

People in the Big Country area who receive supplemental secur ity income (SSI) payments have an important responsibility to re port any change in their circumstances which could affect the amount of their payment, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said re-

Not only must the reports he made, but it is very important that they be made as soon as vid Marty of Hinesville, Ga., and possible after a person knows something has occurred, Hammons said. Late reports can result in overpayments, which must be repaid, and they also can result in a penalty.






