A History Book For Everybody

Every Callahan Countian ought to have one.

Even if you've lived here only a short time, I can't imagine a more fascinating book then the I Remember Callahan county history which recently came out sponsored by the County Historical Commission.

In the preface, Editor Hicks Turner (who did a bang-up job) tells us that no attempt was made to make the book an over-all history of the county.

"We have attempted to bring you stories written by people like yourself," Turner tells the reader.

That's what makes it great. The book contains the histories of nearly 800 county families, written by members of those families themselves. There is a certain charm, and honesty, when people write about something they have gone through themselves or something they heard from others in their families as

Personally, this book is going to be a valuable reference for my newspapers. It captures facts, and names, and dates that, had they not been written down, would probably have disappeared in years to come.

And for you newcomers to the county, I can't think of a better way to bone up on everything you would ever want to know about it than to spend a few hours reading this book. Just think, over coffee you can start tossing out names, and places, and dates and everybody will swear you've lived here forever.

Although the editor says it's not a definite county history, I found the various thumbnails on towns and events fascinating.

Paul Dulaney writes a great piece on the horrible tornadoes that struck Clyde in 1938 and 1950.

An old friend, Jack Scott, writes a piece I found especially interesting — a history of the Cross Plains Review. This might be explained by the fact that I purchased the Review last February.

But I think his history would interest anybody. I didn't know until I read it that the founder of the paper tried to form another county with Cross Plains as the county seat. (Having visited with some Cross Plainsmen these past few months, some might feel that might not be a bad idea today.)

The book's editor, Hicks Turner, has a tantilizing piece about mysterious Spanish dwellings, mines and treasure markings in the county.

I could go on and on, but the book has already been published. So why not just buy a copy if you don't have one and see for yourself.

Clyde Man SHL Candidate

Now there is no need to say that all politicians don't understand local residents.

If you are 60 years old or older and plan to vote in the first Texas Silver Haired Legislature on Friday, you do have someone who knows what it is like to live in Callahan County.

Paul S. Dulaney, 64, a Clyde native, is a candidate for District 3 of the legislature which includes Callahan County.

Balloting will be at senior citizens centers throughout Texas. Candidates must be 60 or over to run and voters age 60 or older to cast a ballot.

In Cross Plains, voting will be from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Friday, May 30, at the A.A.R.P. headquarters, 916 Main, just north of City Hall.

"Although the SHL is a first for Texas, it has been successful in 22 other states," said Dulaney, "Legislation recommended by those SHLs has been passed into law by State Legislatures."

The first Texas SHL was authorized by the 69th Texas Legislature in session last January. The bill provides for Senior Haired Legislators to meet at the State Capitol in September to draft proposed legislation of interest to the growing number of older Texas.

SHL-proposed legislation will then

be considered by the 70th State Legislature in session next January.

"This gives senior citizens a direct voice in state government," said Dulaney, "And we over 60s represent almost 20 percent of all registered voters in Texas," he added. According to the American Associa-

tion of Retired Persons: "Because persons 60 and over register and vote in much higher proportions than any other age group, older people comprise as much as 40-50 percent of the actual voters in many elections."

Dulaney a 1946 graduate of

Dulaney, a 1946 graduate of Abilene Christian University, he received a masters degree in journalism in 1949 from the University of Texas. He was later employed with the Abilene Reporter-News as oil editor.

Dulaney doesn't act like the ordinary politician. "I have never run for anything in my life and don't intend to again," he said jokingly.

Dulaney is facing six other candidates in District 3, which encompasses a 12-county area. Dulaney knows the area well. "I've been in most counties and spoke in most," he said. He said he stiffest comes from candidates from Sweetwater, Haskell and Snyder.

Silver Haired Legislators campaign at their own expense and receive no pay or other remuneration when elected.

Dulaney said his decision to run was that there was something he could do for the senior citizens in Texas. "We have no lobby in the State Legislature," Dulaney said, "but we are a special interest group."

He said that with 40-50 percent of all registered voters being age 60 or older, they need some direct representation. "The State Legislature will have a better understanding of the power of the senior citizens vote," Dulaney continued.

He said that there was several legislative pieces he and the A.A.R.P. would like to see implemented including: the rising cost of medical care, alternatives to the institutionalization of the elderly, effective regulation of utility rates and the preservation of the homestead exemption act.

Dulaney said that 116 Silver Haired Legislators from all over Texas will meet at the Capitol in Austin in September for three days to write, discuss and act on bills to present to the official State Legislature. The SHLs will meet earlier, for three days in July, to be trained by Capitol officials and elect their groups own of-

Although the Silver Haired Legislature project has many advantages to the senior citizens of Texas, one main advantage will be the impact the group makes on the State Legislature. "The SHLs will let them know us senior citizens are here," Dulaney concluded.

All the children, Edward, David, and the twins, Nancy and Bob, began and completed their public school education in the Cross Plains Schools.

People who knew Tommie Henkel here have strong memories about her. She was a member of the Baptist Church, spending many hours in the work of church groups. Also, one friend recalls how she and a neighbor on one occasion went for days to care for a friend's child, although they had to change clothing and sanitize themselves each time before returning to their own families. This type of service for Tommie was not unusual.

Also remembered are her cooking, her patience when David was a bed patient for weeks following his experience with a hot wire in a tree, and her amusing explanations for such inevitabilities as middle-age spread. During those years the optimism and humor with which she met the world were already strongly evident.

At 100, Tommie still plays the piano and enjoys lively conversation. Before losing her sight, she was also a talented artist.

Tommie's husband and Edward are deceased. David is retired from teaching anatomy at Brooks General Hospital in San Antonio. Bob is business manager for Houston Community College in Houston. Nancy Straley, with whom Tommie makes her home, is retired from the Austin Public Schools.





Savings Bond Sales Up 15 Percent

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds for the first two months of 1986 in Texas amounted to \$61,167,991, an increase of \$8,922,042 for 14.6% over the January-February 1985 period, T. J. Morrow, District Director for U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, announced today. These sales represent 16.5% of the state's 1986 assigned dollar goal of \$370 million. February sales of Series EE Bonds were \$33,072,650, an increase of 11.4% above February 1985.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$5,442.00 during February 1986 in Callahan County, James Eubanks, Volunteer County Chairman, said. The January-February 1986 total for the County was \$12,752.00, which represents 17.2% of the County's 1986 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, February 1986 sales of Series EE Bonds totaled \$520 million, an increase of 32% over February 1985 sales and marks the first time February sales exceed \$500 million since 1979. Sales of U. S. Savings Bonds for the first five months of Fiscal 1986 increased 40 percent and redemptions decreased 12 percent compared to the same period for 1985. Savings Bonds held by the American public reached an all-time high of \$80.83 billion during February.

Much of the sales growth can be attributed to the new market-based rate which was effective November 1, 1982. The current rate in effect (November 1985 thru April 1986) for Bonds held five years or longer is 8.36%. The average rate since November 1, 1982 is 9.69 percent. Bonds held at least five years earn 85 percent of the average rate on five-year Treasury marketable securities during the holding period or 7.5 percent, whichever is more. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN-The first Soviet fallout was recorded as minimal and no health threat in Texas last week, but the falling out between teachers and education reformers heightened.

Reformers who thought teachers would be appeased by their 97 percent success rating on the competency test were

Instead, the state's largest teacher group, Texas State Teachers Association, sued to have the test thrown out for racial discrimination.

About 18 percent of black and six percent of Hispanic teachers failed. Only one percent of Anglo teachers failed.

State Education Commissioner Bill Kirby predicted the lawsuit would be thrown out of federal court because the state took every legal precaution in giving the test.

Worse news issued last week: nearly half of public school students failed at least one part of the three-part basic skills exam, part of the 1984 school-reform law.

Budget Error Found

Even those who failed probably got off lighter than state employees after an error was found in the Comptroller's state spending report. One was fired; two resigned.

Comptroller Bob Bullock, who tolerates few mistakes, corrected his April report to indicate spending was up only one percent, not 25 percent as he reported two weeks ago.

Like a doctor tending a patient hourly, Bullock has been monitoring the ailing state budget monthly as Texas hurtles toward a projected \$1.3 billion deficit.

He has been critical of Gov. Mark White's austerity program for lacking the teeth to trim 13 percent in state agencies. Bullock's monthly scrutiny gives it teeth.

Texas House Summoned

House Speaker Gib Lewis plans to call all 150 state representatives to a one-day briefing on state spending, the budget and major education issues this month to prepare for the regular session in January.

His action underscores the governor's reluctance to call a special session this summer prior to the November elections. The Republicans want White to call one to cut the

Lewis, a Democrat who lives in what has grown into a GOP district, faces a Republican candidate, strength unknown.

Appointed Judges

Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice John Hill wants a new system to appoint state judges instead of electing them.

Reasoning that judicial candidates appeal to voters more by name identification than bench qualifications, Hill suggested that non-partisan committees submit a list of five names for each seat. The governor would choose one for Senate ratification.

Other Highlights

-Gov. White and his opponent, former Gov. Bill Clements clashed over the collection of a telephone tax that was repealed last session.

White told telephone companies to quit collecting part of the gross receipts tax which was eliminated when White signed a sales tax on some telephone services.

-The Texas Democratic Party confirmed that despite its efforts to repel followers of extremist Lyndon La-Rouche, some infiltrated via uncontested slots.

Clements criticized White

and his utility commissioners

for allowing the double taxa-

tion to take place.

The party also told Railroad Commission candidate P. S. Ervin he cannot use the nickname "Sam" on the ballot again since he could not prove it was commonly used the past two years.

Ervin capitalized the nickname to confuse voters' identification with the late North Carolina Sen. Sam Ervin and knock long-time party activist John Pouland out of a runoff with John Sharp.

-Andy Briscoe, who finished second in the governor's race, called for party unity but stopped short of endorsing White. Briscoe indicated he will run for some office again.

-Convicted serial killer Henry Lee Lucas said Attorney General Jim Mattox was right for criticizing law offi-


