



This is not an exclusives list and other records may be acceptable.

Forms W-2 or self-employment tax returns for the past 2 years should be provided. These are needed because recent earnings reports may not yet be in Social Security records.

A husband or wife who also plans to apply should have about the same documents. A marriage certificate may be required, but is not needed in all cases. Information about any previous marriages is also needed.

Birth certificates of any young unmarried children should be oblained as well. Additional documentation may be required depending on the particulars of certain cases. 
