired May minister, will give the invocation. Brown County Judge Ernest Cadenhead will welcome guests. Dr. Ben H. Moore, retired teacher and retired Presbyterian minister, will read his dedicatory poem.

Marion J. McDaniel, who researched the marker and served as chairperson of the May Community Centennial Committee, will give the dedicatory address. Hon. Lynn Nabers, State Representative from Brownwood, will which will be shown at the First Burnet and Earl McMurry unveil it.

Immediately following the unveiling, the May Community Improvement Club will serve refreshments in the May Community Center.

The public and the media are invited to attend the dedication.

No Mail Here On 4 Holidays & Sundays

U. S. Postal Service officials have advised that Cross Plains Postmaster Joe E. Hanke, Jr. that there will be no mail service in or from Cross Plains on four major holidays and each Sunday.

The four holidays are Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's and July Fourth.

Reason given for cutting service to Cross Plains, and it is reported to Rising Star and Putnam, on those days was a conservative step. Mail service to this city has long been limited to one out-going and one incoming daily, but mail did move out of here and arrive here on Sundays and most holidays. It is reported that service was not cut system-wide but to only selected places.

There will be no mail service of any kind in Cross Plains Thursday, Thanksgiving, according to Hanke.

WTU Plans To File Rate Hike Request With City

West Texas Utilities Company intends to file for a general increase in its retail rates, citing inflation, high interest rates and an essential major construction program as the reasons for the action.

The official filing was to be made Wednesday in Cross Plains by C. E. Rhodes, local manager.

Rhodes said the application is a systematic request for higher rates. Simultaneous filings were to be made in other incorporated towns for retail customers within their jurisdiction and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for an increase to retail customers outside incorporated towns. The filing with the PUC also includes customers in eight incorporated towns which have ceded jurisdiction to the PUC.

WTU filed October 15 with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for a rate increase to wholesale cooperative and municipal customers.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total revenue of \$32,256,983. This amounts to 15.4 per cent based on adjusted revenues of \$209,402,398 for a 12-month test period ending September 30, 1981.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective January 1, 1982. The local manager said that a rate increase granted WTU last year "did not get the job done." That increase was for an average of 8.3 per cent and was only the second in the company's entire history.

"The relief granted us has been overrun by inflation and high interest rates and the need to build additional facilities," Rhodes said. Growth in demand for electric

energy, caused by a steady increase in new customers and higher usage by old customers, is forcing WTU to expand its facilities.

WTU's newest power plant was completed in 1977, and since then the summer peak demand has grown to a point termed "uncomfortably close" to the system generating capacity.

The current construction program includes a coal-fired power station at Oklaunion, near Vernon. Although ownership of this plant will be shared by two sister companies in the Central and South West Corporation, Oklaunion will be the most costly project ever undertaken by WTU.

So far, WTU has lagged well behind most of the industry in increasing its rates. A recent report from the Public Utility Commission shows WTU's rates to be second lowest in the state among investor-owned companies and fifth lowest among all utilities.

Under the proposed rates, an average bill for basic residential service would be increased by 19.1 per cent. For example, a residential customer using 600 kilowatt-hours per month would pay \$40.95 compared to \$34.39 under the present rates — a difference of \$6.56. This would include fuel costs.

The city has several options in responding to WTU's request. It may deny the increase, suspend the increase for a certain period of time, or approve the increase. The city also has the option of denying the request and ceding future jurisdiction to the Public Utility Commission. Eight municipalities in the WTU service area chose to cede jurisdiction last year.

Gardener Gives Tips On Easy To Grow Poinsettia

From Cross Plains Garden Club Poinsettias are the most decorative of all plants for the Christmas season, and if conditions are favorable it is possible to have well-grown specimen plants even in a small greenhouse.

Poinsettias are propagated by cuttings taken from mature stock plants, after the flowering season is over. The stock plants are usually lifted and placed under a bench for a period of 10 to 12 weeks. The temperature of the house should range between 50 and 60 degrees F., and the plants should be kept very dry — not dry enough, however, to allow the wood to shrivel. About the first of April, the plants should be potted up. They should be watered thoroughly and the stems should be syringed occasionally.

A rich soil should be used for the stock plants consisting of 3 parts loam and 1 part rotted man-

ure with light application of super phosphate. The first cutting may be taken in early July. The cuttings should be trimmed so that only the two top leaves remain, and should be rooted in a medium fine sterilized sand, being shaded during the day. The cuttings should be well rooted and ready for potting in about three weeks. A mixture of 2 parts loam, 1 part sand and 1 part well rotted manure is recommended.

The plants may be shifted into larger pots as they develop. The ideal temperature for poinsettias ranges between 60 and 65 degrees F., below 60 degrees at night.

The plants are extremely sensitive to drafts and are very easily injured by chilling or by over watering. Under such conditions the leaves will turn yellow and drop.

Born Feb. 21, 1886, in Belle Plain in Callahan County, Mrs. Williamson and her sister, Willie Maude Floyd, lived for years at the Floyd home at 1841 S. Fifth in Abilene, which their father bought in the late 1920s.

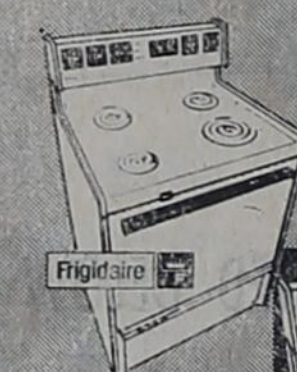
LEEANN WHITELEY HOME FROM AUSTIN HOSPITAL

Pioneer News Items

By Mabel Halsell

The account of the death of Will Durant and his wife Ariel, was given brief coverage in a newspaper, recently. A more thorough coverage, with their picture, was given later in the Sunday edition. All of this little enough for such great benefactors.

He is to be remembered as an historian and a philosopher, who in collaboration with his wife, wrote "The Story of Civilization," an eleven volume, two million word account of history from its beginning. In this and other works he showed his ability to "make dry material relevant." He and his wife, Ariel (a pet name he gave her after the Imp in Shakespeare's "The Tempest") raced with time because of age, to finish "The Age of Reason."

His "Story of Philosophy" was a collection of lectures which caught the ears of publishers. They offered to put them out in 5-cent books. He refused. Later, after an offer from Schuster of \$150, he consented . . . 2,000 copies were sold the first edition.

Lectures on Plato, Socrates, Schopenhauer, Aristotle, Spencer and some later philosophers are among the subjects of his lectures.

In reading the lecture on Plato, in which he outlines the philosophy of Socrates, we are reminded that they lived three or four hundred years before Christ. They lived and died without contacting the Christian religion and yet their wisdom was much like that of Solomon and David and other great men of the Bible. A quotation from Socrates: "Know Thyself" and the courage with which he met his death are worthy to be remembered.

After refusing to wait until sundown to take the lethal draught of hemlock, as most condemned ones did, he took the draught earlier. At the age of 70 years, (300 B. C.) he died the slow death after saying, "Be of good cheer and say that you are burying my body only" . . . and then to Crito "I owe a debt to Asclepius, will you remember to pay the debt?" Crito saw that it was paid.

Likewise Mr. Durant met death courageously. He said, "Death doesn't frighten me at all. I wondered why the Reaper waited so long to get me. He was 96; his wife, Ariel, who roller skated to their wedding . . . was 83. Their marriage of 68 years was an achievement itself; a story-book romance.

A poem to his wife follows. (He died without knowing about her death ten days earlier.)

TO MY WIFE

Grow strong my comrade . . . that you may stand Unshaken when I fall; that I may know The shattered fragments of my song will come At last to finer melody in you; That I may tell my heart that you begin Where passing, I leave off, and fathom more.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection costs.

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.

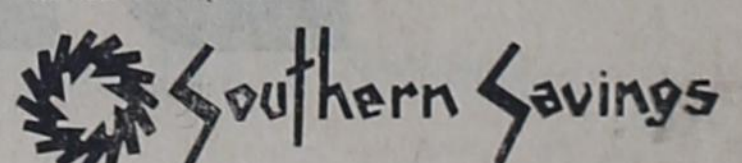
