Cross Plains Mighty Mites scored three first half touchdowns and coasted to a 34-6 football victory over host Blanket Junior High School last Thursday.

The triumph was the second straight for the local junior high school gridders in as many outings. Coaches Mack McConal and David Kautz stated that all the Mites did an outstanding job. Athletic Director McConal said, "They played their hearts out."

Mighty Mites covered about 60 yards in four plays en route to the first touchdown. Flanker Lance Clawson scooted the final 20 yards on a reverse. End Paul Davis tallied the two-point conversion on an end around play.

The second Cross Plains touchdown came on a 15-yard pass from quarterback Devin Koenig to Davis. Koenig then added the two points on a quarterback sneak making the scoreboard read 16-0 favoring the Mites. Arthur Agnew put the locals in scoring position with a 50-yard return on a Blanket punt.

End Tony Evans scored the third six-pointer for the Mites on a 15-yard end around. Back Bryan Brown tacked on the two-point conversion for a 24-0 advantage.

McConal and Kautz said that they are pleased with the way the boys are working and with the team's attitude. They also expressed appreciation to local supporters. "We thank our loyal fans," they stated. "We had a large following at Blanket," he stated.

Timely Gardening Tips By Local Garden Club

Fall gardening is in full swing. Insects will not be the problem they were in spring and summer. The fall garden could include beets, spinach, cauliflower, turnips, mustard and collards, carrots and radishes.

Start harvesting sweet potatoes when vines begin to yellow. Cure for a week or so at 80 degrees Fahrenheit. Store at a cooler 60 degrees Fahrenheit all winter.

Cut asparagus back to the ground when they turn brown and cover with a layer of mulch. Add some manure to the mulch to increase next year's yield.

Dig up your gladiolus corms and caladium bulbs when the foliage begins to brown. Store over the winter in a cool place in dry sand or old stockings — do not freeze.

This is a good month for moving, dividing and re-setting perennials, including day lilies, iris and amaryllis.

Next month begins the season for transplanting fruit and nut trees. Prepare the sites now — high, friable soil that is well drained and in a location that will receive ample sunlight.

Murder Trial Slated Oct. 13 At Baird

David Nichols, 28, of Abilene is scheduled to go on trial for murder October 13 in 42nd District Court in Baird.

Nichols, who was indicted earlier this month for the stabbing death of Geneva Louise Green, 37, of Euleus on July 3, entered a non-guilty plea in proceedings last Thursday at Baird. James Paul Shanks, Baird attorney and former Callahan County Attorney, has been appointed to represent Nichols.

Present Callahan County Attorney Bob McCool will prosecute the case.

Mrs. Green was stabbed while in the women's room at a rest stop on Interstate 20. Mrs. Green collapsed and died near the parking lot after stumbling out of the restroom.

Nichols was charged with the murder after he was arrested in California for allegedly attempting to murder a female hitchhiker there by stabbing her more than 20 times.

At the time, Nichols was driving a vehicle that matched the description of the one seen leaving the scene of Mrs. Green's murder. He later waived extradition to Texas after local authorities filed murder charges here.

Nichols has been absent without leave from the U. S. Naval Reserve Center in Abilene since July 23.

Cats Thump Buffs 28-6; Robert Lee Comes Friday

Rising Star Wildcats broke a three-year loss skein in Buffalo Stadium Friday night by handing the Cross Plains Buffaloes a 28-6 defeat.

The loss, the Herd's third in as many outings this young season, halted a three-year win string over the Wildcats by the Bisons.

Buff Head Coach Ed Higgins said that Rising Star outmuscled the Herd, noting that Coach Dewaine Finely has done a good job with the Wildcats. He continued, "We opened holes, but Rising Star closed them quickly."

With just a few seconds gone in the second quarter Wildcat Fullback Thad Chambers culminated a drive with a four-yard run over the left side for first touchdown. Chambers then added the seventh point with a true kick from placement.

The Wildcat fullback teamed with Tailback Jon Vaughn to ring up three more touchdowns to bury the Buffaloes. Chambers added the bonus point with a placement kick after each tally.

Cross Plains cut the deficit to 14-6 early in the final stanza when Quarterback Richard Clark found Flanker Dennis Koenig in end

zone with a 9-yard pass. A fake kick from placement play failed on the two-point conversion attempt.

Wildcats quickly rang up another seven points, and in the latter stages of the game Wildcat Vaughn grabbed a Buffalo fumble in the air and raced about 60 yards for the final score.

Coach Higgins said the Bisons are working hard, and we are going to keep working. "I made a couple of bad calls which added to our problems," the mentor said. He continued, "We are going to make some changes."

No Buffaloes were hurt in the contest Friday, and barring practice injuries should be near 100 per cent physically ready for the Robert Lee Steers who will be here Friday. Game time is 8 p.m. of the non-conference affair.

Friday's visitors, who fell to the Herd 6-0 in first meeting of the two schools last year, are members of District 3-A, and were rated a third place finish in the seven-team league in pre-season evaluations. Local reports on the Steers indicate a quick team, with overall size of 165 pounds with some speed and power. They are very competitive," said Coach Higgins, and run the same defense as Rising Star.

They could have been days measured by hours or by thousands or even millions of years. "A day is as a thousand years with God." 2 Peter 3:8. Genesis does not stress time or manner of creation; only the certainty that all the universe and man himself is the creative work of God. It is He that has made us and not we ourselves . . . Ps. 100:3.

In verses 1 and 2 we have the work of creation in epitome (a brief statement) and in embryo. In epitome: that God is the maker v. 1 . . . in embryo v. 2; from chaos, darkness, void, to God, is moving. When God moves something is done and so we are led to read on.

Then the various working and moving of God in His creation and fixing of all order on earth preparatory to creating man . . . Chapter 1, 26 and 27.

The thing that may arouse our deepest interest is the making of man in His image or likeness; we must ask, what is God's image? that we may know just what we would be like if indeed, we are the image of God. . . . This is another exhaustive study for we must first know God and His characteristics. A study of the whole Bible is required here.

To say the least, in God's image, man has a conformity of all his natural powers to the whole will of God. He has the ability to see divine things clearly . . . (though man is not divine, but he is endowed . . .). Man's will complying to God's will completely. Thus was man made for the Garden of Eden. Only God, a

grace through the sacrifice of His Son on the cross, is our hope, since the fall." How art thou fallen, O son of the morning!" Isa. 14:12.

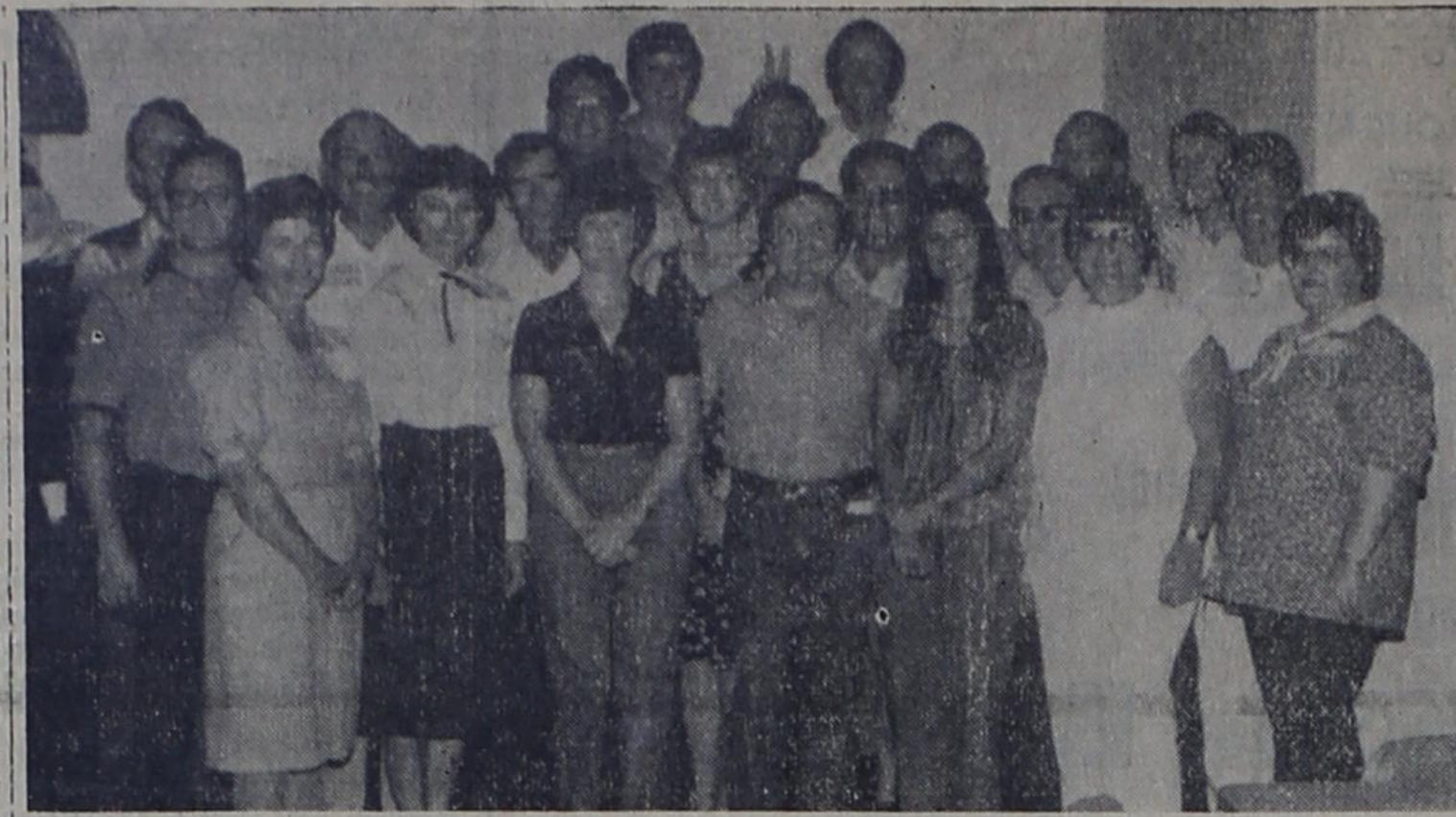

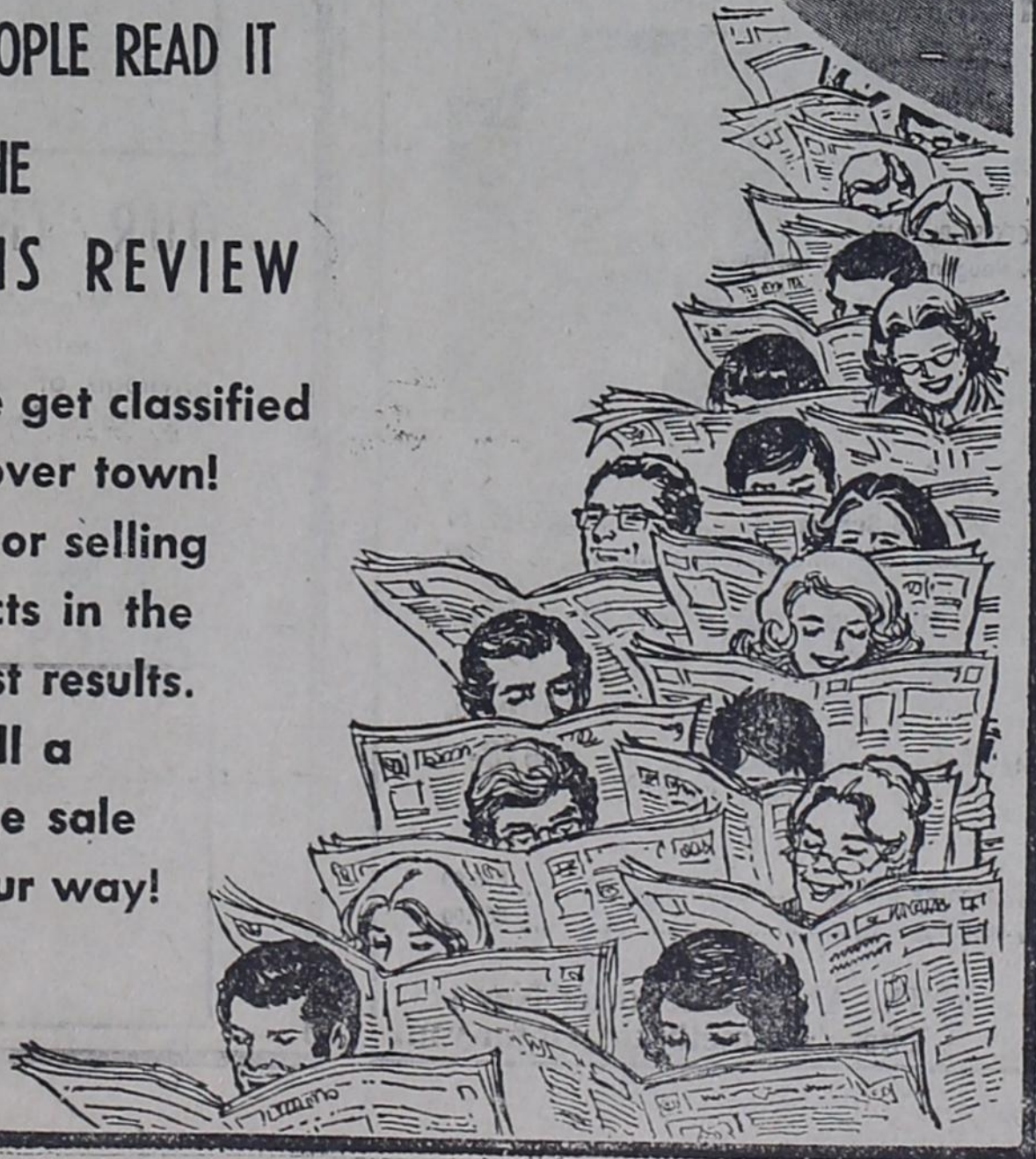
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Funeral Friday For Mrs. Gene Rhodes
