

Plant A Cactus Bowl

Display a variety of cactus in a miniature glass contained desert

landscape! Cactus bowls are easy to plant and care for as they are insulated against drafts and low night temperatures. While tiny cacti may be scaled

to a water glass setting, larger containers are more suitable because fleshy plants can be placed ceived Associate Degrees during in them without bruising. Cactus enjoy dry growing conditions so these containers need not have

> Small potted plants are available from florists and mail order sources. Although spiny kinds are sold as cactus and smooth stemmed ones as succulents, most all belong to the cactus family. Besides the familiar crassulas, barrel, pincusion and prickkley pear cactus, the following plants add special interest to desert bowls, bunny ears, curiosity plant, cylin-

der cactus and dwarf tree opuntia. Showy shrub, like succulents, include: miniature and rainbow jade crassulas, miniature Joshua tree and rainbow bush.

Low foreground accent is supplied by sedums and other sprawlers. These slow-growing plants are resirained by shallow unenriched soil. Either buy packaged cactus soil or mix equal parts of potting soil and sand including some powdered limestone for spined desert varieties.

After spreading some aquarium gravel and crushed charcoal over the container bottom for drainage, place a small strip of dried decorator moss in back of bowl to keep the soil from shifting.

Add slightly moistened soil with a sugar scoop sloping it naturally in proportion to container height. Three inches at the deepest point





Crop, Stock Reports Due Starte In May

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in mid-May for 1983 crop information and midyear livestock inventories.

State Statistician Doug Murfield emphasized that information from the crop surveys will be used by county ASCS offices to set yields for the farm programs. "A good response on these surveys means that we can return more accurate but may not be limited to, proof in January 1983, spouses of those acreage and yield figures back to the counties." Murfield said.

ly with the many production options available to farmers and ranchers," Murfield added.

The confidential interviews conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, can also help producers in planning their production and marketing programs for the coming year.

To reduce survey costs, Murfield is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state and county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables, and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

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

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



Also in the Senate last week:

-The Senate meeting as a committee approved minor changes in the congressional redistricting plan, taking a small part of Dallas County from Democrat-turned-Republican Phil Gramm's district and replacing it with a part of Fort Worth. Gramm had complained his district was being sabatoged, but that effort is expected to come next week, if at all.

-A Senate committee passed a series of water bills, including three proposed constitutional amendments, which would address the water needs of every area of the state. One amendment would guarantee loans for farm water conservation in irrigation.

The House

Last week in the House:

-Aproved a brucellosis measure to prevent a federal quarantine on Texas cattle by giving the Texas Animal Health Commission authority to adopt new rules to conform with the federal program. Most major farm and ranch groups supported the bill, with the Independent Cattlemen's Associa-

tion opposing. -Passed legislation allowing local school districts to require passage of a basic skills test prior to graduation.

-Passed a bill limiting elections to four dates a year. Urban areas experienced as many as 12 to 70 elections last year costing taxpayers millions of dollars.

New Texas Republican Party chairman Gerge Strake plans to usc everything from ghetto recruitment centers to organized letter-writing campaigns to bring the GOP back in '84.

Strake said the first two priorities were re-electing President Ronald Reagan and U. S. Sen. John Tower, then going after "every winnable race right down to justice of the peace."


