Bear With Me

If the *Review* is not quite up to standard this week, please bear with me.

My becoming its owner and publisher has come on kind of suddenly.

Ten days ago, I had no idea I would be writing this column, then an old friend, Jack Scott, called. He informed me of Benny Glover's death; one thing led to another and four days later I'd bought the newspaper.

Jack had been putting out the paper the past several weeks during Benny's illness but wanted to get back to taking care of his own affairs so my take-over of the paper was immediate.

It's not the easiest thing in the world to do to walk into a newspaper office and start putting out the paper on the spot, but it had to be done, and my wife and I are doing it with a lot of help from Becky Odom and Lee Morris who had worked for Benny previously.

After I bought the paper, I got to thinking that I have some pretty good ties to Cross Plains. Mrs. Sterling Odom and Mrs. Voncille Gibbs of the Cross Plains area are my first cousins. Their father and my uncle, the late Bert Tabor, built the landmark brick home in the 1920's which still stands across the highway south of the Rowden store.

My grandfather and grandmother, the late Mr. and Mrs. A.H. Nelson, operated a small grocery store and filling station on Main St. across from the school for a few years back in the late 1940's and I visited there quite a bit as a boy.

And, I'm not totally unfamiliar with the area either. About twice a year my wife and I have to have a "fix" by taking the beautiful country-road drive from Admiral to Cottonwood through the mountains. (She's originally from Arkansas so she calls them hills. I'm an all-my-life West Texan so I call them mountains.)

I've been coming over here from Clyde daily since buying the paper and I've met a number of you, so I feel like I've already got some friends here. (Incidentally, on a scale of 1 to 10, I'd rate Cross Plains an 11 on the nice-people chart.)

Several of you have asked us if we plan to move to Cross Plains. It's tempting (the fact that you don't levy city taxes here makes it even more so) but we own a home and business in Clyde and have long and strong ties there, so it would be impossible.

I don't want this to sound like a glorified help-wanted ad, but while I'm on the subject, I need some help with reporting and writing the news for the *Review*.

I'm seeking somebody with some news-writing experience who's familiar with the community and is also well-respected in it. It wouldn't be a full-time job but there would be several hours a week involved.

Through the years, the *Review* has had the reputation of being a top-notch community newspaper. I'll just say that I'm going to do my best to maintain that reputation.

Don Tabor Buys Newspaper Here

The 77-year-old *Cross Plains Review* has been purchased by Don Tabor, owner-publisher of the *Clyde Journal* in Clyde.

A sales contract was signed Feb. 17 between Tabor and Carolyn Glover, widow of Benny Glover who passed away two weeks ago after a long illness.

Tabor, 49, has owned the *Clyde Journal* for 10 years. Prior to that, he worked in the editorial department of the Abilene Reporter-News for 18 years.

He is a graduate of Clyde High

School and holds a journalism degree from North Texas State University in Denton.

For the time being, Tabor will serve as editor of the *Review* as well as publisher. His wife, Betty Joe, 47, is advertising director.

Becky Odom and Lee Morris, who had been working in the *Review* office, will continue their employment there.

Tabor said a full line of office supplies for sale has been added to the *Review* off at 155 E. 8th St. and a copier for public use will be added soon. Commercial printing will also continue to be done out of the office.

Elgin Katt led the Buffs of District 29-A in scoring with 24 points Friday, followed closely by Tony Evans with 22. Clay Richardson tossed in 10 points for Cross Plains while Devin Koenig

had 7. Jerry Katt had 6 and Dennis Atchinson had 5.

Evans had 8 offensive rebounds and Koenig had 4 defensive rebounds. Elgin Katt led in assists with an even dozen. Elgin and Jerry Katt, Evans, Richardson and Koenig all had two steals each.

The Buffs were actually behind at halftime, 34-30, but had captured the lead, 50-49 by the end of the third quarter.

Jim Taylor, candidate for county judge of Callahan County, subject to action of the Democratic primary, has issued his official statement to voters in anticipation of the upcoming campaign.

DECISIONS MUST, NEVERTHELESS, BE MADE. Legislation currently being passed down from our State Government could impose an enormous tax burden on our County if knowledgeable decisions are not made.

When I served as a delegate from Callahan County to the State Democratic Convention in 1980, I realized that our County does not receive its fair share of available State and Federal funds. I believe that efforts should be made to remedy this situation.

I understand that the primary responsibility of the County Judge is Administration. I realize, however, as a graduate of the Abilene Police Academy and a former law officer, that if the Judicial responsibility of the Judge is not executed in a prudent manner it can prove to be a demoralizing factor to the law enforcement officers of this County.

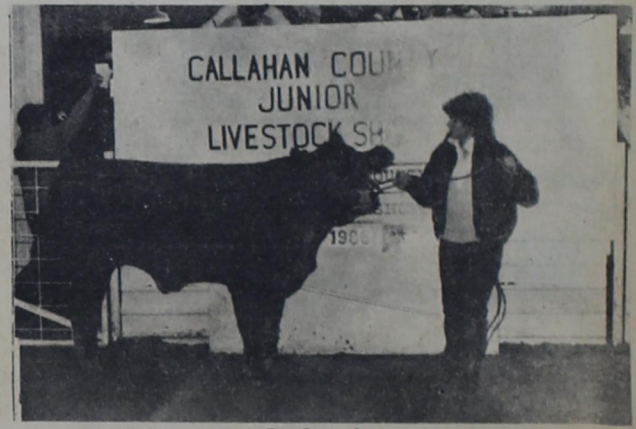

TEACHERS SPEAK OUT

We, as teachers in Texas, are tired of being verbally attacked, belittled, and degraded by our present governor and legislature.

In a swift, insensitive move, Texas legislation has destroyed the dignity and credibility that was once afforded the teaching profession.

We believe the public should be aware of the following:

1. We feel it is wrong that control of our schools has been removed from the local level. School administrators and members of the local school boards, who were elected by members of the community in true American fashion, are now powerless and voiceless, and have become a rubber stamp organization subject to the whims of our present governor and big business.

2. We feel it was wrong for the governor to remove members of the State School Board, who were elected in true American fashion, and to replace them with appointed individuals sympathetic to the governor's wishes.

3. We are now being forced to take a test. We are not being tested over what we are teaching. The "test" cannot possibly evaluate the attributes and qualities of a good teacher! It cannot test how a teacher relates to a child's needs or how he or she can present materials to be learned.

We also know every town in the state of Texas is different. As a result, teachers who are effective in one town may not be effective in another. Who is to say that a blanket policy will work? Only local people know who is effective in local education.

4. Our LIFETIME certificates are invalid, as of this date, until we pass the T.E.C.A.T. We have passed many tests to get our degrees. May of us hold numerous certificates and Master's degrees! Is all of this time and effort to be wasted on one test? If documents such as lifetime state teaching certificates can be ruled invalid as easily as a stroke of the governor's hand, couldn't deeds, ownership titles, or any documents be "waved" invalid?

We as teachers would like to know that if we do take the test and pass, what will be the tenure of our certification at this point?

5. At present, FIVE MILLION DOLLARS of the taxpayers' money has

been spent just to manufacture this test. This money was spent out of our state in North Carolina. We know that this sum will be multiplied many times because of administering, scoring, reporting results, and retesting. It is a shame that this money is not being spent on Texas students who could benefit greatly from it!

6. It has been pointed out in newspapers that due to a teacher shortage created by the test, teachers who will be leaving the profession, and a hesitancy of young teachers to enter the profession because of low pay, we will be 15,000 teachers short next year. This void could be filled by a surplus of teachers from West Germany. (Note: Abilene Reporter News and Dallas Morning News, Feb. 9, 1986.)

7. We ask the question: "Would other professions put up with this?" This test for them and us could wipe out years of credentials, licenses, and certifications.

8. It is because of the deliberate intention to fail 10 to 12% of teachers that after a sample test was given in October, 1985, to 5,000 Texas teachers, and such a small percent failed; the test was revised and made harder so the 10 to 12% failure goal would be reached.

9. This test has become very commercialized. This is evidenced by people from T.E.A. who helped write the test and are, at present, charging \$30 to \$60 for workshops and stress tapes. Someone is getting rich with this little sideline!

10. We are NOT AFRAID of this test, but it is an insult to our profession! Why are the teachers the "whipping boys"? Why not test other professionals as well?

11. We have been told that we cannot eat, drink, or even go to the bathroom without a monitor when we take the test. We cannot take anything to the test site such as purses, items in pockets, etc. Can you imagine being forced to sit in one place from 4 to 4½ hours without having something to eat or drink, and having your bathroom privacy violated? We are being treated like criminals!

12. This test has been grossly misrepresented as a simple reading and writing test. It is a tricky test where many answers to the complicated questions have at least two answers that appear correct. These answers are being decided by the grader or the test maker. So please, do not be misled by our governor; this is a very complex and complicated test.

13. We have also been further insulted by their saying we have to have a drug test! Once again, we are NOT AFRAID of the drug test, but the question is "Why teachers?"

14. In closing, all we ask is that before you jump on the bandwagon against your teachers, pick up the phone, call, and ask for some information about the issues from a teacher. You will be surprised to find out how well-informed most of us are about the issues. We ask you to become informed from our side before you condemn us.

This year it is the teaching profession. Next year, what profession will it be? It could be yours.

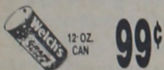
