Winner of the John Phillip Sousa Award in the high school band will be revealed, and musicians who have earned all-district, region and state band places will be recognized.

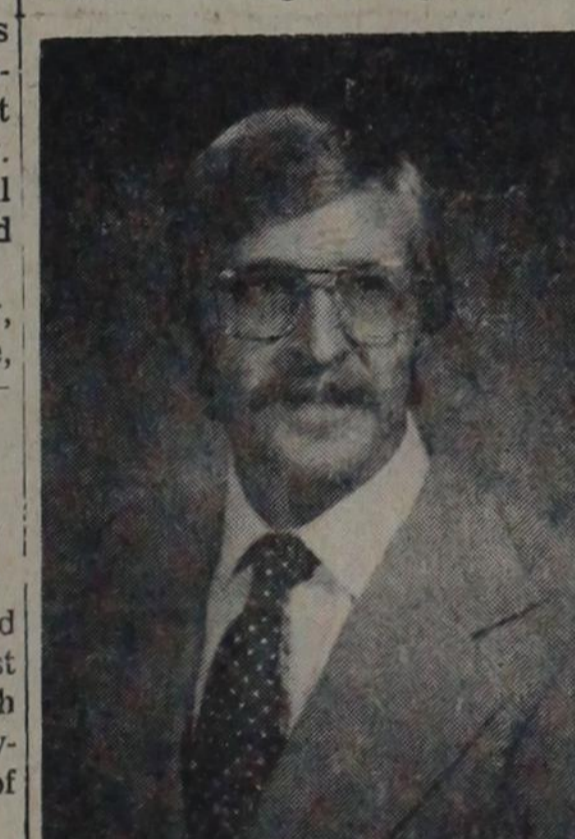

Display a variety of cactus in a miniature glass contained desert landscape! Cactus bowls are easy to plant and care for as they are insulated against drafts and low night temperatures.

While tiny cacti may be sealed to a water glass setting, larger containers are more suitable because fleshy plants can be placed in them without bruising. Cactus enjoy dry growing conditions so these containers need not have covers.

Small potted plants are available from florists and mail order sources. Although spiny kinds are sold as cactus and smooth stemmed ones as succulents, most all belong to the cactus family. Besides the familiar crassulas, barrel, pincusion and prickly pear cactus, the following plants add special interest to desert bowls, bunny ears, curiosity plant, cylin-

Crop, Stock Reports Due Start In May

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in mid-May for 1983 crop information and mid-year livestock inventories.

State Statistician Doug Murfield emphasized that information from the crop surveys will be used by county ASCS offices to set yields for the farm programs. "A good response on these surveys means that we can return more accurate acreage and yield figures back to the counties," Murfield said.

"This information is more important than ever in 1983, especially with the many production options available to farmers and ranchers," Murfield added.

The confidential interviews, conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, can also help producers in planning their production and marketing programs for the coming year.

To reduce survey costs, Murfield is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state and county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables, and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

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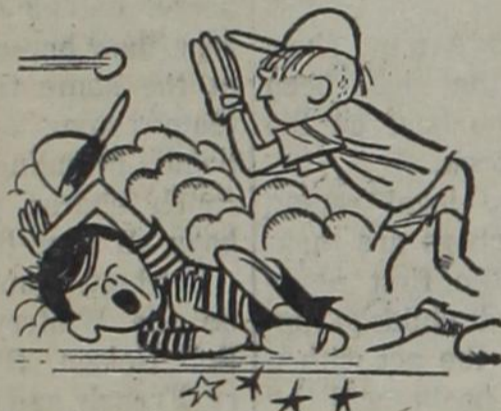
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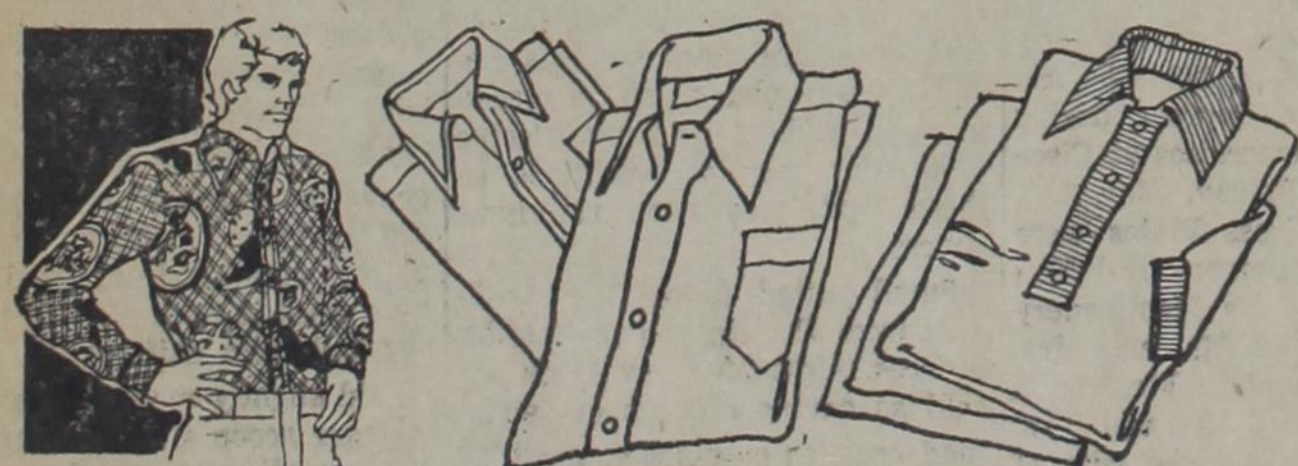
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Apply 3 Months Early For SS Retirement

If you are planning to retire in 1983, contact your local Social Security office three months in advance. Retirement age for Social Security benefits is age 62 or older. However, if you plan to receive benefits as a widow or widower retirement may be as early as age 60.

By making a telephone call you will be able to get an estimate of the amount of benefits you will receive. You will also be advised if benefits are payable to other members of your family, for example, to your spouse, a student child or a disabled child. The representative will advise you of the proofs you must furnish to perfect your claim. This will include, but may not be limited to, proof of age, earnings for the previous year, military service and, if auxiliaries will be eligible, proof of their ages and Social Security numbers.

Persons within three months of age 65 who are planning to continue working full time should also contact the local Social Security office to enroll for Medicare. It is not necessary to retire to have that coverage.

Social Security offices have services available to save your time and transportation expenses.

In most cases, the complete application procedure may be handled over the telephone without requiring a personal trip to the office. If you call in your name, Social Security number, date of birth, planned retirement date, address and telephone number, a claims representative will be able to secure an estimate and call you back in a few days. The representative will complete your application by phone and mail it for your signature and advise you what documents are needed to complete your claim.

The earnings limit for those eligible for benefits for all months of 1983 is \$6,600 for persons becoming 65 in 1983 and \$4,920 for those under age 65. If you plan to retire and do not expect to earn over those limits call the Social Security office early in the year to file your application. Since the annual earnings limit will not apply to in-

Peach Leaf Curl Hits County Trees - Agent
Peach growers in Calleshan County are having problems with a disease called Peach Leaf Curl, according to Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent at Baird. This is a fungal disease of peaches that affect leaves. Young developing leaves are characterized by puckering, thickening and curling. Diseased leaves become pale yellow to light green and are shed after a short time. The disease causes the leaf to curl up and swell. Occasionally a reddish or pink discoloration occurs. There is no control for this disease at this time of year. However, dormant sprays applied just after the leaves are shed is very satisfactory. Kocide 101 is the recommended for use to control Peach Leaf Curl, Gerngross advises.

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

In Texas politics, the legislator's vote is often quicker than the eye, and last week two controversial bills—betting on horseracing and worker's compensation insurance for farmworkers—made surprise advances.

Political observers wondered: 1) if an unseen trade-off was involved that caused the House to pass the worker's compensation bill on the same day the Senate passed the pari-mutuel wagering bill, and 2) whether either measure would live to arrive safely at the governor's desk.

An unusual coalition of urban liberals, rural conservatives and minority legislators voted together Tuesday to approve almost simultaneously the two controversial bills which had made little progress in preceding legislatures.

It may have been the slickest bit of political finesse yet this session, but the backscratching could be all for naught, at least for one of the issues. Both bills must clear the "other chamber"; one or both could be defeated as in earlier legislatures.

Horserace Betting

The Senate, in approving pari-mutuel wagering, passed the first Texas gambling bill in 50 years, and proponents were encouraged the vote would boost the bill through a stubborn House committee where it was stalled. Eight House committee members had banded together to keep the bill hostage in the 15-member Urban Affairs panel, but a single switch could send the bill sailing to a floor vote.

Under the bill's provisions, horserace betting would first have to be approved by a statewide referendum, and, clearing that ballot, interested counties would hold local-option elections on track betting. Some 14 tracks are now operating in Texas, even though

gambling is not legally allowed, and proponents argue that betting will enhance the industry. Over a quarter of a million spectators attended races which totaled over \$5 million in purses last year.

Eight per cent of the bets would go to the state (five per cent for welfare children and three per cent to water development), five per cent would go to the track and five per cent for prize money. The remainder would be shared by bettors, and proponents say that is not enough. The water amendment, which was attached at the insistence of Sen. John Montford of Lubbock in return for his vote, may be removed in House action, and Montford's trade-off may be for naught.

Farmworker's Comp.

The farmworker's bill would make about 45 per cent of Texas' agriculture workers eligible for disability under the Workers' Compensation Act. Only farms and ranches that employ at least 12 persons, or which have an annual payroll of \$50,000 are included.

The House initially rejected the bill, but passed it over the objections of rural legislators' arguments after a coalition of Republican, urban conservatives and minority legislators lobbied the bill.

Although the bill is aimed at large growers and not family farmers, observers wonder whether it will pass the Senate where only 11 rural votes are needed to block passage.

The Senate

Slipping through a preliminary vote that same day was another controversial farmworker issue, the "short-handle hoe" bill. Last session the ban on hoes with handles shorter than four feet was passed, largely to protect migrant workers who complained of back injuries. Some growers countered by giving the workers other tools with short handles that weren't covered in the short hoe bill, and the bill which passed second reading last week attempts to close the loophole.

Also in the Senate last week:

—The Senate meeting as a committee approved minor changes in the congressional redistricting plan, taking a small part of Dallas County from Democrat-turned-Republican Phil Gramm's district and replacing it with a part of Fort Worth. Gramm had complained his district was being sabotaged, but that effort is expected to come next week, if at all.

—A Senate committee passed a series of water bills, including three proposed constitutional amendments, which would address the water needs of every area of the state. One amendment would guarantee loans for farm water conservation in irrigation.

The House

Last week in the House:

—Approved a brucellosis measure to prevent a federal quarantine on Texas cattle by giving the Texas Animal Health Commission authority to adopt new rules to conform with the federal program. Most major farm and ranch groups supported the bill, with the Independent Cattlemen's Association opposing.

—Passed legislation allowing local school districts to require passage of a basic skills test prior to graduation.

—Passed a bill limiting elections to four dates a year. Urban areas experienced as many as 12 to 70 elections last year costing taxpayers millions of dollars.

Texas Republicans New Texas Republican Party chairman Gerge Strake plans to use everything from ghetto recruitment centers to organized letter-writing campaigns to bring the GOP back in '84.

Strake said the first two priorities were re-electing President Ronald Reagan and U. S. Sen. John Tower, then going after "every winnable race right down to justice of the peace."

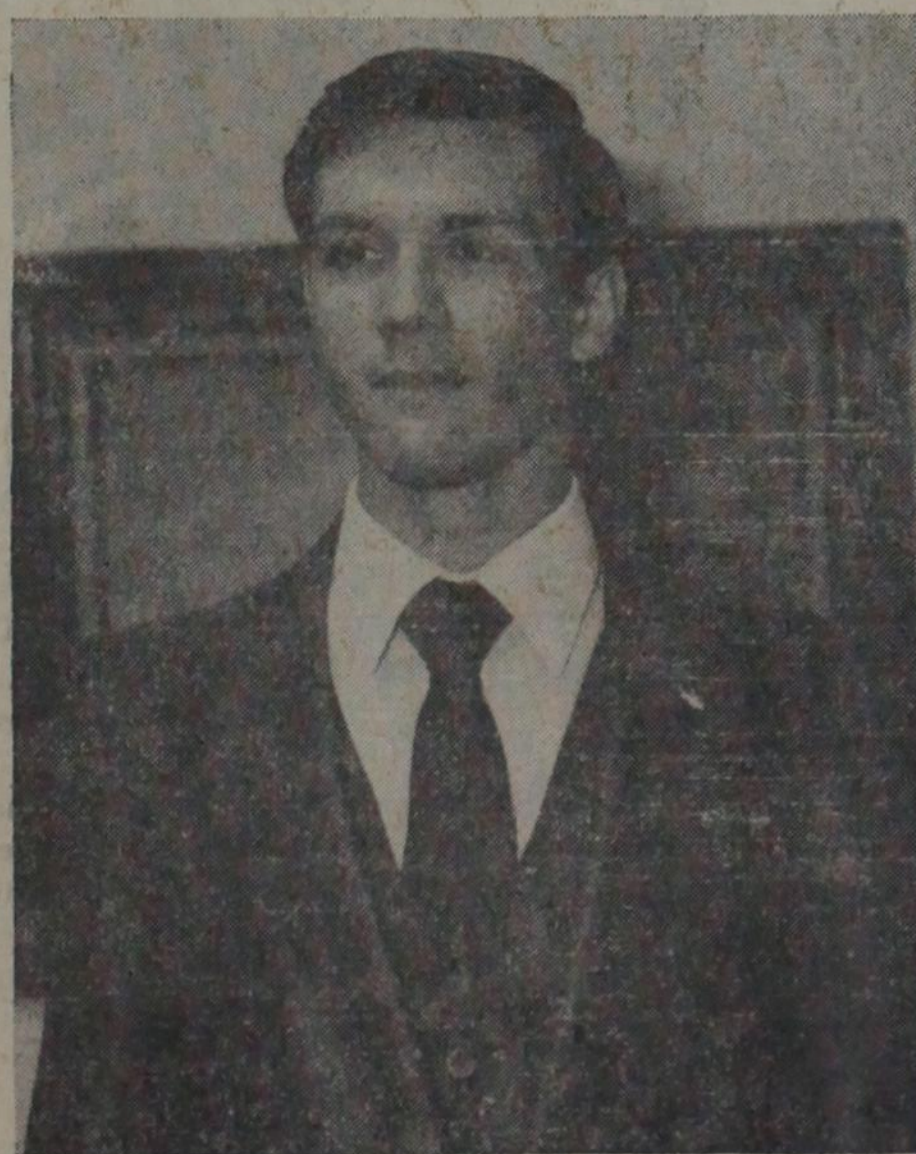

opening, obtain contrast from varied shapes and colors. Avoid overcrowding or pressing plants against the glass.

Using ice tongs for prickly cacti, plant the largest first, working forward with smaller, more rounded or sprawling material.

Fill in gaps with pebble patches or lichen, completing the scene with stones or bits of weathered wood.

Most cactus like a sunny window, the spiny kinds being more tolerant than those with smooth stems. Cooler morning light is preferable to hot afternoon sun with shading advised during the summer months.

Unlike covered terrariums, open cactus bowls are not self contained and must be watered. The amount and frequency demanded by these moisture retentive plants depend on rest temperature and weather; however, a tablespoonful of water directed to the base of each plant once or twice weekly will usually suffice during the growing season. Water less during cloudy, humid spells, increasing the amount if plants begin to wrinkle.

Feeding is optional, lightly applied in soluble low nitrogen form when plants make their new spring growth.

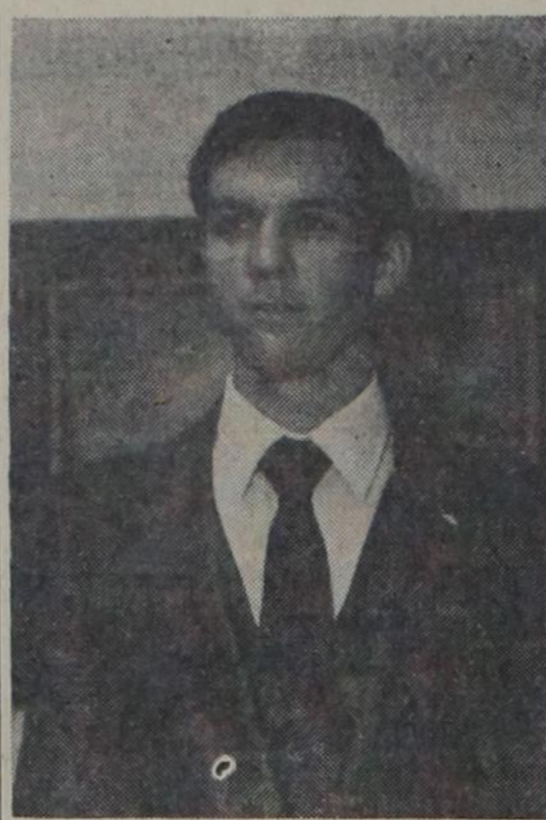
