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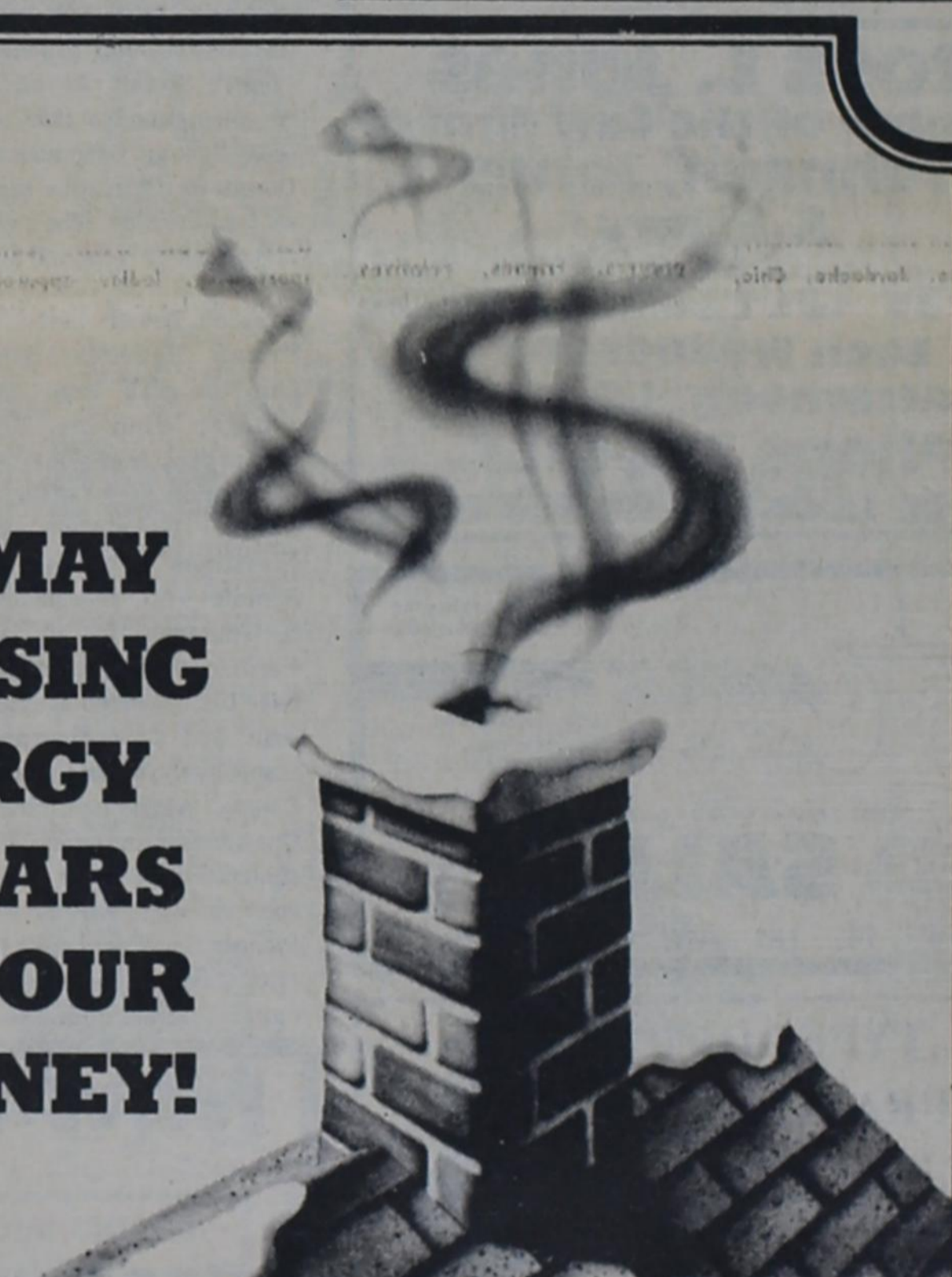

I hope to hear from more of you for next week's news.

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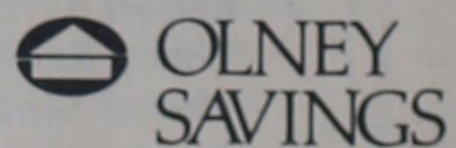
