"Dear son, "Today  
"I'm writing this slow cause I know you can't read fast. We don't live where we did when you left. Your dad read in the paper where most accidents happen within twenty miles of home, so we moved.

"This place has a washing machine. The first day I put four shirts in it. I pulled the chain and hadn't seen them since.

"It rained twice this week, three days the first time and 4 days the second time.

"The coat you wanted me to send you. Your Aunt Sue said it would be a little too heavy to send in the mail with them big heavy buttons, so we cut them off and put them in the pockets.

"We get a bill from the funeral home, said if we didn't make the last payment on Grandma's funeral up she comes.

"Your Uncle John fell in the whiskey vat. Some men tried to pull him out but he fight them off playfully so he drowned. We cremated him. He burned for three days.

"Three of your friends went off the bridge in a pick-up. One was driving, the other two were in the back. The driver got out. He rolled down the window and swam to safety. The other two drowned. They couldn't get the tailgate down.

"Not much news this time. Nothing much has happened. Write more later.

"P.S. I was going to send you some money but already had this sealed.

Adult plates will be \$4 and children 12 and under \$2. Deliveries will be made to shut-ins by calling 725-6114. Carry outs will also be available.



## Randy Taylor Hired As Band Director

At the March 18 meeting of the Cross Plains Independent School District Board of Trustees a motion was approved to offer Randy Taylor a contract as band director and music teacher for the 1987-88 school year.

Mr. Taylor has accepted the contract and will be a member of the faculty for the 1987-88 school year.

Taylor received a B.S. Degree in Music Education from Tarleton State University in 1975 where he graduated with honors. He has an Associate of Arts Degree from Cisco Junior College, 1973, and graduated from Cisco High School in 1971.

He has been the Music Director at

Wylie Independent School District since 1983.

Prior experience includes Music Director at Clyde Consolidated Independent School System, 1980-1983, which included programs in elementary, junior high, and high school band for Clyde and Hamby campuses.

Taylor was the Band Director at Rising Star High School 1979-80 and from 1977-78 at Smithville High School. He was also the Music Director at the First Methodist Church of Smithville during that time.

During the period 1975-77, he was the band director at Baird High School.

He was a member of the National

Guard Band from 1972-79 (Honorable Discharge, 1979) where he toured extensively with this group.

Mr. Taylor has also been an independent building contractor since 1974.

## Board Eyes Break, 'Fridays Off'

The Board of Trustees met in regular session on April 15. Action was taken by the board on the following issues:

1. Approval was given to participate in the Chapter 1 and 2 Coop sponsored by the Education Service Center 14 in Abilene for the 1987-88 school year.

2. The 1987-88 school calendar was discussed in regard to the opening of school, to have a spring break or continue the "Fridays Off" holidays, and the close of school. Current state regulations set September 1 as the earliest that school can open for the year and school cannot continue past the end of May. School holidays are set by the local board and administration. In the discussion, it was pointed out by the administration that students were given 10 absences per year to be used for extracurricular activities. By scheduling "Fridays Off" to correspond with extracurricular activities the students

can participate in additional activities and do not have days at school when so many students are gone. Due to extracurricular activities it becomes impossible to hold class. It was also mentioned that the current trend is to hold extracurricular activities after school hours or on Saturday. While this trend does reduce the days of school a student might miss during the year it also is forcing the student to choose between extracurricular activities as more and more activities are moved to Saturday. No decisions were made at this time concerning the 87-88 calendar pending any changes from the state office.

3. The board approved a delinquent tax collection contract with Calame, Linebarger, and Graham Law Offices in Austin. It was noted that Callahan County had approved a similar contract a few days earlier in the week with the same firm.

## Kindergarten Signup Set

Parents are asked to pre-register their children who will enter Kindergarten next fall. All children who will be 5 on or before September 1, 1987, may attend Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a basic part of the Cross Plains School System and the service is available to all students.

Parents are asked to call 725-6123 or come by the elementary principal's office to pre-register their child this week, May 4-8. A screening schedule will be arranged for May 12 for each child. The screening will take about 60 minutes. Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills, language ability, and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time. Parents will be given a report on their children's progress at the time of the screening.

Parents are reminded that to enter

school in Texas the student must have a state approved birth certificate and a current immunization record. Immunization requirements include: 3 in a series of DTP and/or a booster after age 4, oral polio series, measles, mumps, and Rubella. Please bring the birth certificate and immunization record at the time of registering, asks principal Ray Womack.

Early childhood screening will be conducted at the same time as regular Kindergarten screening. The Early Childhood program is to help those children age 3-6 who show to be developmentally delayed or handicapped in any way. If you have, or know of a child who might benefit from this service, please contact the Elementary School office during Kindergarten registration.

## Scholarship Winning Essay

Troy Harris was the winner of the Beta Sigma Phi Senior essay contest and the entirety of his composition follows:

### IF YOU WERE A PARENT, WHAT STANDARDS WOULD YOU SET FOR YOUR TEENAGER?

Being the parent of a teenager is definitely not an easy job. Neither is being a teenager. Teenagers travel many rough roads and often don't know which way to turn. One road leads to God, another leads to drugs, up ahead there's sex, and the road goes on and on. Parents are often the deciding factor to which roads their children choose. The choice may be excellent or horrible. Parents are often given credit for excellent choices made by their child when actually no credit is due. But parents are also blamed many times for a horrible decision their child may make, and this isn't right either. Parents can only do so much. In this essay I will explain what standards I would set for my teenager to keep him or her on the safest roads.

As a parent I think, first and foremost, a close relationship would need to be established with my teenager. Little things like sharing activities together, showing interest in his or her activities at school, and just having one on one conversations about what's happening in his or her life. I feel that if I show my teenager that I care, I will receive more love and respect from him or her.

Another accomplishment I'd like to make is getting to know my teenager's friends. Peer pressure can cause even the best kids to try very stupid and dangerous things. Whether my child had a girlfriend, boyfriend, or was most likely to be with some buddies, I would like to know these people. Drugs and alcohol are examples of what the wrong

friends might present to my child. This is why I would at least attempt to make sure my teen is with, what I would consider, the right people. If I allow my child to get involved in alcohol or drugs, it could be the equivalent of killing him or her. Both drinking and especially drugs lead to so many deaths and crimes it's pathetic, and most parents, including myself, don't want to spend their entire life raising kids so they can kill themselves or become criminals.

The way I look at it the sooner my child has good, dependable friends, the sooner my child will be going out, going to town, dating, etc. Some may call this blackmail. Maybe it is, but if blackmail is what it takes to save my teen's life, that's what I'll do. Truthfully, I don't believe choosing my child's friends would be fair, but it certainly wouldn't hurt to make some strong suggestions.

I strongly feel Christ can be very important and very helpful during the teenage years. If my teenager believed in Christ, understood Christ, and went to Christ for answers, I would feel more secure with the roads my teenager would choose to travel over the years. I don't think a teen should be forced to go




