Next Monday is July 4, Independence Day, and everyone will be celebrating the mid-summer holiday, the birthday of the country, in some form or fashion. Parades, cook-outs, baseball games, the swimming pool and picnics are some ways in which to make the heliday fun. On September 13, 1814, Franfleet in Chesapeake Bay to secure the release of Dr. William Beanes, who had been captured after the burning of Washington, D. C. 




