GREEN BELT, Md. (NWR) - Recent work by a computer shows the sun really did stand still or, in modern language, the earth halted in its orbit, as recorded in Joshua 10:13. The computer also found the backward movement of the sun-

dial in II Kings 20.

According to Harold Hill, president of the Curtis Engine Company in Baltimore, Mary land, and a consultant in the space program, our astronauts and space scientists at Green Belt., Maryland, were recently checking what position the sun, know this so we don't send a satellite up and have it bump into something later in its orbits. We have to lay out the orbits in terms of the life of the satellite and where the planets will be so they will not collide.

"While the computer was being operated back and forth over the centuries, it suddenly came to a halt, showing a red to the standards.

"They called in the Service Department to check it out," Mr. Hill added, 'and they said, missing in space in elapsed

time." Then, according to Mr. Hill, "One religious fellow on the team said, 'You know, one time I was in Sunday School and they talked about the sun standing still.' He got a Bible and looked in the book of Joshua. There they found the verse in which Joshua asked the Lord to make the sun stand still." Then, using the computer, they went back to the time the event took place and found it was almost a whole day - 23 hours and 20 minutes, to be exact

There were still 40 minutes to he accounted for, so the experts also considered II Kings 20. Here, in response to Isaiah's request, the Lord brought the sundial's shadow back ten degrees - exactly 40 minutes.

Adding together the 23 hours and 20 minutes in Joshua 10 and the 40 minutes in II Kings 20 gives a total of 24 hours. "The space travelers had to

record this in the logbook as the missing day in the universe," Mr. Hill concluded.

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
