Labor Day is a holiday honorring working people. It is observed as a legal holiday the first Monday in September throughout the United States, Puerto Rico and Canada. Labor organizations sponsor various celebrations, but most persons use it for a day of rest or recreation. It has also become a symbol of the end of summer. in Australia Labor Day is called "Eight Hour Day" and commemorates the successful strugle for a shorter working day. In Europe it is observed on May 1. Two men credited with suggesting a holiday to honor working people in the United States are Matthew Maguire, a machinist from Paterson, N. J. and Peter J. McGuire, a New York City carpenter who helped found the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners. These men played an important part in staging the first Laber Day parade in New York City in September 1882. Oregon was the first state to make it a legal heliday in 1887. President Grover Cleveland signed a bill in 1894 making Labor Day a national holiday



Matthews, Commander of the Texas Highway Patrol for the Abilene District. said all drivers are required to stop for school buses when the bus is stopped to load or unload sshool children and has its overhead red lights flashing. 


