Parade Set Friday Before Settlers Reune Saturday

Cross Plains will be busy this week end hosting a two-performance junior rodeo and the 42nd Annual Callahan County Pioneer Association Reunion.

The rodeo is set for Friday and Saturday night, and the reunion is planned for Saturday, Aug. 13, at city park.

First activity will be a parade down Main Street at 6 p.m. Friday. The procession will form at the school on North Main and proceed southward on Main to traffic light. Sponsored by the Cross Plains Roping Club entries will be accepted and are welcomed through Thursday by calling Miss Charlotte Brown at 725-6545.

All parade entries must be at the school by 5:30 p.m. with exception of bicycles and small motorized vehicles which should be there at 5:15 to get numbers. Prizes will include ribbons and prize money of \$10, \$5 and \$5 for the first through third respectively, in like division.

A junior rodeo is planned both Friday and Saturday night. Saturday the daylight hours will belong to Callahan County old settlers, who will gather in 42 reunion under the large liveoak trees at Treadaway Park.

At 1 o'clock Knox Waggoner of Cottonwood will introduce guests, and Scott will give a history of the county. Waggoner will then lead a silent tribute to deceased pioneers. The days activities will end with square dancers and a dance contest.

'84 USDA Wheat Program Options Are Announced

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has announced options for the 1984 wheat program, pending program legislation presently under consideration by the Congress.

Block listed general guidelines for next year's program on July 1 which permitted farmers to make preliminary planting decisions and financial commitments for their crop, while the Congress continued deliberations on target price freeze proposals.

"Since legislative action on the proposed target price freeze is now before the U. S. Senate, it is up to Congress to decide which option they want to choose," Block said. "It is important to get this issue resolved in order to assist farmers in making their management decisions."

He listed the following 1984 wheat program options:

—If new legislation freezes the target price at \$4.30 per bushel, the acreage reduction requirement will be 25 percent and there will be a payment-in-kind program of 10 to 25 percent for farmers who divert additional land. The payment will be 80 percent of the program yield.

—If Congress does not freeze target prices and the target price automatically escalates to \$4.45 per bushel, the acreage reduction requirement will be 30 percent and there will be a payment-in-kind program of 10 to 20 percent for farmers who divert additional land. The payment-in-kind compensation will be 75 percent of the program yield.

Producers participating in the payment-in-kind program and having both reserve and regular loan grain would be required to make their reserve grain available for PIK. Those farmers who have neither will be eligible for participation in the payment-in-kind program by volunteering to harvest for payment-in-kind.

In addition: —Land taken out of production

must be devoted to a conservation use. This land must be acreage that would have been devoted to small grains or row crops in 1984.

—The national average loan and purchase rate will be 3.30 per bushel. The Food and Agriculture Act of 1981 permits the loan rate to be set at this level since the season's average price for the 1983 crop is expected to be less than 105 percent of current loan rate.

Block said the current loan rate is above market clearing levels and places U. S. producers at a competitive disadvantage in world markets. "This reduction will begin to restore competitiveness in world markets and send a signal to our export competitors that we will no longer maintain a 'high price umbrella' which allows them to undercut us in the world market," Block said.

Jay Don Poindexter was second high overall individual in both trap and skeet. Other senior team members were Randy Chrane and Steve Ellis.

The junior two-man team placed second. Team members were John Ball and Britt Gardner. These 4-H'ers along with coaches, Terry Ellis and Gary Chrane, were to participate in the State 4-H Trap and Skeet Shoot at San Antonio on August 4-6.

With summer vacation almost over, the children of the area will be wanting to get in as much fun and pleasure as the next two weeks will allow. Each have their own idea of fun, but most likely swimming will be what a lot of them will want to do. While glancing through a Jack and Jill magazine for children I came across an article "Swimming Safety: Simple As ABC."

The first rule of safety is "Know your abilities and limitations. You shouldn't think you can do more than you really can, and you shouldn't swim too soon after eating or when you are tired or overheated. The second rule is to use "The Buddy System". You should always swim with someone else. If one of you gets in trouble, the other can help. The condition of the water is the next safety tip. Whether in a pool, a lake or at the ocean, you should think about where you are swimming. Is it shallow or deep? Is the bottom smooth or rough or snaggy. The last is "Don't roughhouse or fake it". You shouldn't play rough games, such as dunking others, running around a pool or throwing sharp or heavy objects. Never pretend you are in trouble and make a fake call for help. You might cause another swimmer nearby to panic and get hurt. If you fake trouble just once the lifeguard would never again really be sure if you needed help.

I prefer our girls swimming where there is a lifeguard, but you can make his or her job much more pleasant and easier by following these rules.

The article suggests remembering them this way. "Know your ABC's and don't roughhouse or fake it. Ability of yourself, Buddy System, Condition of water and Don't roughhouse or fake it."

- Pig Cake
- Butter or yellow cake mix
- 1 can mandarin oranges
- ½ cup oil
- 4 eggs
- small package instant vanilla pudding
- 8 ounce carton whipped topping
- 1 cup nuts
- 1 cup coconut
- 1 can crushed pineapple
- 1 cup sugar

Prepare cake according to directions, substituting liquid from oranges and pineapple. Add oranges, oil, eggs and pudding mix. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes. Top cake with mixture of whipped topping, pineapple, nuts, coconut and sugar. Cover with foil, refrigerate and serve the following day. Keep in refrigerator.

Conservation Tillage Slowly Winning Soil Erosion War

"Soil erosion by wind and water is a natural geologic process that has shaped our mountains, valleys, and other features of our landscape," according to Jim Boykin, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Baird. Modern farming methods have greatly speeded up this erosion process to the point where it is recognized as a serious threat to our economic well-being through loss of our productive agricultural capacity.

"The rate at which soils erode depends on soil type, slope, amount of runoff, and many other factors. Ironically reducing erosion on cropland may be relatively simple, Boykin said. By leaving crop residues on the soil surface and current crops are planted into them. In its purest form, no-till, agronomists describe it as a practice in which farmers plant crops without plowing or cultivating the soil.

"Even though special equip-

ment and modified planting techniques are used, the practice has been around for nearly 30 years and can be fitted to many operations," Boykin said.

Conservation tillage is not the total solution to erosion problems, but researchers agree that using one of the various forms of this method reduces erosion significantly when compared to conventional tillage.

About five tons per acre per year is considered to be a tolerable soil on deep soils. Many farms in Texas have annual soil losses greater than this, which will take centuries to replace. In fact, the SCS has estimated that wind and water have damaged 50 million acres of Americas best cropland so badly that it is no longer useful for crop production. Another 100 million acres has been severely damaged.

Conservation tillage is gaining ground yearly. Many predict acreage planted under conservation

tillage systems will exceed conventionally planted crops in the near future.

Showers Net City .55 Inches Of Rainfall

Light showers Sunday and Monday have netted the city .55 of an inch of moisture, slightly cooling hot temperatures of the day and dampening parching lawns, flowers and gardens.

The .55 of an inch of rain is the first measurable recorded in August, and added to the year's aggregate brings to 16.50 inches at noon Tuesday.

Showers have fallen over the general area the past few days on a hit and miss proposition, yielding varying amounts of rainfall.

Cash crops are hurting in many places in this area, as is pastures and stock water reserves.

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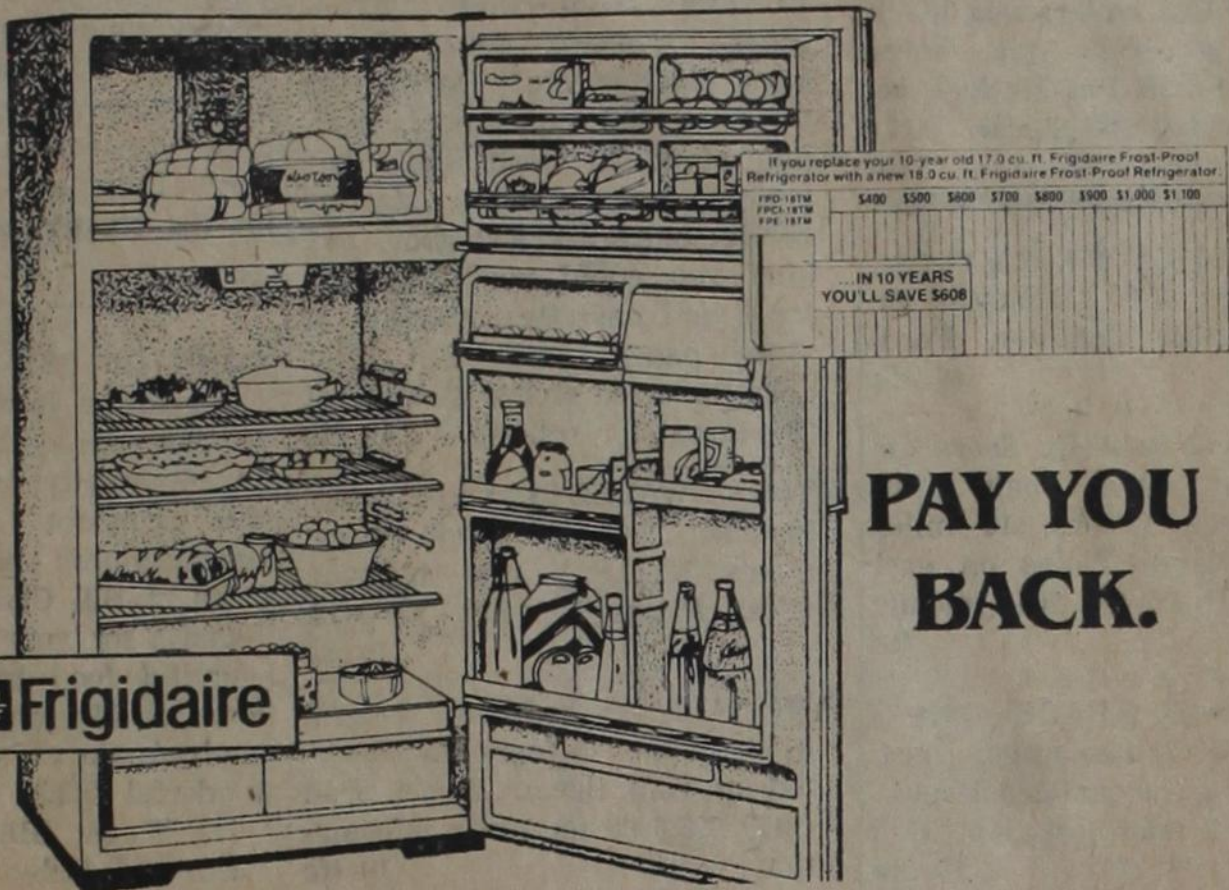

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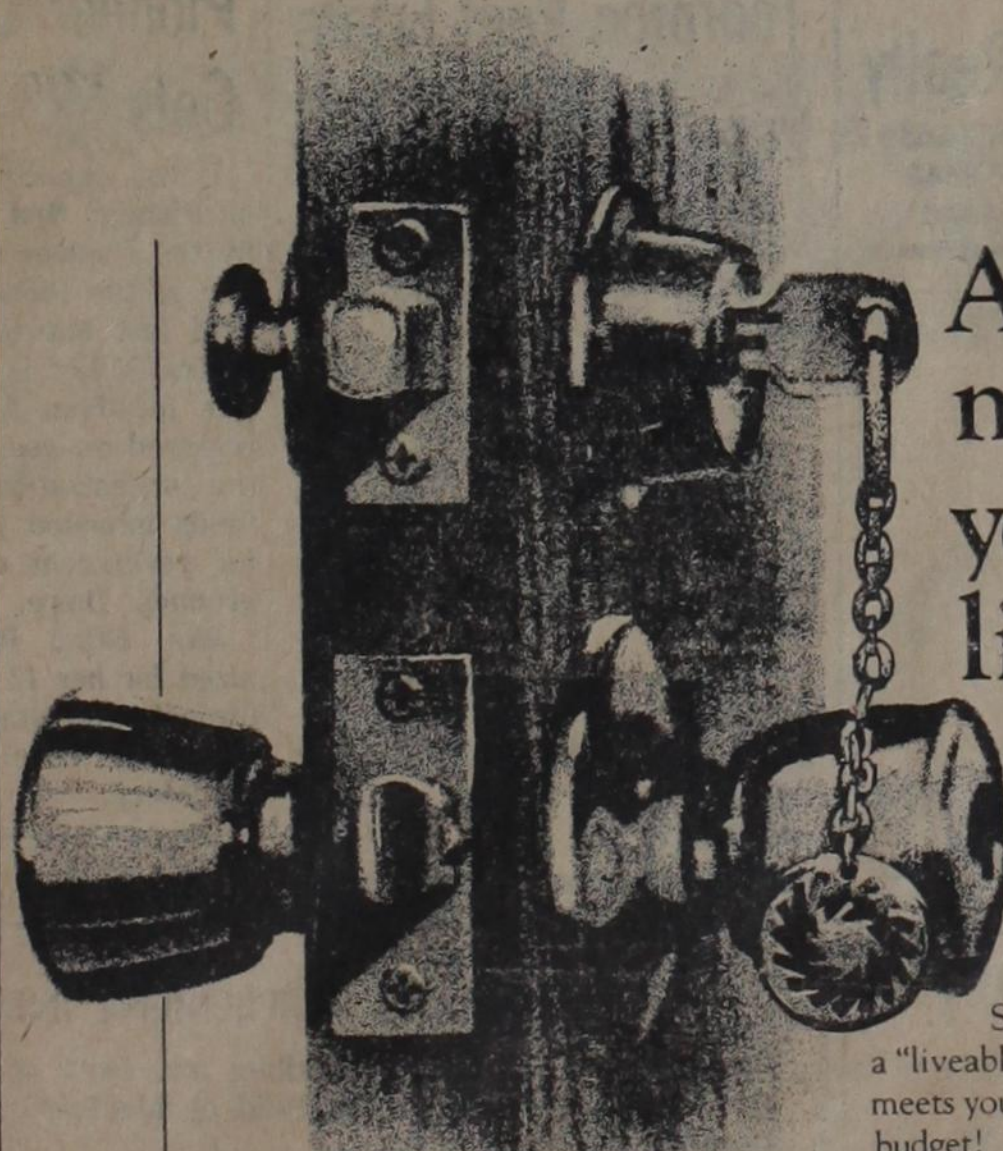
