

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

Coronary Bypass Surgery

"Bypass" surgery has berestoring health and vigor to persons suffering from nar-rowing of the coronary arteries by fatty deposits. More than 160,000 Americans this year will undergo the operation, which involves longer. using veins from another part of the body to bypass obstructed sections of the heart's arteries (see illustration). The blood supply thus is restored to areas of heart muscle where it had been reduced by the obstructions.

If you must undergo this open heart surgery, you and your family should have sufficient information to relieve everyone's anxiety. Discuss your concerns with your doctor.

Admission to the hospital is usually scheduled for two or three days before your operation to allow time for certain tests. During this time, you will become acquainted with the team of surgeons, cardiologists, anegthesiologists, nurses and therapists that will provide your care during and after the operation.

Nervousness or anxiety before surgery is a normal reaction just as athletes often are nervous before important games. Understanding the need for the operation, meeting members of the professional team and asking them ques-tions should help calm you. On the day before surgery,

much of your body hair will be shaved and areas of the incisions will be scrubbed with antiseptic surgical soap. On the day of the operation, you will receive medication to produce drowsiness. Atten-

dants will move you to the operating room on a rolling bed. After you are given an anesthetic that brings sleep and freedom from pain, the operation will be performed. Generally it takes from three to six hours, but it may be



After the operation, you probably will stay in the hospital for one to two weeks. As your recovery progresses, you will appreciate the effects of the surgery. Increased blood flow to the heart muscle should mean less of the chest pain called "angina. You may find you need much less medication, if any, and that you are better able to sustain physical activity. In addition to making you feel better, there is a chance the operation may prolong your life, particularly if you help your heart by keeping high blood pressure under control and your weight down, eating food low in salt, saturated fats and cholesterol and not smoking cigarettes.
