7th Graders Survey Opinions

A study of the differences between fact and opinion has prompted the seventh grade language arts class at Cross Plains Elementary to conduct an opinion poll. The students decided to choose two topics that would be of interest to most of the citizens of Cross Plains.

After lengthy discussion, the class decided to ask the following questions: "Do you think the United States was right to retaliate avainst Libya?"; Do you took cable networks should scramble their signals so satellite dish users cannot pick up the signal?"

A total of 392 people were surveyed. 208 people were asked about the retaliation against Libya. Shoemaker kept heading toward Forty males and eighty-seven females said they thought the United States was right. Four men and twenty-three woman felt

retaliation was not right. Twelve men and twenty-three women were undecided and nineteen people did not respond.

Nineteen men and twenty women were in agreement with cable networks scrambling their signals. Thirty-seven men and sixty-four women were against scrambling, and twenty-eight were undecided. The sixteen who did not respond made a total of 184 people surveyed about this que sion-

The students really enjoyed surveying. They did return to class with a different outlook on the many facets of opinion and how hard it is to get simple "yes" and "no" answers.

New SWCD District Elections Friday

The recently formed Callahan Divide Soil and Water Conservation District will hold elections this Friday, April 25th for the three remaining director positions says Steve Uselton, District Conservationist for the Soil

Conservation Service in Baird. The Callahan Divide SWCD which was certified for organization by the Secretary of State on April 9, 1986 has had two directors appointed to transact any necessary business until the remaining three directors are elected. The appointed directors are Charley Tom Straley in Zone 2, and Kenneth Geroge in Zone 4.

The following excerpt from the Texas Agriculture Code pertaining to

Soil and Water Conservation District Director Elections sets forth the qualifications to be an eligible voter and qualification to serve as a director: A person is eligible to vote in an election if the individual holds title to farmland or ranchland lying within the conservation district, is 18 years of age or older, and is a resident of the county which is included in the conservation district. If a family farm corporation owns farmland or ranchland in the conservation district they are entitled to one vote. The designated voting officer must be 18 years of age or older and must be a resident of the county which is included in the conservation district. In order to qualify to

serve as a director a person must be an eligible voter who owns land within the numbered subdivision or zone for which the person is elected and must be actively engaged in the business of farming or animal husbandry.

The elections for Zones 1, 3, and 5 are scheduled to be held in the Callahan County Courtroom this Friday, April 25th at 1:00 p.m., 1:15 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. respectively. Eligible voters are encouraged to at-
