

## 2 Trustees Ask Return To School Board Seats

Two incumbent members of the Cross Plains ISD Board of Trustees have filed for re-election to that body in the election set for Saturday, April 7.

Don Harris and Reggy Stover both filed last week for the places on the school board they now hold. Their three-year terms will expire in April. No other candidates had announced as of Monday afternoon late.

No other hopefuls had filed for Cross Plains City Council by late Monday. Both incumbents, Ted McKeehan and Ray Purvis, filed for re-election to the two-year terms they now hold which will expire in April.

No competition in either of the two races has developed and as yet there is no candidate for Mayor of Cross Plains. O. B. Edmondson is presently filling that post, and he has not yet made his intentions public.

of the superintendent in the high school building. Aspirants for a city office may file with City Secretary, Debbie Gosnell at the City Office. Candidates are asked to please file during regular business hours, although the deadline for filing is midnight Wednesday, March 7.

# Cody Odom Exhibits Top Steer At 'Best' County Junior Show

Cody Odom of Cross Plains showed his 1,330-pound Limousin steer to the grand championship of the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show held here Friday and Saturday.

It was reported that Judge Jack Lacy of Lampasas made selection of the Odom Steer from a "tremendous field of more than 30 head of market steers".

Reserve Grand Champion steer was exhibited by Brian Coots of Clyde. It was a black Chianian/Angus cross and was runner-up to the Odom animal in the heavy weight classification of European Crossbreeds. It weighed 1,325 pounds. It finished just third in the Clyde show held three weeks ago. The Clyde FFA student said, however, he had worked with him a lot since then. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Coots.

Odom, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Odom of this city, had the runner-up in the 1983 show and the champion in the 1982 exhibit. He stated that this animal might be a little better than either of the other two winners he has shown at the county show.

The grand champion sold for \$4,000 to KLIH Oil Company of Cross Plains at the premium auction held Saturday afternoon of the two-day county show. It was reported that the animal earned an additional \$1,350 in premium's "tacked on" by patrons from ringside" during the sale. The \$4,000 was said to be a record price for the top steer.

Lacy also judged the beef heifers beginning at 8:30 a.m. Saturday. Crystal Watson, who showed an older English heifer, claimed the championship. The second place finisher was from European Cross Heifers, exhibited by Vance Ison, Clyde FFA.

Kim Merrill had the only entry in the dairy cattle division, a dairy cow.

Judging 207 lambs in this sheep show was Allen Turner of Ballinger. He judged the grand champion lamb that which was showed by Stephanie Walker of Cross Plains 4-H and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Randy Walker of this city. Her animal was the first place finisher in the heavy weight class of the medium wool division. I sold at auction to KLIH Oil Company for \$1,025.

Reserve champion lamb was exhibited by Traci Milliron, Oplin 4-H and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Milliron. Her animal was tops in the medium weight, medium wool category.

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

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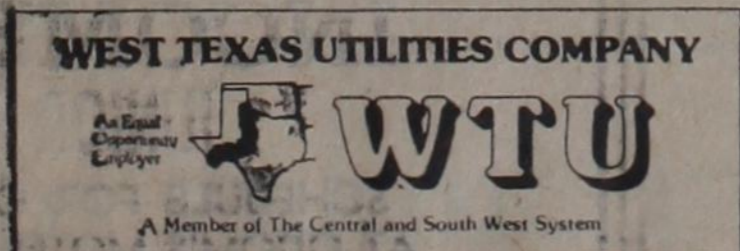

## Parental Responsibility Key To Pupil Achieving

**Editor's Note:** The following letter to the editor was sent to the Review by Cornelius "Cornie" Elliott, member of the CPHS Class of '38. The note was printed by the Dallas Times Herald and was offered by Jeanne S. Guerra of Dallas. Elliott said that if he were a superintendent, he would send a copy home to every mother and father, which he knows would get him fired. He adds, "I pray all parents will accept their responsibilities as their mother and dad did." The item follows.

As an employee of DISD and a former teacher of minority students, I take exception to the statements of Pettis Norman, Barbara Record, Margaret Pitts and Kathryn Gillman concerning the mistreatment of black students.

Every class that I taught or observed, all students were given the same amount of fairness, counseling and education. Each student was treated as an individual — not as a black individual, a brown individual, or a white individual.

In four years, I taught many achieving students of all races and I also tried to teach many non-achieving students of all races. Without exception, those students who did achieve were from families where the parents or parent cared enough about the education of the child to impress upon him or her that the key to success is learning.

They taught their children to behave in class, to respect the authority of the teacher and to respect the rights of others in the classroom.

When children are not achieving at grade level, parents should ask themselves these questions:

When is the last time I took my child to the public library? When is the last time I read aloud to my child? When is the last time I helped him with his homework or checked to see that he was prepared for the next day's class?

Do I know the names of his teachers? Do I know what he is studying this week? When is the last time he saw me read-

ing for enjoyment? Do I allow my child to watch more than one hour of television on school night?

When is the last time that I attended an Open House or called the teacher to check on the progress of my child?

Special programs should be provided for any student who has a true learning disability, but not for those students whose only disability is that their parents have failed in their responsibilities of teaching the value of learning. Give teachers and administrators back the respect that most of them deserve and the authority to teach their subjects and stop expecting them to do the job of parenting.

The teacher is there to bring knowledge and excitement of learning to the child, and the parent is there to show them how to become a responsible, successful citizen.

Only when parents again accept their responsibilities of parenting and ask the teacher to teach the subject will our education system be able to turn out success after success. When this happens, we all gain.

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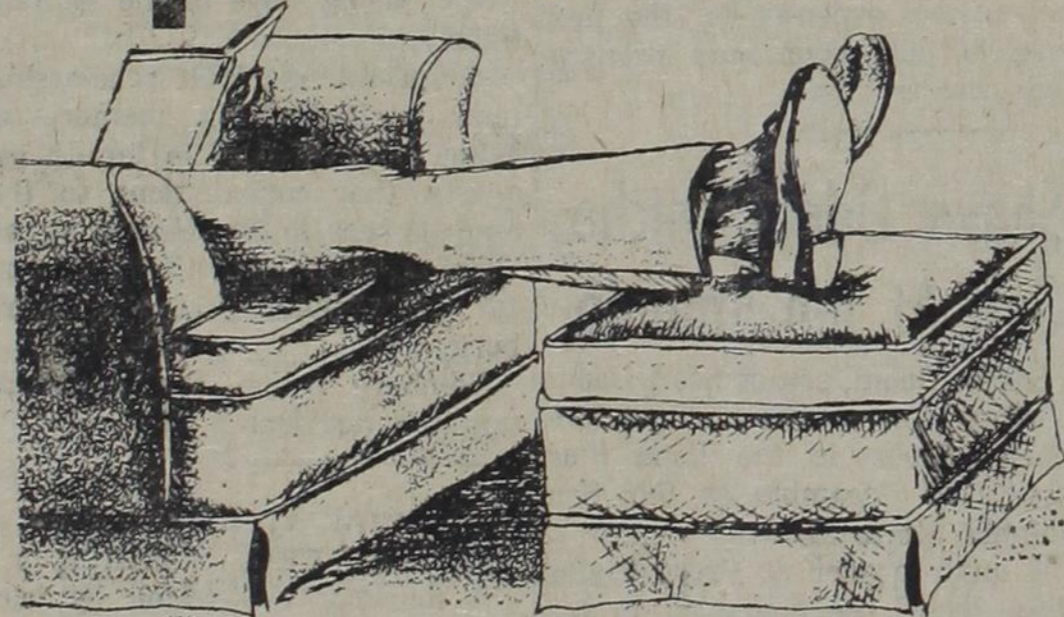

## State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

By Lyndell Williams

AUSTIN — Texas is searching for a new director of the Texas Department of Corrections following the departure a few days ago of W. J. Estelle, Jr.

Estelle took the post 12 years ago, heralded as one of the finest penologists in the nation. He left with numerous prison system

audits and investigations of corruption underway.

While no one has charged Estelle with a criminal offense, his administration and its recent history of construction cost overruns and other expenditures has been under close scrutiny by the Texas Legislature.

Last week, the prison system reported that the cost of maintaining state prisoners has increased over 275 percent during the past decade. That same report incidentally found that 27 percent of the prisoners are from Houston and 26 percent from Dallas; 44 percent are black, 37 percent are white and 19 percent are Hispanic.

According to one Board of Corrections member, Estelle's taking actions and spending money without board approval got him into hot water he couldn't survive.

In 1979 the Legislature appropriated \$300 million for emergency prison construction to be managed by Estelle and other TDC officials. Critics charge he mismanaged those funds and other revenues, by arbitrarily awarding sweeping merit raises and hazardous pay to clerical white-collar workers.

In stepping down, Estelle made no statement in defense of the criticism. Board members will attempt to replace him in the next three months.

### Texas House

The leadership in the Texas House of Representatives will be different next session. At least

33 standing committee chairmen are not going to run for reelection. Some are going into the private sector; others, like Tom DeLay of Fort Bend County running for Congress, are seeking higher office.

The vacancies will allow Speaker Gib Lewis to choose a good many new lieutenants as about 30 of 150 incumbents are estimated to voluntarily step down.

### No Tax Bill?

Some observers believe that one factor influencing the decision not to return is the threat of a special session to raise taxes that Gov. Mark White wants to call before the summer ends.

Many legislators do not want to be forced to vote on a tax hike just prior to either the primary or general election. By cutting it quits, they can serve until January 1985 with no such pressure.

But the en masse retirement might spell doom for White's tax bill.

The 30 departing members may not want to vote for the tax hike in special session, preferring to postpone it until the regular session just six months later.

And legislators eager to find favor with Speaker Lewis so they may fill the leadership slots may be hesitant to pass a tax bill which Lewis opposes.

### Goddess of Liberty

Experts renovating the Capitol have discovered several cracks in the statue of the Goddess of Liberty atop the Capitol dome.

The 96-year-old zinc statue was originally cast in the basement and raised to the dome in 1883. The Goddess holds a sword in her right hand while she raises a five-pointed Texas star with her left.

The experts plan to repair the Goddess where she stands—on top of the Capitol—rather than attempt to lower her to the ground.

### War of Words

The war of words between two Democrats running for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by John Tower has unity-minded Democrats wringing their hands.

Last week, for the second week in a row, State Sen. Lloyd Doggett, an Austin liberal, delivered a caustic attack on former Ambassador Bob Krueger.

This time Doggett's campaign mailed out over 50,000 fund-raising

ing letters highly critical of Krueger and another opponent, Congressman Kent Hance of Lubbock. The letter depicted Krueger as a tool of special interests and criticized Hance for co-sponsoring Reagan's three-year income tax reduction bill.

Though mailed by the Doggett campaign, the letters bore the signature of Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower.

### Hightower Apologizes

Hightower immediately issued a statement disavowing the letter saying it was distributed without his approval by Doggett. He apologized to both Krueger and Hance for the error.

Earlier, Doggett had accused Krueger of voting to support foreign assassinations while on a television debate.

Krueger has responded by accusing Doggett of distorting his record and running "the dirtiest campaign I've ever encountered," which Doggett denied.

## Compatible Planting Tips

The magic and mystery of companion planting has fascinated men for centuries. Plants that assist each other to grow better, and plants that repel insects, and even other plants, are all of practical use, and we are just beginning to find out why. Without delving into the whip, let's look at some very beneficially compatible garden mates.

Beans of almost all kinds thrive with carrots, cauliflower, beets, cucumbers and cabbage. Bush beans planted in alternate rows with potatoes protect them from Colorado potato beetles. Broad and pole beans are excellent companions of corn, climbing the stalks to reach the light, their roots helping to anchor the corn against wind damage. The heavy vine growth may also help to deter racoons. Beans also add nitrogen to the soil so needed by the corn. Bush beans should be planted in alternating rows with corn. Beans dislike all members of the onion family.

Corn also likes potatoes, peas, cucumbers, pumpkins, squash and melons, which in turn benefit from the shade provided by the corn.

The corn is then protected from racoons as they do not like to travel through the tangle of vines. Odorless marigolds have proven a deterrent to Japanese beetles that eat the corn silks.

Some do's and don'ts for Irish potatoes are worth noting. Do companion them with beans, corn, cabbage, marigold and eggplant. Colorado potato beetles prefer the later to the potatoes. Do no plant them near cucumbers, pumpkins, squash, tomatoes, apple trees or sunflowers. Horseradish protects against the potato bug.

Okra is compatible with sweet bell peppers and eggplant.

It has long been known that members of the onion family, Allium, garlic, chives, leeks, shallots and onions planted intermittently with vegetables, flowers, roses and shrubs repel aphids and on roses also black spot and mildew. They are especially compatible to tomatoes, lettuce, beets and strawberries. In fact beans are one of the few things that onions do not benefit.

Marigolds are planted with

tomatoes and root crops for the control of nematodes, and their benefit in destroying those annoying pests will extend over the next two to three years.

Add a few radish seeds to the hills of cucumbers and squash. Do not pull them but leave to bloom and go to seed to deter cucumber beetles and squash bugs. Icicles radishes are best for squash. If cucumbers are attacked by nematodes try a sugar spray. Boil one half cup of sugar in two cups of water until completely dissolved. Cool and dilute with one gallon of water. Sugar kills nematodes by drying them out. This will also attract honey bees assuring pollination and resulting in a fine crop.

Tomatoes interplanted with marigolds will grow and produce better. The strong odored plants discourage Mexican bean beetles. Nasturtiums planted around apple trees deter wooly aphis. They discourage squash bugs. They will benefit potatoes, radishes, broccoli and members of the cabbage family.

This has not begun to scratch the surface of the information in the publication "Carrots Love Tomatoes" (Secrets of Companion Planting for Successful Gardening) by Louise Riotte.

## Attach All Pertinent Data To Tax Form

When filing federal tax return, be sure to attach all supporting documents and schedules before mailing it, the IRS says.

Documents such as earning statements, schedules, statements verifying deductions, or other pertinent information should be securely attached to the 1040, 1040A, or 1040EZ. Taxpayers must include W-2 forms from all employers if they worked at more than one job, the IRS points out, regardless of the amount of earnings.

Missing documents cause processing errors and refund delays and create confusion and inconvenience for the taxpayer, the IRS explained. In most instances when a required form or schedule is missing from the tax return, the IRS must contact the taxpayer to request the missing item.

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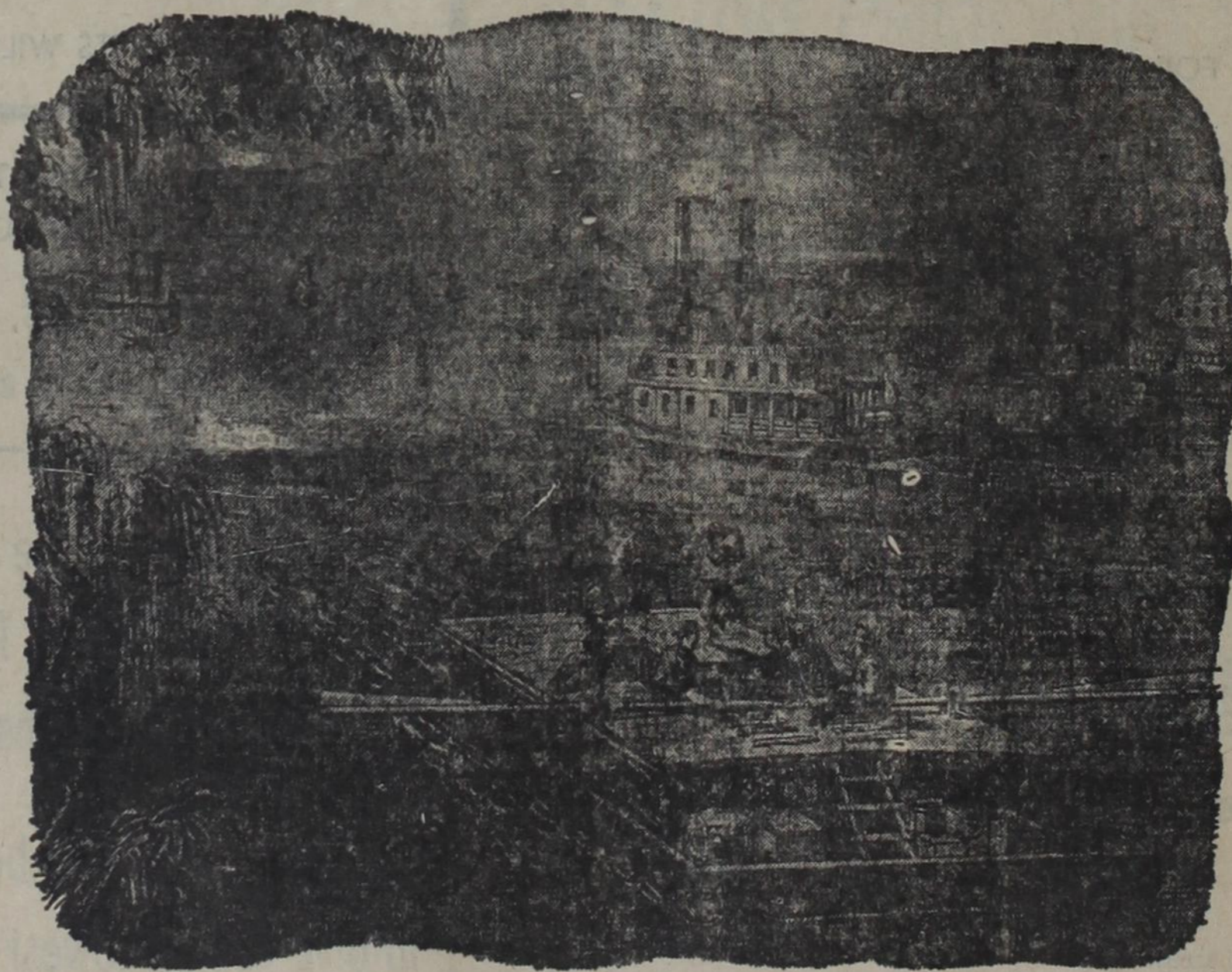
