It brought the year's aggregate to noon Tuesday to 26.25 inches, which was boosted by 7.15 inches in an extra wet October.


The light moisture halted the triple tearned all night and in peanut harvest again, and some most cases won. Quarterback crops are reportedly beginning to suffer because of the delays in
