local administrator, I became very aware of the services provided and the personal needs of their forty occupants.

The residents of the home represent a wide array of occupations including a teacher, a constable, farmers, oil field workers, a welder and inventor, ranchers, stenographer, a bookkeeper, a store clerk, homemakers, and a professional seamstress.

Although backgrounds differ, they have common bonds which the staff of Colonial Oaks strive to provide including maintenance, good health, happiness, and retention of their dignity. Frances replied, "Meeting these goals are the main objective of our work, plus trying to obtain a home-type environment for each individual.

A schedule of a week's activities at Colonial Oaks includes Bingo games twice a week, which are the all time favorite entertainment.

One day a week they have what they refer to as "work day" when they fold the linens. This was reported as one of the most fulfilling days, because it made them feel useful. Peggy Hilburn, LVN, said, "They make sure everything is in order so that they can participate and do their part."

Art classes are available one day a week and Linda Edington, activity director, supervises the lessons, and co-ordinates all the special activities.

Wednesday morning volunteers from at least five churches bring musical programs which the residents thoroughly enjoy. Dorothy Reynolds and Ruby McCowen provide musical entertainment one day a week. Nelda Holmes and Nita Fortenberry also provide

Nelda Holmes and Betty Beggs read to the ladies one day a week. Domino games are enjoyed by the men, while some love to play other types of games.

Joy McKenzie, a physical therapist aid, comes to the home three days a week to do exercises with some of the patients who have suffered from strokes or those with severe arthritis.


The newest volunteer is Ozella Huddleston of the Pioneer community. She has been cutting and rolling hair for some of the women.

CPISD Going After Delinquent Taxes

If you have delinquent school taxes unpaid from the Cross Plains ISD, the school board there is fed up with the unpaid taxes and is now doing something about it.

Cross Plains ISD school board members recently acquired the services of Calame, Linebarger & Graham, a law office in Austin, to collect the school district's delinquent

Board members, along with Callahan County commissioners, recently hired the firm to collect delinquent taxes after having trouble getting delinquent taxes with the previous delinquent tax collection attorney.

Cross Plains ISD superintendent M. Lee Thompson said recently that board members did not renew the contract with the previous collection attorney because "we could not get him to go beyond the letter writing phase" of the collection process. Thompson said the school district could never get the law firm to the county courthouse to proceed with the intent to sue.

The Cross Plains superintendent said that after checking up on the Austin law firm, he has no reservations about giving them a try. "Perhaps we were a little too eager before," in hiring a collection attorney Thompson noted.

The Austin law firm, which specializes in the collection of delinquent taxes, will charge the school district 15 percent of the amount of delinquent taxes it collects. The Cross

The Country Club is located on Highway 36, midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star.

Plains superintendent said that as soon as the school taxes become delinquent a 15 percent penalty is added so the school district will still get its full amount of taxes.

Thompson also said that another reason board members hired the Austin firm is that it also collects delinquent taxes in Brown and Coleman counties.

Callahan County assessor/collector Wauneta Estes said that the Cross Plains school district has \$170,000 in delinquent taxes in the four counties that comprise the school district; Callahan, Brown, Eastland, and Coleman. Thompson said that there are also some inactive accounts and there is a legal process that must be performed to get those accounts off the books.

Thompson said that the Austin law office will begin immediately proceedings to collect 1984 and 1985 delinquent taxes owed the school district. Delinquent taxpayers will be receiving a letter of intent to sue and will be given 60 days to settle the account. If the taxes are unpaid the school district can claim the property and auction it off.

"The school board is ready to go to court," to collect the unpaid taxes Thompson said, "but realistically we'll work something out including

working out a payment schedule." Thompson said not everyone in the Cross Plains school district is out of a job and unable to pay their taxes.

"We're talking about some still in business here and others that still have jobs. It's not fair for your neighbor to pay and not you," said Thompson. Thompson added that people in Cross Plains are aware of the problem of delinquent taxes and realize everyone ought to be sharing in the paying of

taxes. The school superintendent said that the problem of delinquent taxes is not just isolated to Cross Plains, that communities like Cross Plains with oil related businesses all seem to be having trouble collecting taxes.

He said that financially the Cross Plains school district is not having problems. "We're a conservative school district with a conservative board and we live within our buget," Thompson said. He also noted that previous Cross Plains school boards had allocated funds for school improvements that could be used in case of emergencies. He did add, however, that these funds were to be used to possibly add a couple of classrooms to meet 22-1 student to teacher ratio per classroom required by the state. "The only other way to bring in revenue is to raise taxes or call a bond issue and I don't anticipate a bond issue would pass now," Thompson mentioned.

Supt. Thompson said that although the school district was financially sound, that this year was the first in six years that uncollected delinquent taxes were included in the school budget expenses.

Other equipment on the rescue unit include forceable entry tools, such as axes, bolt cutters, and hand tools; breathing equipment such as air packs; fire extinguishers; extra air bottles for air packs, tank battery foam for oil and gas fires; foam eductors; life jackets and floaters for water accidents; ropes and chains; and medical supplies including oxygen and trauma kits. Stretchers and back boards are yet to be provided.

Volunteer firemen are currently attending EMS training to become Emergency Care Attendants. Their final test will be June 16, then they will be certified with the Department of Health.

Mike McClure, Jr., Tim Bishop, Jimmy McNutt, Bill Reed, Rex Beggs, Les Cowan, Eddie Wyatt, Alvin Hutchins, and Balinda Wyatt have been volunteering their time to work on the restoration of the 1977 1 ton utility truck for a rescue unit. The truck has been rejuvenated and a paint job completed by Mike McClure, Jr. All special lights have been installed including a code 3 light bar and a Whelen, 4 stage siren. The volunteer labor saved considerably on the cost of the vehicle. The Ladies Auxiliary provided refreshments and donated \$100 for the unit.

A special thanks is extended to Skeet Walker Truck and Tractor Sales, Johnston Truck and Supply Inc., Higginbotham Bros. Department Store, and Snap-On Tool dealer, Mickey Scott, of Comanche for their co-operation and contributions to the rescue unit. The CAT test results are back...this test was given in March to grades K through 8 and grade 10. The results were sent to McGraw-Hill in California for scoring.

According to Bobbie Trammell, the counselor at Cross Plains, "The test scores are compared with the same grade level and as an overall school score statewide and nationally." The statewide results are not yet available, but C.P.I.S.D. scored favorably at the National level having an overall average above the national percentile.

Within the school, the results have

several uses: 1. They provide a year to year comparison of an individual student's progress.

2. Scores of each student are also compared to other students at the same level on a national level.

3. It provides a measurement of a student's basic skills.

4. The results also serve special programs such as Chapter I and Special Education. It provides the school with an assessment towards helping teachers correlate essential elements.

5. Results are also used in writing the district annual performance reports.

Teachers, individual students, and parents also are encouraged to examine the results of these tests and ask questions about the interpretation of the scores.

Each student that was tested was given the computer printout of the results which they could keep and examine. The teachers and counselor will be glad to answer any questions that parents may have concerning the
