

Bisons Play Eden Even; Test Hornets On Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes contested the highly regarded Eden Bulldogs in a controlled scrimmage last Friday evening.

Bison Head Coach Ron Lankford said both teams scored seven touchdowns, and noted that the host first team clipped the Herd 2-0, while the second teams Bisons nipped the Eden counterparts 2-0. "On goal line work," Lankford said "both teams tallied five times."

"Cross Plains hit real well, and we were aggressive, which is what I was looking for," the head

coach noted. He continued that the Buffaloes made a lot of mistakes, but we hope to work those out before our next scrimmage.

Along with the numerous mistakes, Lankford reported bright spots. Lance Clawson did a good job running the ball, and said Darin Apple ran 70 yards the first time he touched the football. Devin Koenig and John Fred McWilliams connected on four passes. He added that the short passing game looked good. The Koenig-McWilliams combination worked for two touchdowns. It was also pointed out that Troy Harris connected on a 50-yard scoring pass with Jesse Sibley.

"Eden had a real good ball club," Lankford stated, "headed by a quality 215-pound fullback."

Three Buffs were singled out for their defensive work. They are Arthur Agnew, Alan Hillburn and Tom Sibley.

"Our offensive line did a good job of blocking, opened some good holes and gave quarterbacks time to throw," the head coach pointed out.

Buffaloes will journey to Aspermont Friday to tangle with the Hornets starting at 6:30 p.m. According to Coach Lankford Friday's foes have a "pretty tough team."

He continued that we are looking for an exciting year, and hope to improve on mistakes, as play calls for.

Dear Editor:

Earlier in the year, the city graded all our streets — paved and unpaved — to create gutters for better run off as a protection for our paving. The theory was good, but they left the streets very sandy and dirty. What little rain we've had has finally mostly cleaned the streets of the sand and dirt but many intersections are deep in sand — shade of the 1950's when we didn't have paving! This situation cannot provide protection for the paving at the corners and really should be cleaned up.

I would like to suggest another city improvement. None of our streets are legally designated one way — but due to overhanging tree limbs, many sections of our streets are one way — cars, bike riders and walkers all have to dodge the low limbs — even some corners are obstructed by low tree limbs. Legislature Makes Changes Concerning Student Status

The following eight changes concerning students were among the changes made in the Texas Education system recently by the State Legislature in special session. They follow:

1. Effective September 1, 1984, a school district may no longer grant social promotions. A student who does not maintain a grade average of at least 70 for a school year may not be advanced from one grade level to the next or be given credit for a course.

2. A student cannot be exempted

from taking a final exam in any class in which other students are required to take a final exam.

3. Students whose grades are below 70 may be required to attend two 45-minute tutorial sessions per week in the failing subject during a reporting period in which he failed the subject. Each district is required to provide the tutorial services, although they do not have to provide transportation for those students attending.

4. A student may not be given credit for a class if the student has more than five days of unexcused absences during a semester.

5. For compulsory attendance law purposes, a student must attend class for a minimum of 170 days. Kindergarten students must attend class for a minimum of 85 days each semester they are enrolled.

6. Beginning with the 1985 spring semester, a student failing any subject during a six-weeks reporting period may not participate in, or miss school for, any activity the following six-weeks.

7. Beginning with the 1985-86 school year, students will be required to perform satisfactorily on all sections of a secondary exit level assessment instrument to receive a high school diploma. The secondary exit level test will be given to all 11th grade students. Students are required to retake the sections they did not pass during their 12th grade year.

8. A child guilty of incorrigible conduct may be placed in an alternative educational program. If a child continues to be incorrigible he may be suspended by the board of education.

Dillard Texaco Station and Fore Conoco Station. The Dairy Queen will be open, and it is expected that the Dairy Bar and Odom's Restaurant will operate on regular schedule.

Increased traffic is expected on the highways here, and the following report from the Department of Public Safety is printed, in part, herewith.

The Department of Public Safety is estimating that as many as 54 deaths will result from traffic accidents during the Labor Day holiday. DPS Director Jim Adams said the estimate is based upon previous holiday experience.

"During the last Labor Day period, we had 52 deaths reported in both urban and rural accidents. The inclusion of subsequent deaths due to traffic-related injuries which occurred during the period brought the final count to 55," Adams said.

"Obviously, we would be pleased to have no fatal accidents during this 72-hour holiday, but our statistics show that is not probable. We know that some drivers will insist upon driving while intoxicated, others will deliberately exceed the speed limits and still others will drive in a careless or reckless manner," he said.

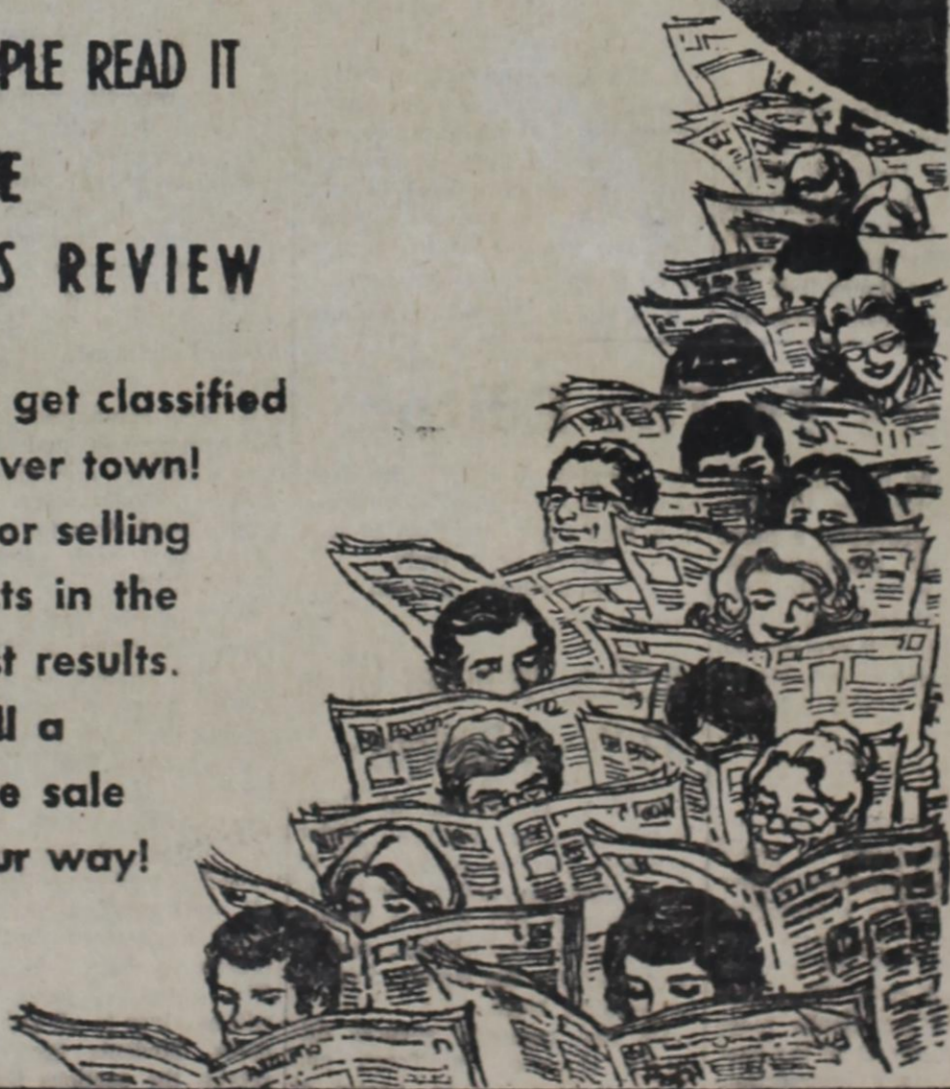

DPS District Chief Cautions About Bus

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminds all motorists with the start of school, you will be seeing school buses on the streets and highways once again. Captain G. J. Matthews, Commander of the Texas Highway Patrol for the Abilene District, said all drivers are required to stop for school buses when the bus is stopped to load or unload school children and has its overhead red lights flashing. Captain Matthews pointed out that the law concerning stopping for a school bus applies to drivers on a city street as well as on a rural highway. He also stated that drivers must stop from either direction before passing the bus.

The only time a driver can legally pass a stopped bus is for the flashing red lights to be turned off, the bus driver to motion a vehicle by, or for the bus to resume motion. Captain Matthews was careful to point out that either of these situations, a driver needs to remain alert for school students. They could still dart into the path of your vehicle, he said.

Captain Matthews said "With the start of school, all drivers need to be extra cautious around our school." He reminded, "the children will be excited about a new school year and might not be thinking about the safety rules in bike riding and crossing streets so it will be up to the motorist to protect them." "Drive as if you have a child attending that school," he said.

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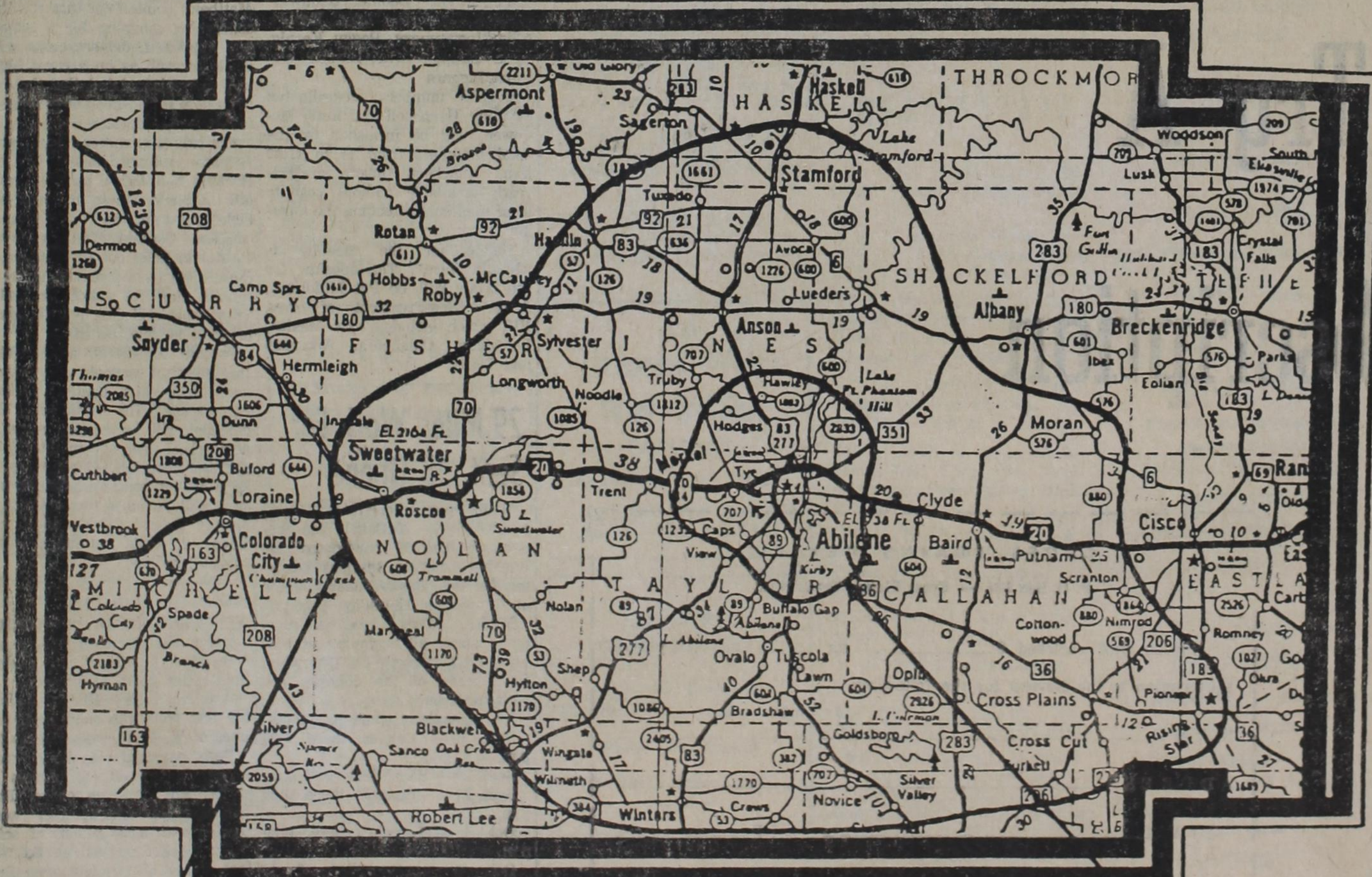
