Two Injured In Parmer Wreck



Two persons were injured Thursday night about 8:30 in a shattering two car collision 9 miles North of Muleshoe. Mrs. H. R. Monroe, Littlefield, and Harry H. Cantfield, 27, of Muleshoe were admitted to West Plains Hospital, neither believed to be injured seriously. Mrs. Monroe was riding with her husband when their car struck the Cantfield auto that was apparently parked on the highway. Occupants in the Cantfield car were Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Raulston, Leach Helker, 35 and a 14 year old girl, along with Cantfield. Highway Patrolman B. J. Van Winkle, assisted by Bailey County Sheriff Deputy, Bob Henderson, apprehended Cantfield at his home near the Y. L. Community after he left the hospital before a complete examination, and returned him to the hospital. Van Winkle said that as soon as Cantfield could be released from the hospital, he would be transferred to the Parmer County Jail and would be charged with 4 counts in connection with the accident. The Cantfield car was struck from the rear and was knocked an estimated 15 ft. and landed on its top, and the Monroe car traveled an estimated 35 ft. from the point of impact. Summer Reading Program Response Is Tremendous

Response has been tremendous with more than 404 books checked out in the first five 2-hour sessions of the Muleshoe area's first Summer Reading Program, local American Association of University Women sponsors announced Friday.

At mid-point of the 10-week reading program which enables youths from first grade through college-age to check-out books once a week from the Muleshoe Area Library building, over 143 New bookmobile library cards have been issued in Reading Club memberships. The total participating in the program is well

over the 155-mark, with 15 new cards issued this week, officials jubilantly said.

Book circulation has risen steadily each week, to the 404 mark with 98 checked out Wednesday. On June 24, the first day of registration, 63 books were checked out; total number was 72 the second session when 23 new cards were issued. The largest jump in new membership after the original 57 new registrants was on July 8 with 39 new cards issued and up 21 books to 96 check-outs.

Norman Bays, city attorney, stated that to his knowledge, there was no legal reason why the city could not establish a City Library or participate in a City and County Library.

All America Band Tour

(Editors Note: This following is the second and final part of a story written by Susan Birdsong concerning her recent European tour with the All-America Band. On the way to Milan from Venice we ate lunch in a town which is the birthplace of Roman poet Virgil. The meals in Italy are delicious but take at least one and one-half hours to complete. We noticed the toothpicks on the table were made of something besides wood. Further investigation proved them to be made out of a feather quill!

In Genoa, Italy, we had a skit party in one of the hotels. Each of the four buses was to put on an original skit. For some reason, all of the buses picked the tour for subject matter. Yet each skit was different and hilarious. At Nervi Park where we gave our concert to about 6,000 people, we received the first solid medal ever received in the tours history.

Nice, France, was one city which had been eagerly awaited by us all. Built on the French Riviera, it had attracted our attention as the place to relax and play for awhile. We spent all morning on the beach, most of us returning with a skin coloring not unlike that of a lobster! Frenchmen are exactly like the books tell the reader! The morning we went to the beach, a French

waiter at the hotel offered to go with us in his car. Of course, that was against the rules so we were able to get out of the predicament. Although Nice is a beautiful city with a beautiful beach, it had one drawback for us. Europeans think that all bands march. So march we did, for about two miles to our concert site. Everyone being sunburned and tired did not add to the joy of marching, but we managed to give an excellent concert, once we had arrived there.

At Grenoble, France we ran into a small difficulty. We had the very unusual pleasure of having bathtubs in our rooms. Usually, if a bathtub is in a hotel it costs 75 cents to use it. But these were free, and then we found the manager didn't like Americans and he wouldn't do us any favors. But a couple of boys got around him. They unscrewed the hand shower, fastened it to the faucet in the faucet in the basin, strung it up over the bathtub, and had their showers!

Lausanne, Switzerland is the music center of Europe. A musician who wants to find out if he is good goes first to Lausanne. If he is accepted in Lausanne, he is fit for the rest of Europe. We were quite thrilled, then when we received a standing ovation and had to play three encores. Although we had very little time to enjoy it, the scenery in Switzerland is even prettier than Germany.

Inside the Louvre were the originals of Mona Lisa, The Last Supper, and Winged Victory.

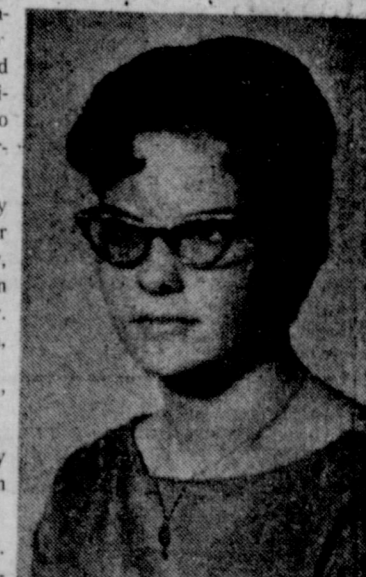

Wedding guests were registered by Jana Floyd, Lubbock, sister of the bridegroom.

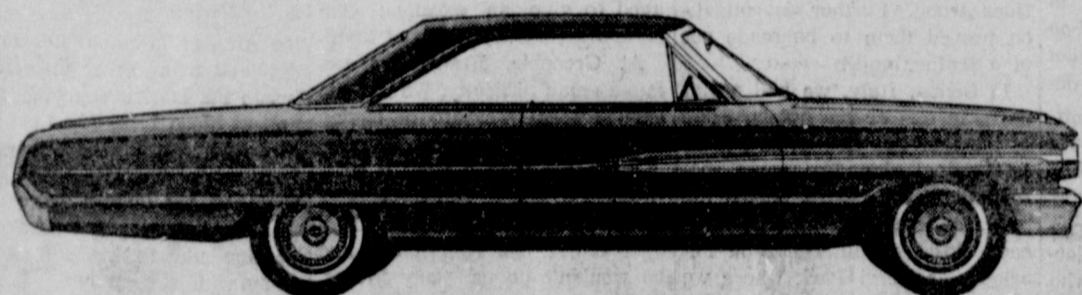

After a wedding trip to Red River, N. M., the couple will make their home in Lovington, N. M. where he is employed by International Harvester Co.

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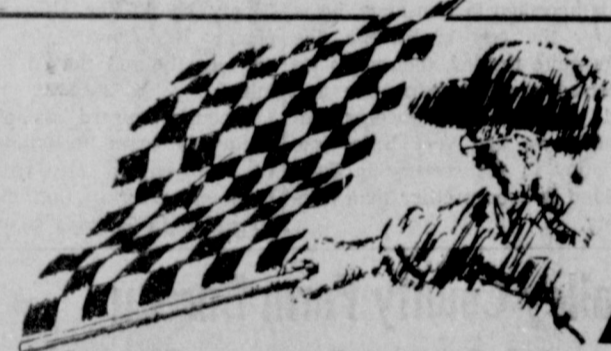


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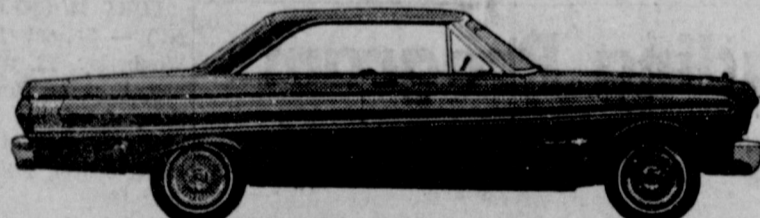
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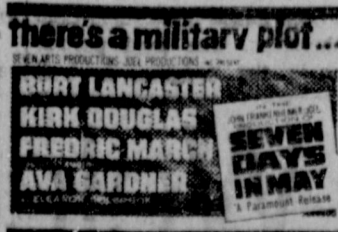

Pilate did not know what to believe or who to believe. Many of you, perhaps, are in the same situation. Thus the question, "What is Truth?" Sometimes we are tempted to say as David did in Psalms 116:11, "I said in my haste, all men are liars." But the irony of this is that it is true that all men are liars. But the lie is one of the products of the sinful nature of man. No one needs to teach the small child to lie, it comes naturally.

If Pilate had gone to the source of truth, which is the Word of God, the Bible; or if he had tarried long enough in the presence of Christ, he would have learned "What is Truth?"

Truth is personified in the person of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. He said, John 14:5, "I am the way, the truth, and the life; no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." He is the truth in person. Satan is a liar, and the Father of it but Christ is the "Truth". He it is whom you must believe. You can never doubt, nor have you reason to doubt His veracity.

Truth is manifested in the Bible, God's Holy, infallible Word. John 17:1 says, "... thy Word is truth". When all other books shall have been consumed by the flames of judgement, the Bible, which is the written "Truth", shall continue to live on through out eternity. Build your future upon it. It shall not fail. Satan and false teachers fear this book. It is truth. Though all the wicked hosts of Satan oppose the Bible it shall triumph.

One last thought about "Truth". Jesus said in John 8:32, Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free. And since He is the "Truth" in person, then He refers to Himself as the only one who can make you free. Do you know Him? If you know Him as Lord and Savior, He will make you free; free from sin and its' eternal consequences.

"What is Truth"? I refer you today to that Book of Books, the Holy Bible, which will reveal the answer to this question to your searching heart. The "Truth" is revealed there.

"I can confirm the rumor, but that's all."

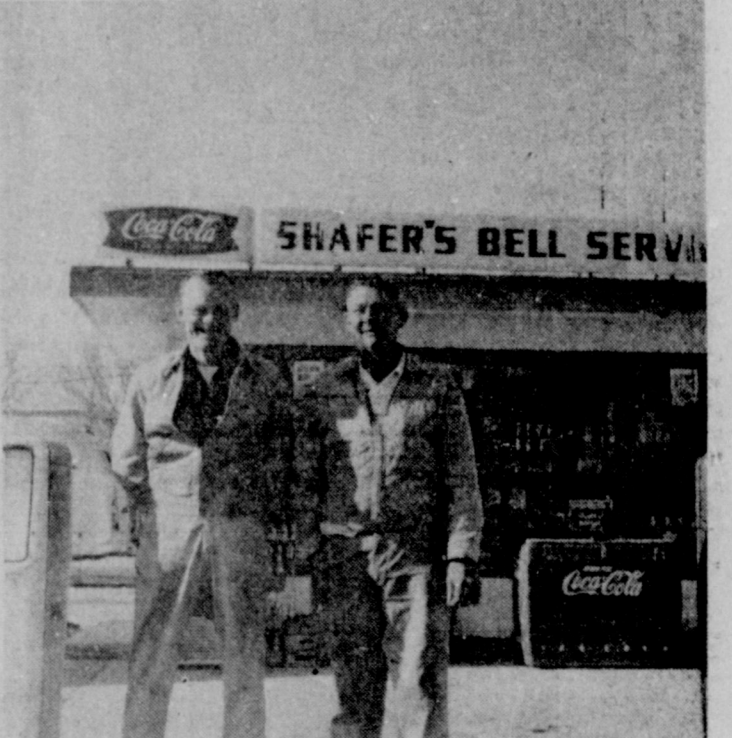
"Would you accept the nomination if offered?"

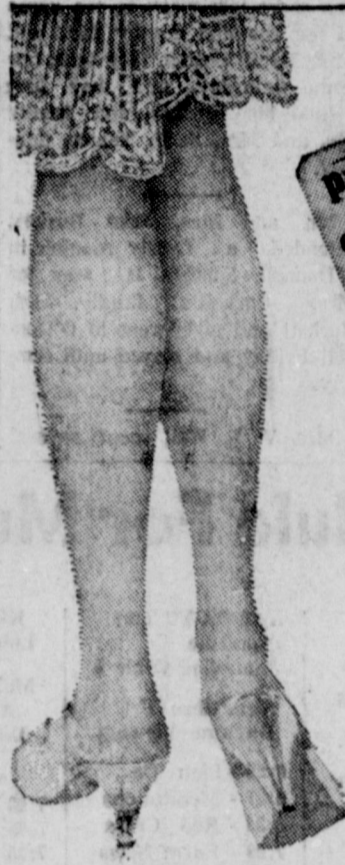
