Five homes will be toured including those of Carolyn and Jimmy Wilson, featured last week in an article, Margaret Ann and Pat McNeel and Donnie and Raymond McCowen, both described this week, and next week homes of Bobbie and Dan Johnston and Wanda and R. C. Merryman. Refreshments will be served at the Johnston home and maps locating the tour will be available.

The McNeel home was built in 1978.

It was designed by the McNeels for just plain family living, and was constructed by Klingberg Custom Homes.

One feature in "Margaret's Kitchen" is the plate rail. It holds antique plates from both sides of the family, as well as plates given to them by friends.

The only "older" home on the tour this year is the restored home of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond McCowen at the corner of 9th Street and Avenue C.

Built in 1911, it was purchased in the mid-1960's by Mr. and Mrs. E. C. McCowen, who did most of the restoration. The B. C. McCowens of this city, who have earned an historic reputation as restorers of historic old houses, supervised the renewal project, incorporating modern innovations without abridging the original decor.

The 1,800 square feet of floor space remains unchanged, still affording six spacious rooms, a den, two bathrooms and a long corridor into which rooms open.

The large picturesque porch along the front has been repaired with such detail that the new blends indiscernably with the original. Craftsmanship of the restorers guided by taste for tradition has preserved the charm of a half century ago and provided the comforts of modern living.

High ceilings made to seem lower through decor, light fixtures imported from Spain and activated by silent switches and central gas heating while preserving the original fireplaces blend the appearance of three-quarters of a century ago with the modern mode of living.

Mr. and Mrs. Raymond McCowen purchased the house in 1978, and have made it their home since.

Quiet Thanksgiving Holiday Is Expected

Cross Plains will pause Thursday in observance of Thanksgiving Day with many local businesses taking a one-day or longer holiday.

Virtually all of the downtown business firms will be closed for the one day set aside to thank God for our blessings. Some merchants will remain open, while others will work abbreviated schedules.

In addition to Cross Plains Schools which will be dismissed Thursday and Friday, business offices of the City of Cross Plains, West Texas Utilities Co. and Dal-Mar Energy, Inc. will also take extended time off, re-opening Monday.

Sav-On Food will be open Thursday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., shorter hours than normal.

Citizens State Bank and Southern Savings will be closed on Thursday only. That also holds true for the U. S. Post Office, and there will be no mail service of any kind, none arriving and none departing.

Convenience stores along highways leading into Cross Plains

will be open, including Buy Rite Superette, Lakeway Grocery and Town & Country Food Store.

There will be no turkey dinner served in a restaurant here Thursday. Only the Dairy Queen will open that day, and that will be for breakfast only from 6 to 11 a.m. Odom's Restaurant and the Dairy Bar will be closed all day.

Dillard Texaco will be the only full service station that definitely will be open for business. J. W. Fore who owns operates the Conoco Station said he was undecided, and he might work shorter hours. Closed will be Grid-

der Gulf, and Cliff's Exxon. B&B Discount will also be closed.

Larry Melson and Don Gosnell, Texas Department of Public Safety troopers here, have urged local residents traveling to use extra caution. They said that it would be wise to leave early going to and especially returning from destinations and avoid the late-hour rush, adding danger mounts on the highways at that time.

They and other local peace officers are expected to work more hours than normal during the holiday period.

New WTU Rates Effect Little Change In Bills

New rates for West Texas Utilities Co. customers became effective Friday, Nov. 16, by order of the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The commission earlier had approved a settlement agreement reached by WTU, the intervening cities and the PUC staff. The agreement gives WTU an annual base rates increase of about \$12.4 million and a fuel charge decrease of about \$13.3 million. This would result in a net decrease in revenue for WTU, to allow for an expected decline cost of boiler fuel during the coming

year. The new rates which include a winter-summer differential, will raise average residential rates by about 4.2 per cent. The rates will be slightly lower than current rates during the November-April period, but higher during the rest of the year. This feature was insisted upon by the PUC staff to encourage conservation during the peak usage months.

Bills for all electric meter readings recorded after Friday will reflect the new rates, according to Holman King, WTU vice-president and director of corporate relations.

Host Exes Clip Locals 12-0 In Football Tilt

Rising Star exes capitalized on a fumble and a 90 yard punt return to down the Buffalo exes 12-0 on a rainy Saturday night, Nov. 17.

Offense coach Doyle Clawson said, "We had ample opportunity to win the ball game, being inside the Wildcat 20 on several occasions, only to see a turnover drive. We fumbled seven times and turned the ball over five times to Rising Star's one." The Cross Plains exes said, "This was the hardest hitting team they have faced."

Coach Ron Lankford's defense played an excellent game, yielding only 40 yards total offense and 12 points. Clawson said six of those points resulted from a fumble on the 6-yard line. Jon Vaughn scored both host touchdowns.

Randy Dillard was lost to an eye injury in the first quarter. Randy is one of those backs you can count on in a clutch, and we missed his playing ability, said Clawson. He added also lost to a knee injury in the second half was Monty Richards, our speedy punt returner, safety and receiver. Monty received the injury after a 20 yard pass reception.

Clawson said, "I have been over the film several times trying to pick out players for honors, but too many to list played excellent ball. Greg Williams was triple teamed all night and in most cases won. Quarterback Greg Turner has an excellent football mind, and did a good job of play selection. Dennis Koenig did an outstanding job kicking under adverse conditions. It has

been a pleasure to coach such an excellent group of football players."

Light rain showers yielded .25 of an inch in Cross Plains Saturday and Saturday night. The rainfall was the first measurable precipitation recorded here this month.

It brought the year's aggregate to noon Tuesday to 26.25 inches, which was boosted by 7.15 inches in an extra wet October.

The light moisture halted the peanut harvest again, and some crops are reportedly beginning to suffer because of the delays in harvesting.

Only other reports of rain totals came from Sabanno where Frank Snodgrass measured .35 of an inch, and at Pioneer where Joe Fleming gauged .30 of an inch.

Colder weather followed the week end rain into this section of Texas pushing the mercury lower than anytime before this season.
