Free Or Reduced-Price Meals Offered At School

Cross Plains School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students in kindergarten through the fifth grade may buy lunch for 75 cents and breakfast for 25 cents. Cost of the noon meal for students in the sixth through twelfth grades is \$1, but breakfast cost is still 25 cents.

Children from families whose income falls within certain levels are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 25 cents and 10 cents for lunch and breakfast, respectively.

To apply for the free or reduced-price meals an application form must be filled out and approval given by the school. Forms have been mailed and are available from the school. Those meeting the guidelines may be checked at any time, and are expected to report changes in the family make-up as they occur. Grantors pledge reapplication rights, foster children inclusion, nondiscrimination, fair hearing, confidentiality and help with the application.

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State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

Mobil Oil
 Last week the U. S. Justice Department finally approved the redistricting plan for the Texas House of Representatives, originally drawn up three years ago.

The long battle which has spilled from the legislative chambers into the courtrooms is still not over yet—the feds still must approve redistricting plans for Texas Senate and U. S. Congressional seats—but last week's favorable ruling was taken as a harbinger of good luck for the other two plans.

The Justice Dept. ruling means the federal executive branch finds no denial or abridgement of voting rights. However, House redistricting chairman Rep. Tom Uher of Bay City believes a Mexican-American legal group will appeal the ruling in federal court to force creation of an Hispanic district in Houston.

If that's the case, the group is about the last of the redistricting combatants still on their feet. Most participants are sick and tired of the three-year old battle which has been hashed and rehashed in courtrooms, backrooms and committee rooms.

No one group particularly likes the plan, but most political groups are anxious to get on with the election year politicking.

Labor Unions

One group that has already decided on its game plan for the coming election year is Texas labor. Last week the Texas AFL-CIO leadership endorsed State Sen. Lloyd Doggett of Austin, a liberal, for the U. S. Senate race against John Tower. News that the unions endorsed Doggett over conservative-moderate Bob Krueger was a surprise only in regard to the haste of the endorsement.

Labor endorsed Krueger in two congressional races but became disillusioned with his voting habits on labor issues.

At the Texas AFL-CIO annual convention in San Antonio last week, delegates also stood and cheered embattled Atty. Gen. Jim Mattox, under a grand jury investigation for misreporting campaign loans.

Waving his '82 campaign signs, delegates voted to support Mattox's call for a boycott of Mobil Oil Corp. products. Mattox has blamed his problems on "big oil" which he claims wants him out of the way.

Mattox says Mobil Oil wants his scalp because he is pressuring the company to settle a \$1.67 billion lawsuit to "help the schoolchildren of Texas."

Only labor unions have shown any interest in supporting the boycott, and Mobil Oil officials say they aren't worried about the possibility of a boycott of their products.

The Permanent School Fund, which funds Texas public schools, has about 1.7 million shares of Mobil stock, worth about \$51 million.

Senate Race

Krueger has been regarded as the Democratic frontrunner to challenge Republican incumbent U. S. Sen. John Tower, but the loss of the union endorsement last week was not the only scratch he received.

Krueger, a former ambassador to Mexico, has strong Hispanic support among Democrats, but last week the National Hispanic Chamber of Commerce endorsed Tower. The group's president also indicated he supports Reagan and wants President to appoint a Hispanic to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Federal Election Commission reports show Tower leading both Krueger and Doggett in fundraising, which surprised no one, but Doggett showed up on paper with more money in his fund than Krueger—about \$100,000 more.

Krueger Weds

Krueger's mind, no doubt, has been more on his wedding, which occurred in San Antonio last week, than on the political race. Reported as the social and political event of the season, the groom's lineup read like a political Who's Who of Texas Democrats including groomsman Land Commissioner Garry Mauro and political strategist Roy Spence.

Voter Registration

Meanwhile, both Democrats and Republicans at the halms of their parties are planning ways to garner the minority vote in Texas.

The Black Republican Council of Texas chairman is helping the GOP woo black votes, and the Democrats had launched a massive voter registration project aimed strongly at the Valley Hispanics.

Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle said the project will cost about \$300,000 and will add 500,000 new Democrats to the rolls in time for the '84 elections.

State Republican chairman George Strake also said recently the GOP also plans a registration drive to add about the same number to the Republican flock.

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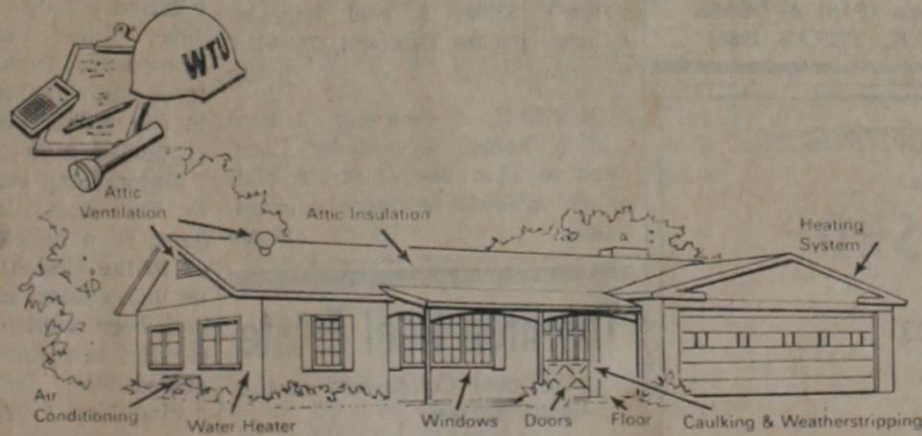
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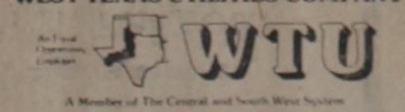
