Use only high quality produce for best results.

-Be sure to have the pressure gauge on your pressure cooker checked. Your local county Extension Office usually has the equipment to provide this service.

-Also check gaskets and seals on your pressure cooker. -Follow directions to every

detail; do not use your own times or pressures.

-All low-acid foods such as green beans, corn and potatoes must be processed in a pressure canner. Water bath R. E. EDINGTON SUFFERS methods are not adequate for proper preservation of low-acid foods. Firm, fresh tomatoes which are not overripe may be processed in a water bath.
