The ten units of low rent housing that have been under construction for the past several months were turned over to the

local Housing Authority in a business meeting held on Thursday, April 26.

The "Date of Full Availability" of the project was certified to be the last day of April, 1984, the month in which substantially all of the dwelling units in the new project became available for occupancy.

The developer, Fitch, Holdredge,

Bisone and Holcomb of Houston, was paid \$381,229 under a turn-key contract with the Cross Plains Housing Authority.

County Demos Tap Skinner As Sheriff

Callahan County Democrats went to the polls in moderately heavy numbers in the primary election Saturday to re-elect Sheriff Bill Skinner in the only race for a county-wide office.

According to unofficial vote totals 2,891 votes were cast in the balloting.

Skinner defeated two opponents without a run-off in his bid for re-election. Some controversy had stirred interest in that race in the latter days of campaigning. It questioned the conduct of Sheriff Skinner on after normal duty hours activities. Skinner polled 1,698 to 677 for Glen D. Smith and 505 for Adrian Huddleston. Cross Plains also favored Skinner who got 203 votes, Huddleston polled 116 and Smith 75.

In the extremely close race for top three positions for U. S. Senator Callahan County and Cross Plains favored Kent Hance apparently front runner by less than 1,000 votes across the state. Seemingly Hance and Lloyd Doggett will face one another in a run-off for the Democratic nomination. County totals were listed as Hance 1,761, Krueger 526, Doggett 271, Young 40, Sullivan 35 and Schlanger 11. Cross Plains ag-

gregates were Hance 260, Krueger 60, Doggett 35, Young 9, Sullivan 3 Schlanger 0.

Rick Perry carried the county but lost this city in his successful bid for the 64th State Legislative seat. County and city vote totals were Perry 1,034 and 70, Kenneth F. Neighbors got 691 and 164.

Charles Stenholm soundly defeated his challenger Noel S. Cowling across the U. S. Representative District 17, and did so in Cross Plains rolling to a 343-35

advantage.

Top vote producing box in the county was Clyde Precinct 2 which counted 972 votes, and Baird was runner-up with 628 aggregate. Others were Cross Plains 398, Clyde Precinct 8 351, Eula 140, Denton Valley 105, Putnam 58, Oplin 73 and Absentee 123.

County Attorney Robert E. McCool and Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell both ran unopposed.

Tornadoes Often Spawned By Warm Spring Weather

After a winter with record-breaking cold temperatures, most Americans are looking forward to spring and warmer weather, but the Fort Worth Chapter of the Society of Chartered Property and Casualty Underwriters (CPCU) points out that warmer weather also brings tornadoes.

Although tornadoes can occur any time of the year, the Society notes, they occur most frequently during April, May and June. Since these deadly storms often strike suddenly and with little or no warning, knowing what to do — before, during and after the storm could save your life.

The Society offers the following tornado safety tips:

What To Do Before a Tornado

—Keep a battery-operated radio, a flashlight and a supply of fresh batteries in a convenient place.

—Make an inventory of your household furnishings and other possessions. Inventories should be kept in a safe deposit box or some other safe place away from the premises.

—Be sure everyone in your household knows in advance where to go and what to do in case of a tornado warning.

—Find the locations of designated shelter areas in public facilities.

What To Do During A Tornado

—Take cover immediately if a tornado warning is issued.

—Stay calm, don't panic. Don't attempt to flee from the path of the tornado in a car or other vehicle.

—Abandon cars or mobile homes,

and seek shelter elsewhere. Automobiles and mobile homes afford the least safety during a tornado.

—If you're at home or at work, stay inside, away from windows and exterior walls, until the storm is over. The safest place in a home during a tornado is in the basement. If there is no basement, take shelter in a bathroom, a closet or under a heavy piece of furniture on the lowest level.

—If a tornado strikes during school hours, teachers should keep children away from windows and seek shelter in a designated area or in interior hallways. Concerned parents should not attempt to go out in the storm to pick up their children at school.

What To Do After a Tornado

—Be alert for potential hazards, such as broken power lines, shattered glass, splintered wood or other sharp protruding objects.

—If your property is damaged, make temporary repairs to prevent further loss from rain, wind and looting. Keep your receipts — the cost of temporary repairs may be reimbursable under your insurance policy.

—Contact your insurance representative as soon as possible. Prompt service usually is available within hours after a tornado or other disaster strikes a community.

Higher SSI Payments May Increase Rolls

Eligibility for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments is now possible for persons who previously lost their eligibility and for persons who were found to be ineligible at the time they filed their claim.

This is a result of two recent increases in the SSI payment level. In July 1983 the basic federal payment level for an individual living alone was raised from \$284.30 a month to \$304.30; and for a couple living in their own household, from \$426.40 to \$456.40 a month.

This was followed by a second cost-of-living increase which went into effect January 1984, raising the individual's payment level to \$314 and the couple's payment level to \$472 a month.

Persons who feel these higher payment levels may now make them eligible should telephone or visit their local Social Security office to apply. This is especially important because SSI applications are effective on the day they are filed. There is no retroactivity, so delays result in lost benefit payments.

SSI payments are available to blind or disabled individuals and people 65 years of age or older. To qualify, you must meet some resource limits, be a citizen of the United States or an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence, be 65 years of age or older or be found disabled or blind, and not have more than \$334 a month in income for an individual or \$492 a month for a qualifying couple. If you are working, the first \$65 a month you make as well as one-half of your earnings over \$65 do not count in determining your monthly income level for SSI purposes. But you must file a written application to be eligible.

In Abilene, you may obtain more information or file an application by calling (915) 698-1360 or by visiting the Social Security Office at 142 S. Pioneer.

Live Oaks & Memories

In the late forties the farmer in Mississippi had it really tough. One man thought that there had to be a better way to make a living for his wife and three daughters other than praying for rain and then hoping for not too much. He decided to make a trip to Texas in the family Packard and look for a job in the oil field. At that time the oil fields were "booming" everywhere in Texas.

He had been gone for a few days when around two in the morning his wife lay in bed trying to fall asleep. She heard a car come up the hill and around the corner to her house. She would know the sound of that car anywhere—it was the Packard. But she noticed the car's engine seemed to be "missing" as it came up the hill. When she got to the door of the house she found her unshaved husband wearing wrinkled clothes and exhausted from a 12 hour drive with little sleep or food. But the only thing she could think to say was, "That car really sounded tired."

That man did move his family to Texas and worked for the same oil company for 30 some odd years. His wife told me that she knew how Elizabeth Taylor felt in the movie "The Giant". She had left her parents, brother, sister, and tall pines of Mississippi for the sand and dirt of West Texas.

Donnell Biggers became one of that oil companies best employees. Once they had to send a "trouble shooter" overseas, and they needed a man to go who did not look like a white collar worker but who knew his job. The government of that country would more than likely not allow an oilfield's businessman enter their country for this was just the beginning of our poor relationship with oil producing nations. Donnell was 6' 2" tall and had no trouble going pass customs wearing his cowboy hat and boots. The company's problem lay on an off-shore drilling rig. They had to fly Donnell to the rig in a helicopter and gave him a life jacket for safety in case the chopper went down. They were flying low, and he was looking out at the water. He saw something moving in the water and asked the pilot what it was. The pilot told him that they were in shark infested waters. Donnell took off his life jacket, threw it into the water, and said that he didn't want to be "bobbin' up and down in that thing."

When Donnell got to the rig he saw that a shaft on a piece of equipment had been dropped and was bent. As any welder knows if you apply a certain amount of heat at a certain point on a piece of steel, you change the shape of that steel. Donnell just showed them where and how much heat to apply to that shaft to straighten it. He retired from that oil company but was called upon to be a consultant on many occasions.

I truly admired that man because he did provide his family with a "good living" and much more. He encouraged his children to obtain skills to provide for themselves, make their word as good as their name, and "take care" of his grandchildren. He accomplished these achievements without a formal education, just determination and hard work. Most of my better qualities are due to his influence, and I still try to improve my poorer ones cause I don't want to be a disappointment to him. Donnell Biggers was my Daddy.

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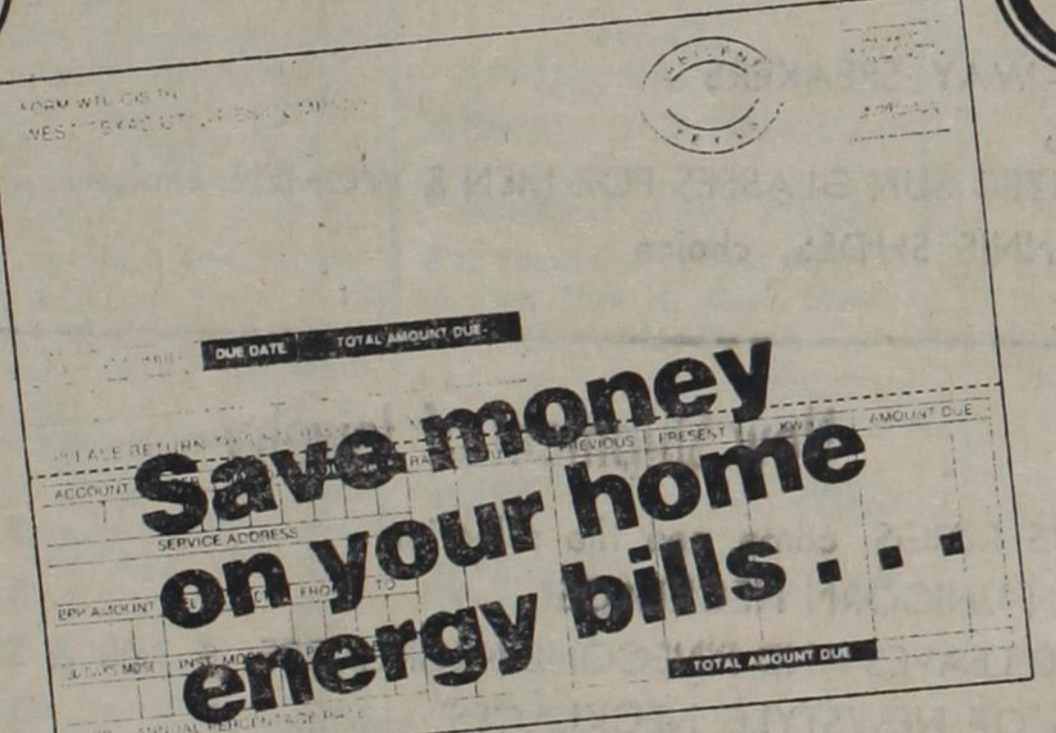
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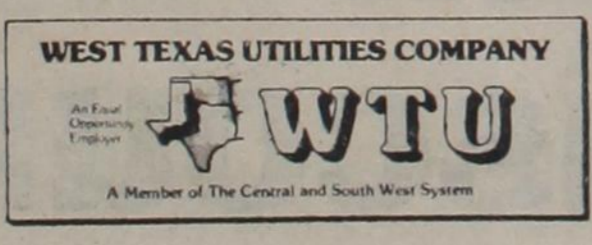
