

Old Fashion Teacakes

3 eggs, 1 cup sour milk, 3 cups sugar, 1 cup shortening, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. soda, 2 tsp. vanilla, 2 tsp. taking powder, 6 or 7 cups flour.

Mix sugar and shortening together, add eggs. Dissolve soda in sour milk and add to the mixture. Add rest of ingredients. Add flour until you have stiff dough. Chill 2 hours. Roll out one quarter inch thick, cut with cookie cutter. Bake at 250 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes.





Prepare Parmeters Pastry. Line a 10-inch pie pan with pastry, building up a high fluted rim. Bake 5 minutes below center in a 350° F. oven. Cut olives in wedges. Saute bacon until crisp and drain well. Beat eggs with salt and pepper. Stir in cream and milk. Add onton, chosse, pimiento, olives and bacon. Pour into partially baked crust. Return to oven and continue baking 40 minutes, until set. Let stand 10 minutes before cutting. Serve warm of cold. Makes I (10-inch) pie (6 to 8 servings). Parmesan Pastry: Combine 1-1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour with 1/4 cup uncooked yellow commeal, 1/4 cup grated Parmesan theese, 3/4 teaspoon salt and 1/16 traspoon cayenne pepper. Cut in 1/2 cup shortening until particles are size of pees. Sprinkle with 3 to 4 tablespoons cold water, using just enough to make a still dough. Shape into a ball. Roll on lightly floured board to a 12-inch circle.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks. The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bondin · caracity of the fund to include ments of The University of '1 man and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (25 for The University of Texas System and 13 for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The rehabilitation projects. University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin. agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a 3% vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects. Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extra-

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."
