

Heat Continues To Scorch Local Crops And Pastures

The Summer sun has burned the lawns, crops and pasture land throughout the Cross Plains area for nearly two months, although the last measurable rainfall was recorded August 8, four weeks ago, when .55 of an inch fell here.

A Spring of bountiful water and fruit crops began to wither into a no-rain production. Since then, August 8, not a drop of measurable precipitation has fallen, and

use of water for irrigation purposes has soared both in the country side and within the city.

Agricultural folks have reported late developing fruit crops and maize suffered badly from the lack of moisture. Lush pastures also dried up rapidly. Many stock tanks are also low, and needing water running type rains.

Within the city gardens and lawns are gone that haven't been irrigated.

City has been pumping near record water amounts into the settling basins from new field in the Cottonwood sector, and there is no outlook for curtailing use in the city.

At noon Tuesday rainfall received thus far in 1983 was 20.5 inches with only 2.55 inches falling in July through September.

It was the 51st meeting of the two schools and the 12th consecutive victory for the Bears and 22th since the rivalry began in 1921. Buffaloes have recorded 19 triumphs and three have ended in ties.

Dairy Program Offers 2nd Refund To Producers

Washington, August 24—Dairy producers who wish a refund of their second 50-cent per cwt. deduction for milk marketings should establish their base marketings at their county ASCS office, said Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

The dairy refund program will go into effect September 1 with implementation of a second 50 cent milk marketing deduction. To be eligible for a 1982-83 marketing year refund, producers must reduce their commercial milk marketings for September 1, 1982, through September 30, 1983 by 8.4 percent from the September average of the two marketing years that began October 1, 1980. To be eligible for a 1983-84 marketing year refund, producers must reduce their commercial milk marketings by 8.4 per cent for the period October 1, 1983, to September 30, 1984. Average annual marketings between October 1, 1980 through September 30, 1982, will be the producer's base marketings, Rank said.

Acceptable documentation of milk marketings are payment receipts or statements from milk handlers that show both the amount of milk sold each month during the base period and the upcoming refund period. Receipts for the refund period should also show the amount of money deducted for USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) to help offset the cost of the milk support program.

Producers who sell milk directly to consumers should provide the county office with sales records and cancelled checks as proof of marketings and the amounts paid to CCC.

Rank said that producers may establish their cases at ASCS offices any time during the marketing year. They may file applications for the 1982-83 marketing year refunds from October 1, 1983 through December 31, 1983. Applications for the full 1983-84 marketing year may be filed between October 1, 1984 and December 31, 1984. The amount refunded will be the amount the producer paid to CCC in excess of the first, nonrefundable, 50-cent deduction.

If they wish, producers may request an advance of 60 per cent of the refundable deduction paid during the first 6 months of the 1983-84 marketing year any time on or after April 1, 1984. Producers requesting this advance must furnish pertinent milk marketing records and certify that the required 8.4 per cent reduction in marketings will be made for the entire marketing year.

State Crime Rate Drops For First Half Of 1983

The Texas crime rate for the first half of 1983 declined three per cent compared to the same period last year, according to statistics released by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Figures compiled by the Department's Uniform Crime Reporting Bureau showed a rate of 2,989.7 major crimes reported for each hundred thousand or population for the first half of this year," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "The rate for the comparable 1982 period was 3,093.1."

"Although the specific reasons behind this decrease would be difficult to determine, I'd like to think that widespread citizen participation in police crime prevention programs continues to be a factor," Adams said. "We hope this decrease in the crime rate will carry through the rest of the year."

A total of 457,840 major criminal offenses were reported by Texas law enforcement agencies from January through June of this year, reflecting a slight increase of 0.4 per cent in the actual number of crimes.

"Every major crime category except theft registered a decrease in the first half of 1983," Adams pointed out.

The number of murders decreased by 7.9 per cent, while rape declined by 7.1 per cent. Robberies and aggravated assaults were down by 5.7 per cent and 5.2 per cent respectively.

Motor vehicle thefts dropped 8 per cent. Burglaries decreased by

5.9 per cent. The number of thefts increased by 6.4 per cent.

"DWI arrests were up almost 42 per cent in the first half of this year compared to the same 1982 period," Adams said. "This indicates that Texas police agencies are keeping the pressure on the potential DWI offenders and removing increasing numbers of these violators from the roads."

Statewide arrests for criminal offenses totaled 452,926 in the first six months of 1983, posting a 4.1 per cent increase over the 1982 period.

Three Texas law enforcement officers were killed in the line of duty by criminal action during the period. Four other peace officers died as a result of job-related accidents. A total of 1,833 officers were assaulted while on duty.

No-Till Farming Promises Hugh Soil-Fuel Saving

How much fuel is saved by making the switch to conservation tillage from conventional tillage methods? A considerable amount according to some recent studies.

According to University of Nebraska figures, moldboard plowing has the highest fuel and labor requirements. By substituting a chisel plow, there is nearly a 23 per cent reduction in fuel use. By using a disk for seedbed preparation, a 42 per cent savings has been realized. The study went on to show that a 70 per cent fuel savings is possible by using no-till over conventional tillage systems.

In a similar study conducted by Michigan State University, fuel savings were equated to money saved. That study showed a savings of four gallons of diesel fuel per acre with no-till farming over conventional tillage.

"Any tillage system that leaves plant residues from the previous crop, on the soil surface until the planting of the next crop, will provide protection against soil erosion," says Jim Boykin of the Soil Conservation Service at Baird. "The savings from reduced soil erosion may not be realized immediately in dollars and cents, but will become increasingly more apparent in the future", Boykin said.

SSI Recipients Must Report Status Change

People in the Big Country area who receive supplemental security income (SSI) payments have an important responsibility to report any change in their circumstances which could affect the amount of their payment, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.
 Not only must the reports be made, but it is very important that they be made as soon as possible after a person knows something has occurred, Hammons said. Late reports can result in overpayments, which must be repaid, and they also can result in a penalty.
 People getting SSI must report:
 Moving or change in address
 Any change in the household someone moves in or out of the home
 Entering or leaving an institution
 Improvement of a blind or disabled person's condition
 Leaving the United States for 30 days or more
 Marriage, divorce, separation, or annulment of a marriage
 Any change in income
 Any drug addict or alcoholic ed.
 Any drug addict or alcoholic stops treatment
 Someone should report for a person who cannot manage his or her funds or if a person dies.
 Although SSI is administered by Social Security, money to make SSI payments comes from federal general revenues, not from Social Security taxes.

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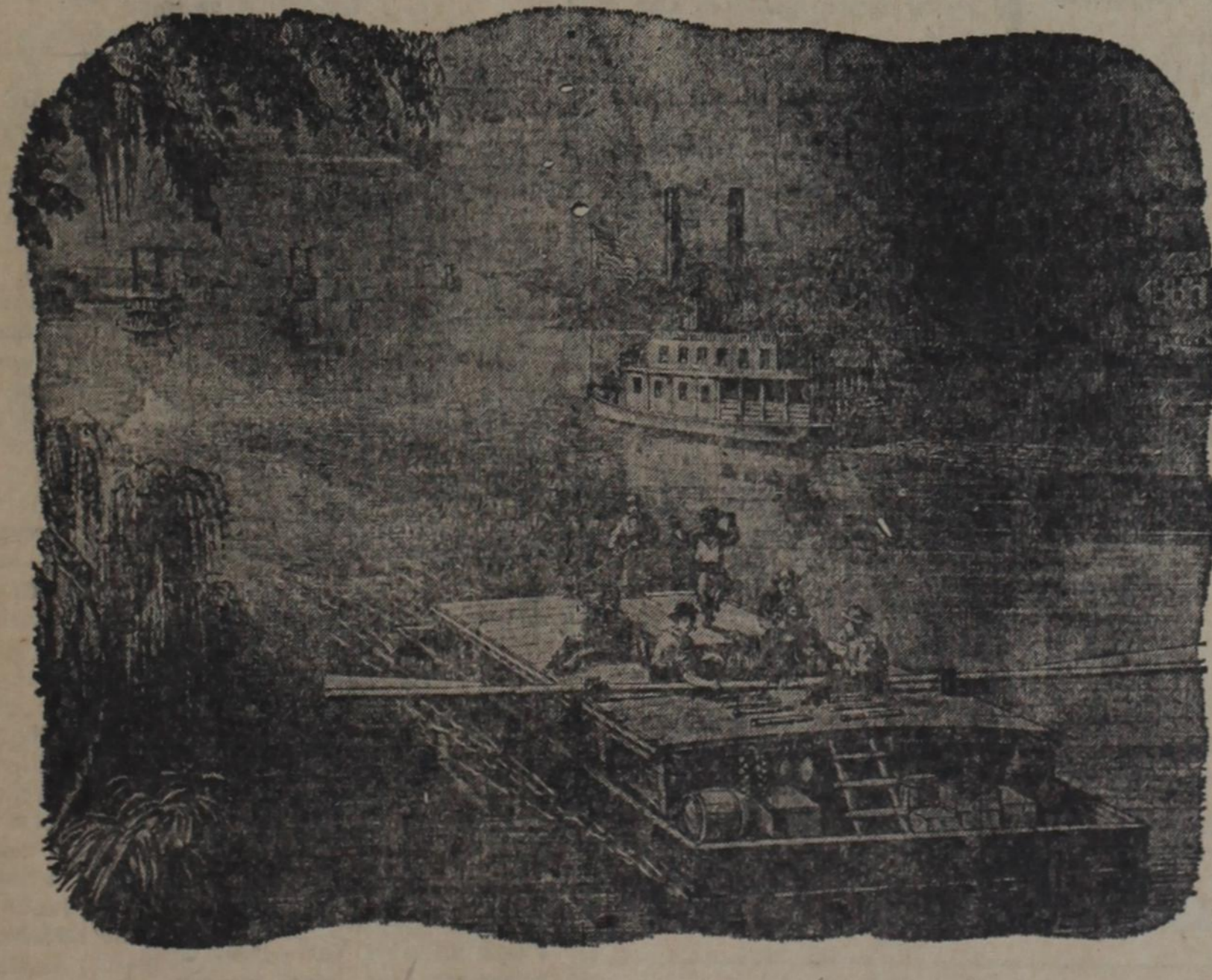
