\$500 Price Fixed For Baird Tract By Jury Of View In Tuesday Hearing

A jury of view at Baird Tuesday decided West Texas Utilities Co. should pay \$500 for right-ofway on T&P Railroad property to expand its facilities, a move bitterly opposed by the City of

The three-man panel reached its decision shortly before 3 p.m. Tuesday. Its ruling was the I'uesday morning between attor- nance. neys for the city and the utili-

The city representatives and those of the utilities company 10 a.m. condemnation nearing to pass over discussion of the two streets until March 31.

City Attorneys Randall and Rupert Jackson hurriedly put in a call for Dallas Scarborough of Abilene, the city's co-counsel in the dispute, when the WTUC attorneys filed an amended petition at 9:35 a.m. to the one that had been set for hearing I'uesday morning.

At the 10 a.m. hearing Scarborough and Randall Jackson charged that WTUC was illegally trying to condemn city property and asked that the hearing be

Lee Smith of Dallas, represent-WTUC, contended that County Judge Lester Farmer could not rule on legality of the hearing, but was obligated to continue with the hearing and let the jury of view set a price on the property.

Judge Farmer decided to let the jury of view go ahead and consider the original petition of WTUC for condemnation which stated the company wanted to "cross" the city streets. The amended form indicated the company wanted to go under the

John A. Hutchison of Abilene, assistant distribution engineer for WTUC, was called as the first witness before the jury of view. His testimony had hardly begun when Scarborough and Jackson began objecting that descriptions of the property to be valued were used from the amended petition rather than the original

Smith asked the jury of view composed of John D. Isenhower of Putnam, Harry Steen of Clyde and Homer McIntosh of Baird to order Scarborough and Jackson to remain quiet as they had no part in the proceedings.

After a hurried session, the jury ruled that the pair should refrain from interrupting as long as testimony conformed with the facts and the property in question in the suit under the rinal petition

The city counsel had also objected to the condemnation on the grounds that WTUC has no right to condemn land in Baird for expansion of services when its franchise has already expired. The franchise expired at midnight Saturday but the company is still delivering current.

May 1, 1955 is the final date for disposing of excess wheat acreage. Acreages of wheat mixtures (wheat and other small grain and wheat and jegume), are considered wheat acreage and count against the allotment. Producers who dispose of excess wheat acreage are requested to notify this office so that field check can be made by a field man.

1954 EMERGENCY FEED PRO-GRAM -

Although the date for filing applications for emergency feed has passed, purchase orders in the hands of producers are valid for 120 days from date issued. Producers holding feed purchase orders should be sure to present them to a feed dealer in time for the dealer to fill and present them to the County ASC Office

within the 120-day period. Records in this office show that 3308 purchase orders for emergency feed totaling 15,138,-700 pounds have been issued to Callahan County farmers and ranchers since the beginning of the program. 263 Dealer's Certificates totaling \$87,651.69 have been issued to feed dealers participating in the program.



Looks From Here" OMAR BURLESON 17th District

THE FEDERAL GOV. . . . takes 63.6 billion dollars per year from our citizens in taxes. State and local governments take their additional toll. Federal taxes alone are 21% of the national income. and amount to \$369 for every man, woman, and child in our land. It amounts to \$1,249 per family. The National Debt is \$5,-476 per family, and \$1,729 per person. Thus, each child born in the United States automatically upon arrival shares in the National Debt to the extent of \$1,729.

The handling of these vast sums involving defense, welfare, the numerous public services and other Governmental functions is, of course, in the hands of our public officials. The Nation, therefore, should have the most skilled, the most energetic and Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Browning faithful public servants if there is to be efficient and economical administration.

One reaches the point at times of feeling that the best way to curb the astronomical expenditures of Government is to provide less money. This has been tried, but what happens is that the Government goes ahead and spends money it does not have, which means deficit financing.

The only answer is to prohibit Government from spending more than it takes in from taxes, and to force the Congress and every legislative body before it adjourns to provide money for any appropriations it makes.

ALCOHOLIC ADVERTISING . . . is beamed to the youth in millions of American homes. Dr. Caradine R. Hooten, Executive Secretary of the Methodist Board of Temperance, says that this situation must be corrected.

"The liquor people now spend more than 250 million dollars a year to shove their products into American homes through every advertising medium available, the Methodist official said. "The millions of citizens who wish to rear their children in an alcoholfree atmosphere find this constant barrage repugnant," stated Dr. Hooton.

Incidentally, Dr. Hooten was pastor of the First Methodist Church in Stamford a number of years ago.

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER ... has the final decision to make as to whether or not the United States defends Quemoy and Matsu Islands, only a stone's throw from the Mainland. It is assumed that the Chinene Communists will attack these islands unless the forces of Chiang Kaishek are withdrawn to Formosa. If the Nationalist forces are withdrawn, it will be said that the free world has again yielded to Communist pressures. If the islands are defended, it could develop into a real shooting war. The decision of the President, if and when a decision must be made, is not an easy one.







Many Texas children and adults die each year from flyborne diseases. Typhoid fever, tuberculosis, summer compaint cholera, and intestinal diseases frequently resulting in death follow closely in the trail of the

common housefly. "The control of the fly menace State," Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. "The most effective measure for control is to eight days are required to comlifetime of several months, one housefly lays from 600 to 1,000 eggs. To eliminate flies, Dr. Holle said the breeding places must be destroyed. As ilies breed in filth, manure piles, garbage, and other organic filth furnish the redrements of warmth moisture and food necessary for the propagation of the fly. Flies should be kept from contact with food or drink or utensils in which such food and drink are prepared and served. Likewise they should be kept from access to privy vaults where they pick up
