## Former Councilman Files For Mayor To Fill Ticket

Ticket was filed in the upcoming City of Cross Plains election Monday when Frank Robertson, a former alderman, filed for the post of Mayor of Cross Plains.

Aspirants for a place on the city ballot or on the trustees election ballot for the Cross Plains Independent School District have just one week left to file. Deadline for filing for either place is midnight Wednesday, March 7. However, Debbie Gosnell, city secretary with whom candidates for places on the city ballot must file, and Don Harris,

school board secretary with whom school board candidates should file, request hopefuls file during regular hours if at all possible.

Ted McKeehan and Ray Purvis, both incumbent councilmen, filed for re-election earlier. Incumbent mayor, O. B. Edmondson, has not made his intentions known publicly. City terms of office are two years.

Harris and Reggy Stover are incumbents on the school board, and both have filed for re-election. Their three-year terms of office are expiring.

## Funeral Today At Church For Alton E. Hornsby, 69

Funeral service for Alton Hornsby, 69-year-old Cross Plains electrical contractor, will be held today (Wednesday) at 2 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church.

Mr. Hornsby was found dead at his home here by friends about 10:15 a.m. Monday after he did not report for work and could not be aroused. Justice of the Peace L. P. Mitchell ruled death by natural causes.

Rev. Burlie W. Taylor, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains, and the Rev. Pete Kenamer, pastor of the First United Methodist Church here, will officiate. Burial will be in the Belle Plain Cemetery, directed by Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Born Aug. 30, 1914, in Baird, he married Madee Marshall March 28, 1936, in Abilene. He was an electrician, a veteran of World War II and a Methodist. At the time of his death, he was Cross Plains Fire Chief, and had previously served on the City Council and the School Board. He also previously served on the Bayou School Board, and was a long-time member of the Texas State Guard, having retired a few years ago with the rank of Colonel. He was Precinct Democratic Chairman at the time of his death.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Tommy, of Brownwood; and

a grandson, Kirk of Brownwood. Pallbearers will be Franzel Odum, Alvin Hutchins, J. C. Bowden, Mack L. Childers, J. R. (Dick) Wagner and Glenn Winfrey.

Winter returned to the Cross Plains area over the week end, and for a while brought snow, mixed with sleet and rain at times, Sunday evening. The return of winter brought with it additional moisture which totaled almost an inch, actually .95 at the official Review gauge and .90 at another several blocks away.

Thunder was again heard over the area Sunday morning when .70 of an inch of rain fell, some of it in heavy showers. A high wind was experienced in this area all day and through the night Sunday and Monday, although no major damage has been learned by the Review.

Decreasing clouds reversed and brought light rain and heavy

snow for some time late Sunday evening and early part of the night. The snow at one time almost covered the ground, but temperatures were above freezing, and it soon melted.

A cold day was experienced Monday and there was plentiful ice on Tuesday morning.

The .95 of an inch brought to 1.85 inches the aggregate for February in the city. Total for the year stands at 2.95 inches.

Thunder was again heard early Sunday morning, the third time this February, so the old adage, "Thunder in February means frost in April," should get a staunch testing this year. Thunder has been heard on Feb. 8, 18 and 26.

## Braces: How Do I Choose A Qualified Orthodontist For My Child?

Parents generally want to choose the best professional possible for their child's health-care needs. When it comes to choosing someone to apply braces or provide other orthodontic treatment for your child, the following suggestions are recommended:

"Checklist" To Select An Orthodontist

- Ask your family dentist to recommend a qualified orthodontist.
- Write to the American Association of Orthodontists for a list of qualified orthodontists located in your area.
- Members of the AAO have limited their practices to this special area of dentistry and have completed at least two continuous additional years of training at an accredited school before they can call themselves an "orthodontic specialist."
- Talk with friends and neighbors who have had successful treatment.
- Make an initial appointment with an orthodontist(s). You can discuss the nature of the problem and whether

or not treatment is needed at this time.

- Choose an orthodontist with whom you feel comfortable. Your child will be making frequent visits (often every four weeks) during treatment.
- Find out if you have orthodontic insurance coverage through your employer. If you are not covered by insurance, write and ask the American Association of Orthodontists for the free brochure, "Orthodontic Insurance: Your Employer Can Help."
- Discuss the total cost of orthodontic treatment for your child. Payments are usually divided into an initial fee and monthly installments which are made over the period of treatment (with no finance or interest charges).

If you have any specific questions about treatment for your child, or for that matter, for yourself, write to the American Association of Orthodontists, 460 North Lindbergh Boulevard, St. Louis, MO 63141.

**PLUGBACK RE-ENTRY NETS 81-BARREL OIL DISCOVERY**

A project has been plugged back and re-completed as an upper Fry oil discovery well two miles west of Cross Cut in Brown County.

The strike is Doyle W. Clawson Jr. of Cross Plains No. 1 Fisher, located 4,500 feet from the south and 1,940 feet from the west lines of Stephens Jones Survey 282, A-546.

Daily potential was 81 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus 65 barrels of water, from perforations at 1,758-61 feet.

The 4½-inch casing is set at 3,241 feet. The hole was plugged back to 1,800 feet from a total depth of 3,356 feet.

The well was completed June 26, 1979, as Palo Petroleum No. 1 Fisher in the Palo-Davis (Ranger) Field from perforations at 2,888 to 2,930 feet.

### How To Choose A Lawyer When You Need One

As more consumers become aware of their legal rights, many don't know how to find a competent lawyer to properly represent and protect their interests. Selecting a lawyer should be done with care.

One of the best sources is a recommendation from a relative or friend who has had a similar legal problem and had it resolved to his or her satisfaction by a particular attorney. Many select lawyers on the basis of the lawyer's reputation in the community. Or some happen to know an attorney, although they have never had the opportunity to deal with that lawyer on a professional basis. Yet other sources are the "Yellow Pages" and advertisements appearing in newspapers.

The public must be careful to make certain that the lawyer has experience and skill in the particular problem which the consumer has. The practice of law is a very broad field. Therefore, the lawyer should have knowledge and experience in the particular field in question, otherwise the attorney should be asked to recommend someone who does. Even in smaller towns there are attorneys who tend to specialize in certain fields of practice. The consumer should not hesitate to find out which lawyers are thought to be the best in handling certain categories of cases. It's not smart simply to accept

the representations made in advertisements.

There are, however, legal directories that are fairly reliable in rating lawyers and, in fact, are used by lawyers themselves in referring cases to their colleagues. One such directory, which should be available in the local public library or courthouse library, is Martindale-Hubbell. Lawyers who have obtained the best rating are identified with the initials "a.v."

In addition, there are several lawyers' organizations of which attorneys in certain specialized fields of legal practice are usually members. For example, if an attorney is a member of the Association of Trial Lawyers of America, he or she is likely to be involved in the handling of personal injury or wrongful death claims involving motor vehicles, products, or medical malpractice. In larger communities the local bar association or the local trial lawyers' association may have a lawyer reference service.

But the important point is that, before an attorney is retained, the consumer should be satisfied that the attorney can comfortably deal with the particular problem.

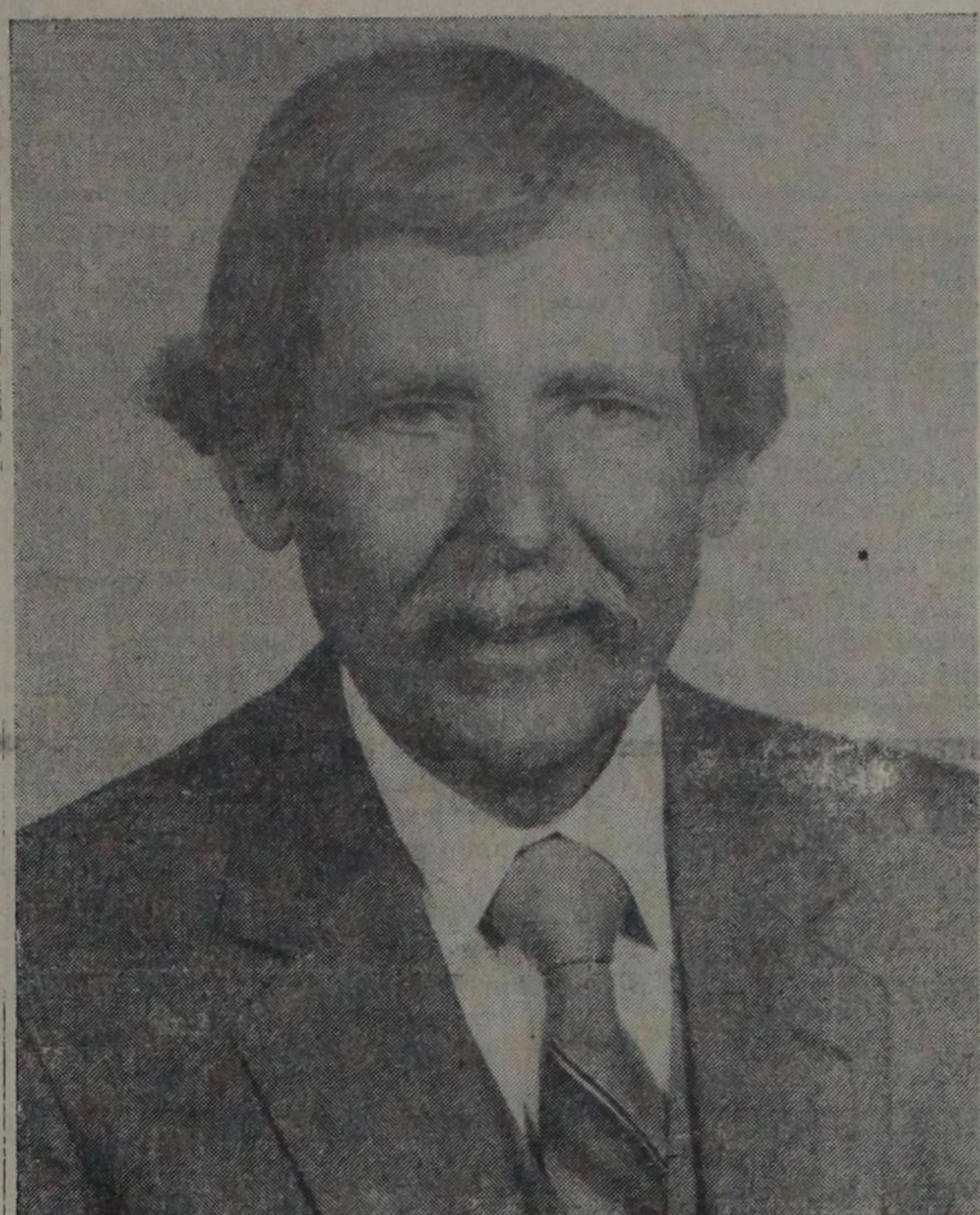

When World War II ended the men of an armored tank division were on a ship headed for home. They thought that the worst part was over for them. Those men spent many months in Europe under the command of General Patton. But Wayne White told me that it was just the beginning of the end for some of those men.

A few of the ships in that fleet never made it home. After several days at sea a storm developed and sank those ships and ruined the engines on some of the other ships. Wayne said it was several days before a rescue ship could arrive to give any assistance. To this day Wayne hates chicken because most of the power on his ship went out, and this meant no refrigeration. Wayne helped throw tons of rotting chickens into the sea.

While Wayne was waiting to go overseas his wife (Gertrude) moved to his post in the states to be with him. She took a job as a waitress, but soon learned that profession was not meant for her. She spilled more food than she served.

Several years after the war ended Gertrude and another lady found a job that they both really enjoyed. They were in the cattle business with one bull and twelve cows. They learned everything they know from instructions given by Wayne and trial and error (mostly the last).

Gertrude and her friend were preparing to take a few calves to the feed lot one morning. This task was to be done by themselves alone — you know the calves knew them and some man just might unset the calves (or upset Gertrude and her associate). Everything went smoothly except for one "muleheaded" heifer. She just wouldn't load. The heifer finally got her front feet into the trailer, then Gertrude proceeded to push and her friend pulled on the animal. (Naturally the ho-

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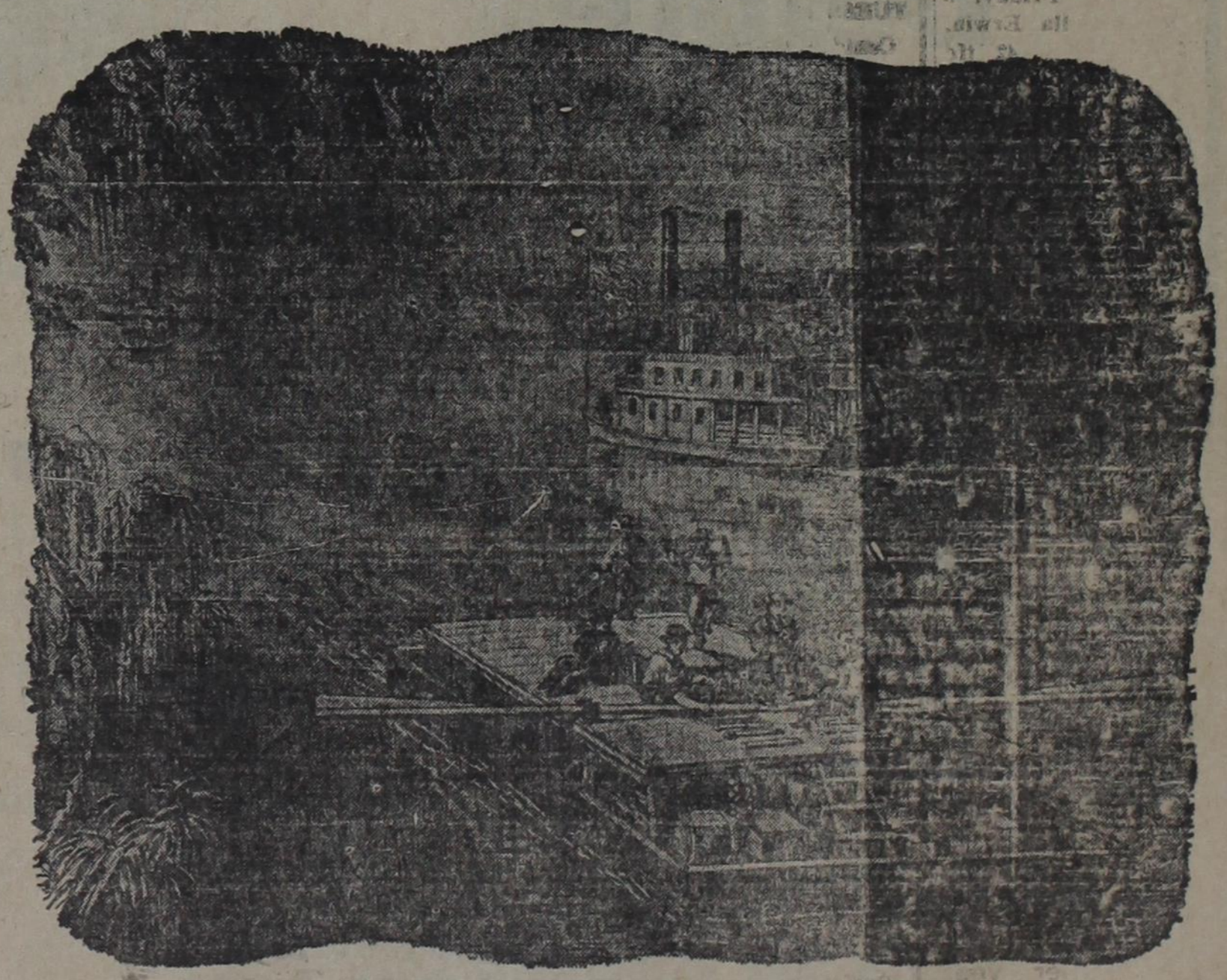

### Election Of TPPB Board Approaching

The Texas Peanut Producers Board is required by law to hold biennial elections for the purpose of electing board members. In the 1978 biennial election, three board members were elected for six-year terms. Those whose terms expire April 30, 1984, are Billy Carruth, District No. 1; Lyndell Conn, District No. 1; and Jimmy Farley, State-at-large.

District No. 1 includes the following counties: Coryell, Hamilton, Comanche, Brown, Mills, San Saba, McCulloch, Llano, Lampasas, Mason, and Gillespie. State-at-large includes all the peanut producing counties in the State of Texas.

Election of these board members must be completed and tabulated by May 4, 1984.

All producers of peanuts within the area defined, including owners of farms on which peanuts are produced, are eligible to vote in the election if such producer would be required under Title 3 of the Commodity Referendum Law to pay the assessment.

Any producer of peanuts who is qualified to vote in the election and desires to be a candidate for membership on the Texas Peanut Producers Board shall file with the principal office, P. O. Box 338, Gorman, Texas 76454 an application to have his name placed on the ballot. The application must be signed by the candidate and by at least ten peanut producers who are qualified to vote in the election and must be filed at least thirty days (by April 4) prior to the election.

No candidate, unless so nominated, shall have his name placed on the official ballot. However, this does not prevent the writing of the name of any candidate on
