Interest money from the Permanent School Fund is divided and given to Texas public school districts by the Legislature. Traditionally, the fund is replenished by proceeds frem oil and gas leases on state lands which Mauro manages. State lands without cil and gas are leased for other purposes such as grazing, hunting.






