This is my test, so I pick "C" as the correct answer, although the other two are also more or less correct when used in connection with "C".

And, with school will come that old favorite, theme writing. Recently, someone sent me an article from "Modern Maturity" magazine in which a college professor listed some of the best "bloopers" contained in papers written by his freshman history classes. Some of them are listed below:

"During the Middle Ages, everybody was middle aged. Church and state were cooperative. Middle Evil society was made up of monks, lords and surfs.

Teams Scoreless in Garden of Eden

The Cross Plains Buffaloes faced off against the Eden Bulldogs last Friday night in Eden. This was the first scrimmage for both teams in this young 1986 season. Although neither team was able to cross their opponents goal line, Cross Plains was able to drive the ball twice inside the Bulldogs 5 yard line, while not letting the Bulldogs reach inside the Buffaloes own 20 yard line.

The Buffaloes new 5-2 defense was able to hold the Bulldogs to a total of only 76 yards in 40 snaps of the ball. The Buffaloes were able to create problems for the Bulldogs offense creating 4 fumbles.

The Defense was lead by Alan Fleming with 5 Tackles, 1 Assist; David Taylor 5 Tackles, 1 Assist; Jesse Sibley 3 Tackles, 1 Assist.

The Buffaloes offense also had the opportunity to snap the ball 40 times during the scrimmage, and was able to accumulate a total of 201 yards against the Bulldogs defense.

Leading the offense was young Quarterback Gregg Weiss who rushed for 19 yards and threw for 85 yards. Weiss teamed up with Clay Richard-

son for a total of 54 yards, and Chris Brown for 19 yards. The offensive backs all saw action with Jesse Sibley 29 yards, Cody Odom 25 yards, Alan Fleming 11 yards, James Ames for 15 yards and Stacy Montgomery for 11 yards. The offense was without the services of Darin Apple who was held out of the scrimmage because of back injury. The offensive line of the buffaloes did a super job against the Eden defense.

The scrimmage went very well for the Buffaloes as they show lots of promise for the 1986 campaign. Coach Permenter stated, "All the boys played real well in the scrimmage and he was really excited about the defense that the team played. "The offense on the other hand is just a little bit behind the defense but that is to be expected," he said.

Board Seeks Drug Dog Use Here

The Board of Trustees for the Cross Plains Independent School District met August 21, for their monthly session.

The following topics were discussed and approved:

1. The Board approved a contract with Mr. Karl Maley for the collection of delinquent taxes in the Cross Plains Independent School District.

2. The Board approved a bid from Texas Courts and Windscreens for repairs to the school tennis courts. Total cost is \$4,900.

3. Under old business, the Board requested the Administration to contact the organization that sponsors the Drug Prevention Program, by use of the drug dogs, and asks again that CPISD be included as a participant in this program.

4. In regard to new business, the Board set lunchroom prices at the same amount as 1985-86.

5. In the financial report, the Superintendent advised the Board that the state revenue would be approximately \$20,000 less this year (1985-86) than projected. However, due to the increase in collection of delinquent taxes the revenue for the year should be adequate to meet expenditures.

6. The Superintendent was directed to contact contractors owning dirt moving equipment and compare the cost of cutting dirt from the south end of the stadium, as to hauling in dirt to elevate the north end, in preparation of beginning work on the proposed

track.

7. Bills were paid as presented.
8. Diane Stover was hired as elementary P. E. teacher, English as a second language teacher, Junior High Cheerleader sponsor and assistant coach. This completes the staff needed for the 1986-87 school year.

9. Lee Thompson, Leonard Wood and Ray Womack were appointed by the Board as approved teacher appraisers for 1986-87. The appraisal periods were set as September 2 - January 15 for Period 1 and January 19 - May 29 for Period 2. The instrument developed by the Texas Education Agency was approved by the Board for use as both career ladder placement and renewal/non-renewal of teacher contracts. An option was reserved for the addition of local items in regard to renewal/non-renewal of teacher contracts.

10. At his request, Donald Beeler was placed on medical leave as bus driver and Joe Coppinger was approved by the Board as temporary bus driver for 1986-87.

11. Randolph Jones was inadvertently left off the list of bus drivers for 1986-87 and this oversight was corrected at the recommendation of the Superintendent.

12. A bid was approved by the Board for treatment of the High School building for termites in the amount of \$2,700. This bid was awarded to A & B Exterminators of Abilene.

School Free Meal Policy Set

Cross Plains Public Schools announces its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program. Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility: (see income eligibility guidelines). Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income or the household's food stamp case number if they currently receive food stamps; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

State Rep. Taking Poll

Dear Friends,

As you know, the Texas Legislature is in the middle of a special session, called to deal with the state's budget crisis. This situation has been brought on by the drastic fall of oil prices, coupled with rising unemployment and a sluggish economy. Texans are used to dealing with hard times, and we will overcome our present difficulties.

Our leaders in Austin are divided as to the best course of action. Governor Mark White has proposed a temporary increase of the state sales tax, accompanied by some spending cuts and layoffs of state employees. Lt. Governor Bill Hobby has recommended increases in the sales and gasoline taxes and smaller cuts. Speaker of the House Gib Lewis wants no tax increases at this time, preferring to cut the budget now and reduce the size of state government. He believes that if a tax increase is necessary, it should be done next year, during the regular legislative session.

Many legislators are talking about raising state revenue through some form of legalized gambling, either pari-mutuel wagering, a state lottery, or both. Others believe these things would cause more problems than they solve and that the money raised from such proposals is not enough to justify their existence.

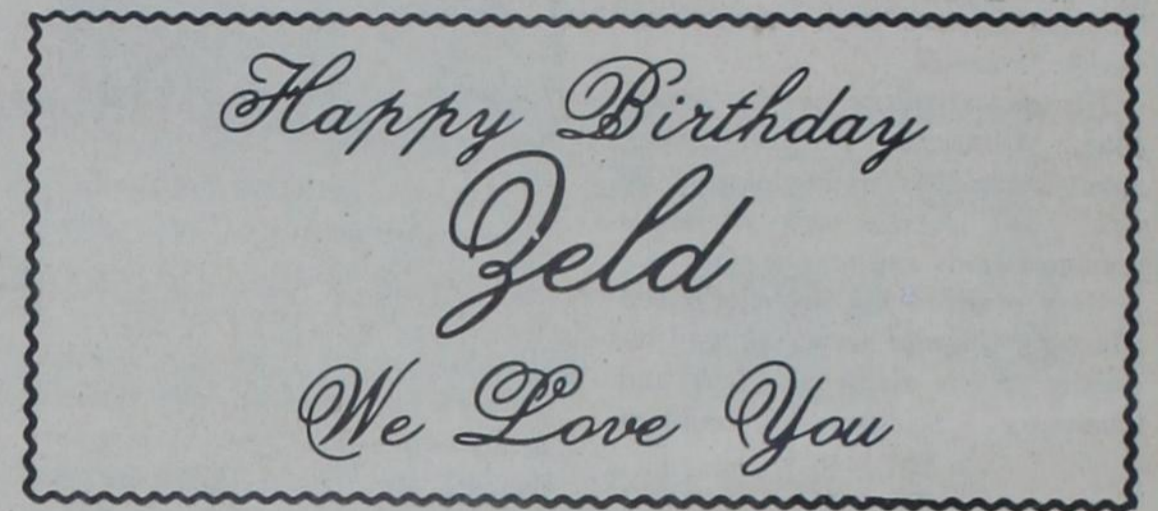

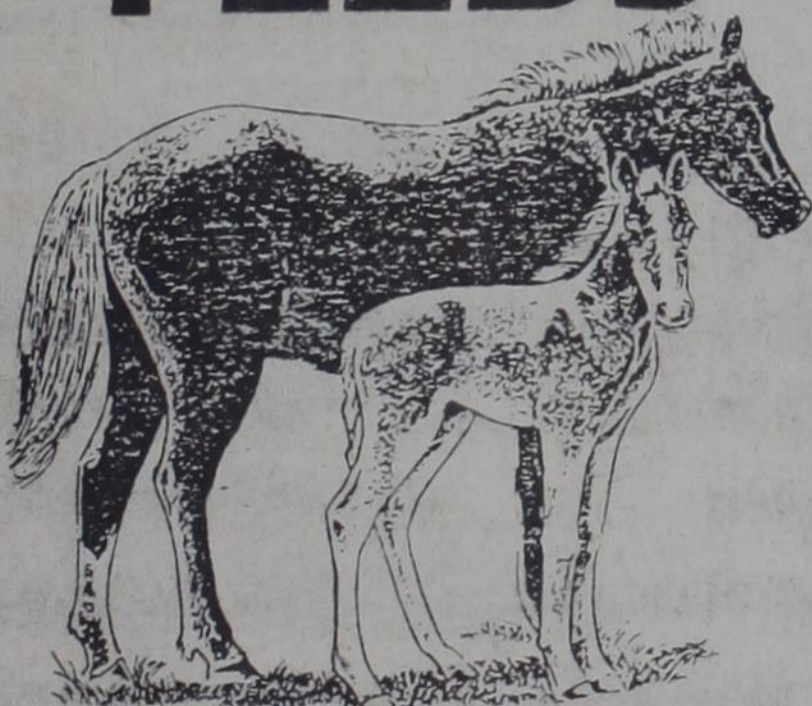

CAMPBELL STATED THE LAW APPLIES ON CITY STREETS AS WELL AS THE RURAL HIGHWAYS. HE ALSO STATED THAT DRIVERS MUST STOP WHEN APPROACHING THE BUS FROM EITHER DIRECTION.

THE ONLY TIME A DRIVER CAN LEGALLY PASS A STOPPED SCHOOL BUS IS FOR THE FLASHING RED LIGHTS TO BE TURNED OFF OR THE BUS DRIVER MOTIONS A VEHICLE TO PROCEED OR FOR THE BUS TO RESUME MOTION. ALSO, NO STOP NEED BE MADE IF THE BUS IS TRAVELING THE OPPOSITE DIRECTION ON A DIVIDED HIGHWAY. CAMPBELL WAS CAREFUL TO POINT OUT THAT IN EITHER OF THESE SITUATIONS, A DRIVER NEEDS TO REMAIN ALERT FOR STUDENTS WHO COULD DART OUT FROM THE BUS TO CROSS THE ROADWAY.

LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL FURTHER STATED, "WITH THE START OF SCHOOL, DRIVERS NEED TO BE EXTRA CAREFUL AROUND OUR SCHOOLS. THE CHILDREN WILL BE EXCITED ABOUT A NEW SCHOOL YEAR AND MIGHT NOT BE THINKING ABOUT ALL THE SAFETY RULES IN BIKE RIDING AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY, SO IT WILL BE LEFT UP TO THE MOTORIST TO PROTECT THEM."
