Q-What is Veterans Day? Originally designated on November 11th to commemorate the end of World War I in 1918 and the signing of the Armistice on the "11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month" Armistice Day was redesignated Veterans Day after World War II to honor U. S. Veterans of all wars. In 1968, the federal observance of Veterans Day was changed to the fourth Monday in October. In 1978, it was returned by Conrress to the traditional date of Noveber 11th.
