
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

## Maybe You Didn't Know

THE 9 MYTHS OF UNEMPLOYMENT

Third In The Series

MYTH NO. 5: Other nations do a better job of employing people than we do - there-

MYTH NO. 6: We need an industrial policy.

It is widely believed that the Japanese, the Germans, and the French are creating more jobs than we are. Since these nations have more government intervention in their economies than we do, industrial policy pundits claim that federal leadership must be the key to success. How wrong they are!

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MYTH NO. 7: The unemployed are suffering terrible hardships.

In the U.S. our national economictrauma centers around joblessness: it's the legacy of the Great Depression. Any narrative on the plight of the unemployed stirs us deeply, and over the past three yars, the media have made certain that there's been no shortage of such reports.

But behind the breadlines, what is the reality? How bad is it to be unemployed in

Joblessness is not pleasant. The fact that on occasion hundreds of people line up for a job opening gives evidence both of that and of the underlying work-ethic of most Americans. But the fact of the matter is that unemployment is no longer the crushing tragedy it used to be.

According to a recent Department of Labor survey, the average family income of unemployed persons is \$19,000: hardly starvation. This is largely because most Americans now live in two-or-more income units. (A situation in which there is more than one wage-earner takes the pressure off the unemployed to get back into the workforce.) And while unemployed compensation is not luxurious, it isn't so bad, either. Last year, unemployment benefits covered 61 percent of the average person's after-tax working income,

There's increasing evidence that unemployment and welfare benefits have grown se attractive as to serve as an enticement to some to stay out of the workforce. (This doesn't come as a surprise does it?) A study by economists Dan Heldman, James Bennett and Manuel Johnson determined that unemployment benefits slowed the job search of the unemployed an average of 1.6 weeks, at a cost of over \$2 nillion to the economy. A national analysis of welfare payment patterns by economist Warren Brookes revealed an interesting coincidence: the 15 states with the highest welfare payments also had very high levels of unemployment. The states with low benefits had the highest employment, and also the most economic growth.


