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

But because Carver has assumed and agreed to pay the remaining balance owed on the Adam's contract. Brown isn't released from liability even though Carver has also become liable. The only one who can release him is Adams. Brown can't without Adams' permission, erase his name from the contract and make a stranger to the contract the only one liable under it. Adams has the right to hold Brown to his original promise.




