

Cats Rebound To Win Title Of Little League Tourney

Cats of Cross Plains dropped the first game, then bounced back to win six consecutive contests to claim the championship of the eight-team, two-city Little League tournament held here last week end.

Runner-up in the meet between the four Cross Plains teams and four Rising Star squads was Rising Star's Rangers. Taking third place was the Astros of Rising Star. Trophies were presented to the first three place teams of the tournament held at the Little League park here Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

First round games, swept by Rising Star teams, were played Thursday beginning with Rising Star's Astros edging Cross Plains' Kilowatts 11-10 in five innings.

Rising Star's A's beat Cross Plains Buffs 4-1 in second game, and Rising Star Chiefs nipped

Cross Plains Cats 2-1 in a six-inning third game. Cats got their run in bottom of second on back-to-back doubles by Darren Apple and Chuckie Weiss. Chiefs countered with a pair of tallies in top of the third with two away on consecutive doubles and a single by Jerry Long, Mark Pittman and Chad Kilgo. Visiting Rangers bopped the host Blue Jays 10-5 in a three-frame finale.

Friday the Rangers thumped the Chiefs 9-2, and the Astros dumped the A's 9-4. Cats eliminated the Blue Jays in a narrow 6-5 decision by rallying for two runs in the fifth, and Buffs sent the Kilowatts packing 15-2 in a four-inning affair.

In a full day's action Saturday, Buffs of Cross Plains eliminated the Rising Star A's with a 7-5 verdict in the tilt which began at 10:30 a.m.

Cats turned the tables on the

Chiefs in a 1 p.m. game by deciding the Rising Star team by an 8-3 score Chiefs had beaten Cats Thursday.

Immediately following the Rangers handed the Astros first loss of the tourney 6-1, moving into the finals with the victory.

Cats and Buffs squared off at 4 p.m., and Cats sent the other Cross Plains team to the showers a 6-1 count with two runs in the first and four in the fourth inning. Troy Harris tallied the Buffs lone run in the fourth.

Cats then took on the Astros at 5:30, changing dugouts in moving to the visitors' side. Cats whipped the Astros handily 16-4.

Cats played their third consecutive game against the Rangers of Rising Star, heretofore unbeaten. After moving back to the home team dugout, Cats ruffed up the Rangers 21-5.

After the victory, another game was required as both the Cats and Rangers had one loss. Moving back to the visitors' side again, the Cats began their fifth game of the day fourth in succession. Cats gained the upper hand in the second inning by tallying four runs and posting an eventual 11-4 triumph to claim the championship

Normal Year Grain Harvest Near End

Harvest of small grain in the Cross Plains sector is in the latter stages, and estimated 75 per cent complete.

One observer said Tuesday afternoon that another two or three days of good weather, and the harvest will be over.

An average year, as most producers are finding, it is better

than that of 1980, but not of the proportions as was hoped and expected earlier this year. Seemingly an average yield is about 20 bushels per acre this year. Grade also has suffered this year with vast majority of the local wheat grading number 2 and 3.

Apparently the greenbug did more damage than was believed to most fields, and late rains hurt quality and yields when the wet stalks fell. Better harvesting weather the past week has hastened the harvest's completion, as most combines in this area could start early and work long hours. Dews a couple of mornings did, however, slow early morning combining.

The market has been steady the past several days with number one wheat going for \$3.70 on Tuesday.

An estimated 15-18 million pounds of wheat will be marketed in Cross Plains, it is expected. A portion of the grain had been contracted, while much of it was being sold at the market price.

Although the wheat harvest is not a bumper crop as it was once thought, it is a boost for the local economy.

Extension Service Gives Tips For Food Canning

With gardens flourishing, many consumers are attempting food preservation at home to save on food costs. While home canning may look simple, every detail requires careful attention.

If you do choose to can some vegetables, the Food Quality and Safety Committee of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, offers these important points:

Before starting, contact your local county Extension Office for the latest information.

Use only high quality produce for best results.

Be sure to have the pressure gauge on your pressure cooker checked. Your local county Extension Office usually has the equipment to provide this service.

Also check gaskets and seals on your pressure cooker.

Follow directions to every detail; do not use your own times or pressures.

All low-acid foods such as green beans, corn and potatoes must be processed in a pressure canner. Water bath methods are not adequate for proper preservation of low-acid foods. Firm, fresh tomatoes which are not overripe may be processed in a water bath.

Use only approved canning techniques; processing in a microwave oven or conventional oven is not an approved method.

Use only standard canning

jars with lids and rings; old mayonnaise or peanut butter jars are not designed for home canning.

Do not reuse lids.
Do not use jars that are chipped or cracked.

Do not overfill jars as this can cause a faulty seal.

Be sure tops of jars are wiped clean before sealing.
Avoid sudden pressure drops; wait until the pressure gauge is at zero before opening the lid.

Be sure to allow for processing adjustments for those elevations over 1,000 feet; charts are available in canning guides.

Avoid placing jars directly from the pressure canner onto cool surfaces; it's best to cool jars by placing them on a rack.

Be sure to check all lids for a depression which indicates a good seal; products in jars without a good seal may be eaten immediately but should not be stored for later use.

Back Checks Limited In Late S.S. Filing

People who delay applying for social security retirement or survivor benefits for some time after they become eligible may be affected by a change in the law which took effect March 1, Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

Under the new law, back payments can be made only for up to 6 months before the month of application. Under the old law, back checks could be received for up to 12 months before the month of application.

The change generally applies to retired workers over 65 and their dependents, and to widows, widowers, and dependent parents of deceased workers who are themselves over 62.

People who apply for reduced benefits — retired workers and their dependents under 65 and widows and widowers under 62 — cannot generally get benefits for months before the month of application. This part of the law was not changed.

People who apply for benefits because they are disabled — workers, adult children, widows and widowers — are not affected by the new law. They can still get benefits for up to 12 months before the month they apply if they are found eligible.

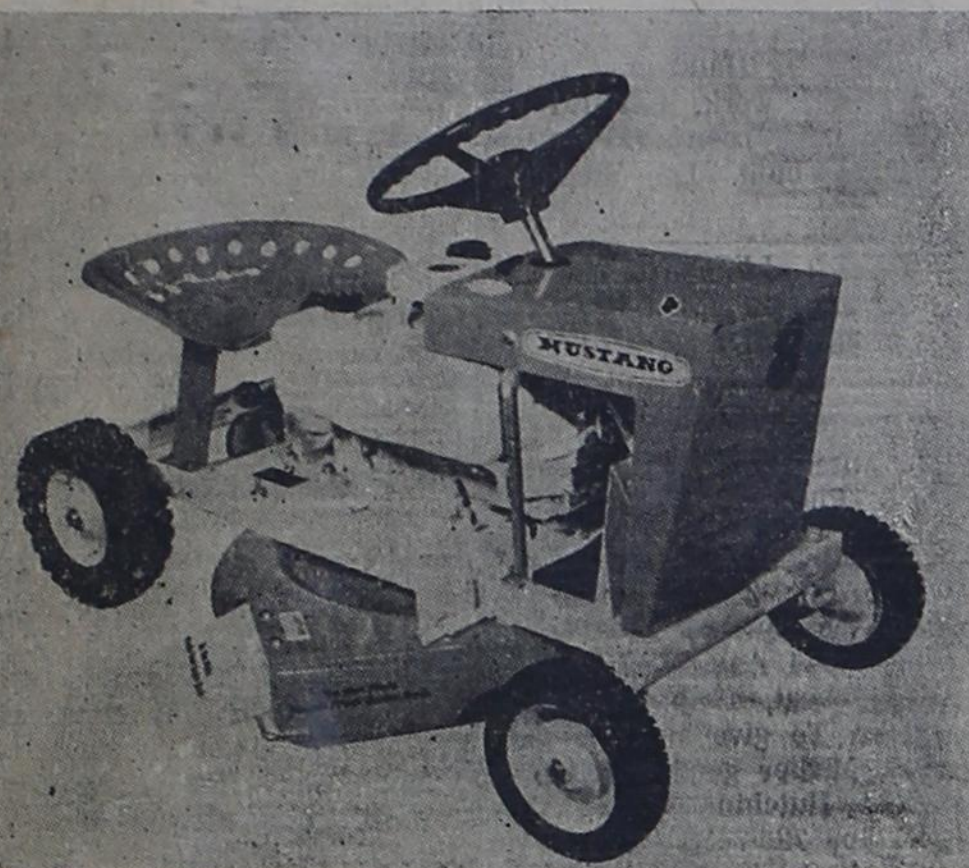
