1st Wine Grape Vines Planted

John Meister has become the first in the immediate Cross Plains area to plant what he hopes will become a new cash crop for the area.

Last Thursday, workers for a Ballinger winery planted 1,000 wine grape plants on an acre of Meister's land 3 1/2 miles north of Cross Plains off F-M 880.

Back in February, a public meeting was held in Cross Plains in which the Blue Bonnet Hills Vineyard, owned by Dr. Antoine Albert of Ballinger, was attempting to sell Callahan County residents on the idea of growing grapes for wine production. The meeting was well-attended and it was stated at the time the winery needed 500 more acres of grapes.

Meister agreed to plant one acre, which he said is costing him about \$6,000. However, he said when the acre gets in full production in five years, it can bring in \$6,000 worth of grapes in one season.

Meister explained the grape vines will not produce this first year, but should produce about a ton of grapes (for which the Ballinger winery is contracted to pay him \$600) next year. By the fourth year, the acre should be producing 4-6 tons of grapes and by the first year of full production the fifth year, it should be making 6-10

The vines produce a grape which produces a white wine, he said, and

figures he will spend about \$1,000 per year on the acre on maintenance. Meister said grapes flourish in

"poor" soil but that it must be loose and well-drained. Apparently the vines, while requiring a good amount of moisture, do not do well if they stand in water. The vines also like a good amount of sunlight, of which there is no scarcity in this area.

The Ballinger workers also installed a drip-irrigation system while planting the vines. Meister figures a water well which produces 12 gallons a minute will irrigate an acre with such

Meister said he had heard that someone about 10 miles northeast of him toward Cisco had also planted an acre of grape vines but that, as far as he knows, he is the only one in the immediate Cross Plains area to do so.







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pesticide changes TDA supports

(WASHINGTON)--A spokesman for the Texas Department of agriculture has endorsed the proposed changes in the national pesticide bill, saying "the failure to reregister old products is a national scandal which must cease."

Ron White, former Assistant Commissioner, Regulatory Division, testified before the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Department Operations, Research and Foreign Agriculture in favor of H.R. 4364. That legislation, which has been endorsed by both environmentalists and chemical company representatives, amends the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA).

White told the subcommittee, "We support the bill because it accomplishes some very interesting things. First and foremost, it gets the reregistration of the old chemicals on a faster track. I really do not think there is anything more important than this. At present, we find a problem with a product-and some of these problems have been quite serious--and everything stops until we

get the problem solved. What is needed is an orderly process that examines these products which are being used every day and gets them properly categorized and either reregistered or off the market."

White noted that EPA had been asked to finish reregistration of all pesticides by October 21, 1976, but that at the current rate of progress the job would not be completed this century. Reregistration involves evaluating the pesticide to ensure that it can be used without creating unacceptable risks to public health and the environment.

White said, "When I meet with farmers or consumers in Texas they all tell me that they believe that the pesticides they use have been tested and approved by EPA. When they find out that there are many products on the market which have not been tested, they are absolutely astonished. When they find out how long this situation has been allowed to go on, they get angry. I cannot blame them. Nor can I explain to them why it has happened.

White added that farmers and

farmworkers have a right to expect the pesticides they're exposed to are tested and they will not be put at undue risk if they follow instructions.

"Unfortunately, the regulatory system is not living up to expectations. Farmers do not want to end up with grain in their bins which has been treated with a pesticide that turns out to be a high risk carcinogen. The time to test pesticides is before they are used. Since in many cases we are already beyond that point, reregistration must have the highest possible priority. I do not think you would be asking too much to insist that this long-overdue work be done very promptly." White

White also supported the provision requiring the evaluation of so-called "inert" ingredients, noting inert does not mean benign and in some instances inert ingredients have been more harmful to people than the active ingredients.





AUSTIN-For a couple of days last week, Texas teachers looked like they were standing alone. Actually, we know now, they were just standing in the

middle. When the state's largest teacher group recently refused to endorse any candidate in the governor's race, they probably committed the one single act that will most influence the

outcome of the '86 race. Basically, they threw the gubernatorial election up for grabs, especially the Demo-

cratic primary nomination. Texas teachers refused to endorse Gov. Mark White, the man they propelled into office four years ago, and it has caused them to take a lot of

heat statewide. But there's no denying that teachers are now positioned to make or break White, to catapult Don Crowder or Andy Briscoe into the Democratic nomination, or to forge a new bond with Texas Republicans Bill Clements, Tom Loeffler or

Uncertainty Factor

Kent Hance.

Certainly not all teachers vote Democratic, but the members of the teacher groups that endorse candidates traditionally support the Democratic ticket.

Although they snubbed White and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, the Texas S'ate Teachers Association did endorse the rest of

the Democratic ticket. And while some politicos concluded that teachers were committing political suicide by biting the hand of their only reasonable choice for governor, the teachers themselves obviously felt the need to flex their

political muscle. With that in mind, they injected "the uncertainty factor"

into the governor's race.

Door Left Open Make no mistake, teachers left the door open to Mark White, but it's also open to Crowder and Briscoe, who are both actively seeking the teachers non-public, word-of-mouth

endorsement. And it's also open to Repub-

White's strategy has been to ignore Crowder and Briscoe. and try to deprive them of

credibility as viable candidates. But both of the political newcomers have kept on campaigning and have closed the gap considerably on White, making inroads not only in labor, rural and minority sec-

tors, but also in Austin. Considering the number of votes the teachers can bring to a primary election, it's reasonable to speculate that they now, or will soon, hold the clout to force White into a primary

runoff. Free From Formality

Since they haven't formally endorsed any candidate, they're technically free to side with or oppose White in the runoff election and even the general election, or go fishing.

Practically speaking, recon-ciliation doesn't seem likely, since White appears bent on making political points with the parents and others who support his education reforms. He's free from formality, too.

Six months ago, it was unthinkable that White would be vulnerable to a challenger in his own party primary.

Many people still do not accept the idea, but the teachers' bold move now makes the unthinkable possible. And what they do in the next two weeks could make it a reality.

GOP Race Close Whether a heated up Democratic primary will affect the turnout in the Republican primary is a question analysts

can't answer. Most polls indicate that former Gov. Clements leads the field, and that a small turnout would probably favor him and

Loeffler over recent convert Kent Hance. In fact, strategists in those races are not counting on any new ingredients-just the

Volunteers Needed For Local Nursing Homes

The West Central Texas Ombudsman Task Force is a volunteer group currently seeking volunteers from Callahan County to assist in local nursing homes. The Ombudsman Program is mandated by the Older Americans Act which is administered by the West Central Texas Council of Governments through the Texas Department on Aging. At this time, there are no Ombudsmen in Callahan County.

Ombudsmen are advocates for nursing home residents and their families. They are trained and certified by the Texas Department on Aging in conjunction with the Texas Department of Health. In their roles as advocates, the Ombudsmen attend inspections and public hearings conducted by the Texas Department of Health in long term care nursing facilities. The Ombudsmen may also refer complaints to the Texas Department of Health for investigation.

The West Central Texas Council of Governments serves the 19 counties of West Central Texas as the Area Agency on Aging. It is the hope of Dr. Jon Ashby, Professor at Abilene Christian University and Chairman of the Ombudsman Task Force, that Callahan County will soon be served by a local Ombudsman.



Statewide "Adopt-a-Highway" Program

A statewide "Adopt-a-Highway" program, aimed at increasing community involvement in Texas' antilitter campaign has been kickedoff by the highway department.

Under the new program, civic organizations can adopt a section of highway, and are responsible for picking up the litter along that segment at least twice a year. The program was conceived last year in the Tyler Highway District and is apparently the first of its kind in the nation.

In 1984, the highway department was spending \$20 million annually on the litter problem. In response to an appeal by Highway Commission Chairman Bob Lanier, the Tyler District started an intensified campaign against litter. In early 1985, Billy Black, Public Affairs Officer for the district, conceived the idea of organizations adopting highways.

Thus far, some ninety groups have adopted sections of highway throughout the Tyler District. They range from the Tyler Civitan Club to the Tyler/Smith County Juvenile Detention Center. The Tyler District of the highway department includes Anderson, Cherokee, Gregg, Henderson, Rusk, Van Zandt and Wood Counties. The program has been a tremendous success in the Tyler area, and now the department wants to try it statewide.

Guidelines for initiating and managing Adopt-A-Highway programs have been sent to the other 23 highway district offices. Once an organization has adopted a stretch of highway, the department will place signs at each end of the two-mile section, giving credit to the adopting group.

The new Adopt-A-Highway program complaments Texas' other antilitter programs that include a media and education campaign, funding for increased law enforcement, and support of the Governor's Community Achievement Award's for civic beautification.





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
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
