I was expecting the usual thing with the "Mary says 'Hi' to John" content. There was very little of that (only in the song dedications). It mostly contained hard news, sharply written.

It even had an editorial. And it wasn't your usual student-newspaper piece of fluff either. It pointed up a problem when teachers dismiss their classes late and students are counted tardy in their next classes.

I realize the school administration has to keep control of this type of publication, but my hat is off to junior high principal Brian Barrows for allowing the students the freedom to print this type of editorial.

At Cross Plains, at the start of the school year, I was worried how we were going to cover the school news with the limited staff at the Review. Then, Carol Atchley and her mass media class came to the rescue.

The class is gathering and writing the news from the entire school from elementary on up each week and doing a bang-up job. They chose the title "C.P. Student Review" for their efforts and fill up a page each week in the newspaper. I'm told it's one of the best-read sections of the paper. It's no wonder.

"\$3 For A Football Ticket!"

Have you ever wondered just where the gate receipts go from the football games? Or how much money is actually brought in from the ticket sales? Or perhaps if the school is bringing in more money by being in Class 2A with the ticket prices higher?

Let's start with just how much money was brought in to the school as a result of football gate receipts. This year, there was a total of \$8,278.24 net revenue generated from those ticket sales. This was an increase of \$2,173.20 in net revenue over the total ticket sales of last year which totaled \$6,105.04. The difference is due in part to the increase in the price of the tickets. Adult tickets at the gate were \$3 in Class 2A compared to \$2 in Class A. Student ticket prices also rose from \$1 to \$2 (if purchased in advance).

The dividing of the gate receipts is also different this year from last year. Now the district will vote on the split. of the gate every 2 years. Except for Blanket, Baird and Rising Star, who have a contract with Cross Plains for a 50/50 split, the home team keeps the entire gate after all expenses of the

football game (that is paid at the time) is the cost of the referees. The amount they receive varies, and is based upon the total amount of the gate receipts for that game they worked. Their pay is figured on a standard scale established by the UIL ... the higher the gate receipts, the more the referees will receive. In addition, they are also given travel allowance based on .23 cents per mile traveled. This .23 cents is divided between all the referees, not given to each person. Although the mileage will be paid on 2 cars if the referees arrived separately. Their pay is subtracted directly from the gate receipts.

The money brought in after expenses are paid is used by the Athletic Department, although it is not the entire athletic budget. It is applied toward the total budget approved by the school board. It is used basically toward football expenses, but not exclusively.

The program consists of 3 parts: weight lifting, running and tumbling. The concentration is on the players becoming bigger, faster, stronger and more agile.



Old Iron-man, I called myself. Frankly, nobody else noticed. I had a boss who worked 40 years without missing a day due to illness. A man of steel he was.

It's part of the protestant work ethic. Or mayabe it's part of the Vince Lombardi syndrome. You've got to play with pain. Loyal employees we are - unselfish, dedicated and gutsy. The only injuries we ever suffered were from patting ourselves on the back too vigorously.

Other people I knew were always calling in sick. The slightest sniffle and it was off to bed for them. We might see them three or four days later. It took strep throat to keep me out for two days, and a nasty form of flu to put me out for the other.

Then again, maybe all those pats on the back were unwarranted. Is it really unselfish to go to work and Inflict your disease on your fellow employees? If priorities ever get straightened out the way they ought to be, it will probably be a firing offense to come to work in such a condition.

Bosses are as responsible as anyone, though. They encourage all of

this playing with pain. And like coaches in the NFL who do the same thing, in the end it winds up costing them severely.

The nation's businesses and industries lose billions every year due to labor losses. True, some employees will call in sick just so they can go fishing. They're not the problem, though.

Gung ho bosses and employees with martyr complexes are what

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brings industry to its knees. If the first person that caught the flu stayed home at the first sign of the illness, American production would skyrocket, don't you think?

Employees get intimidated, though. Unless they're on the very small "favored" list, they fear they might be replaced the first time they go to the sidelines. Others need the association of their colleagues. Staying home and watching the soaps is a form of torture worse than nausea. So they go to work and make their best friend's sick.

Do we need to change our attitudes toward illness in this country?" Or would this only encourage the weak to be weaker?
