News Of A Former Resident'

Recently Vondean Hutchins handed me an article about John A. Pruet that appeared in the San Antonio Postal Press. She thought it would be of interest to local folks who remembered Pruet as the manager of West Texas Utilities years ago. Many will remember his wife, Naomi, and their son, Mike.

Pruet was among the recipients of letters which laid in an attic in North Carolina for 43 years after a ship crewman failed to mail them.

Corporal James E. Gunn, deceased, wrote two letters while enroute to Africa on a troop transport ship in 1944. The letters were stashed in the attic rather than being deposited in a mail box back in 1944.

The discovery of the mislaid mail received nationwide publicity and Postmaster General Albert V. Casey personally delivered some of the letters to their writers and intended reci-

pients. As Gunn's cousin and closest living relative, Pruet saw his cousin's name in an article in the San Antonio newspaper and wrote to the

Postmaster General. Pruet stated that reading the letters brought back memories when they were growing up in Putnam.

Gunn and Pruet went to Camp Walters for testing when they were eighteen years old. Gunn was assigned to the Signal Corps and Pruet was assigned to the Army Air Corps where he served as Engineer Gunner on a B-24 crew. Pruet flew on 34 missions during his tour in the Army Air Corps.

Gunn returned from the war and worked in New Mexico. He was killed in an automobile accident in 1948.

The letters were written by soldiers enroute to Africa on board the troop ship Caleb Strong in May 1944. The mail was supposed to be mailed by a ship's crewman when the vessel returned to the United States.

The crewman, now deceased, hid the duffel bag in his aunt's attic, fearing punishment after failing to mail the letters immediately.

The sack of mail was found by an exterminator who turned it over to a Raleigh postmaster. He was able to find three veterans before requesting additional help.

Seventy-nine letters have been returned out of the 235 letters. Only 19 remain undelivered.

John and Naomi now reside at Canyon Lake. I am sure that this story will stir remembrances of the Pruets with many of their past friends.



In the County's 35th Annual Pecan Show, there were 74 entries, the smallest number in the show's history, according to DeMarquis Gordon, extension agent.

Lorene Jennings of Cross Plains exhibited the champion in-shell pecans with a Mohawk entry. The entry contained 27.8 pecans per pound and shelled out 56 percent kernels.

The reserve champion in-shell entry was of the Kiowa variety with 39.4 nuts per pound and a 57.9 percent kernel shell-out. Buttery pecans of Rising Star was the exhibitor.

The champion shelling entry was Cheyenne with 50.4 nuts per pound and 53.6 percent shell-out. The Chevenne entry was exhibited by T.E. Robertson of Breckenridge who has orchards in Eastland County

Dan Childress of Cottonwood won reserve champion shelling honors with a Caddo entry. The pecans averaged 58.3 per pound and shelled 53.6 percent kernel.

James Alexander of Rising Star won the native pecan award. His native contained 66.7 nuts per pound and shelled 60.4 percent kernels. Reserve champion natives were owned by Robertson and contained 38 pecans per pound and shelled 47.5 percent







Farmers Home Chief Honored

WASHINGTON - Vance L. Clark, Administrator of the U.S Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), received one of the highest honors bestowed by the Future Farmers of America (FFA) at its national convention in Kansas City. Clark, whose agency is called the "lender of last resort," was awarded the Degree of Honorary American Farmer for his contributions in assisting young farmers entering the agricultural voca-

"This award is especially meaningful since it came from the FFA," Clark said, "because these young people are the hope and the future of farming. It makes me feel good to know that they see a future in farming, and are facing the future with optimism and enthusiasm."

Texas FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch echoed Clark's sentiments. "FFA members here in Texas are some of the most active, energetic and forward looking people I know. It is extremely gratifying to have their national organization recognize the work FmHA is doing to help family farmers."

The Farmers Home Administration makes loans to establish farmers in financial difficulty as well as young farmers with no credit history. In the past year, FmHA dispensed \$4.3 billion in farm loans to over 21,500 borrowers for operating, real estate and emergency assistance.

Additionally, FmHA makes "youth loans" to high school students for worthwhile agricultural projects. The loans are limited to \$10,000, and are subject to the same repayment provisions as other loans.

The Future Farmers of America, founded in 1928, is a national organization for students of vocational agriculture. The award was made at FFA's 60th national convention, held annually in Kansas City.

Don't Forget Who's Running Your Business

Dear Commissioner Nabers: I've got an employee who is dealing me misery. He hasn't been to work on time in a year. He back talks my wife when she gives him instructions. He can't get along with my other three employees. I don't want to do anything wrong — he's just the kind to try and sue me - but I really have had it. Any suggestions?

Dear. D.A.: I have a question first. Who is running your business, you or this problem employee?

I am constantly amazed at the number of employers out there who are intimidated by their own employees. As a business owner and employer you have a perfect right to discipline and fire any employee who refuses to abide by your rules, perform the work as instructed, or conduct himself properly on the job. My suggestion is to deal with this situation immediately. Document the man's misconduct; tell him you will no longer tolerate his tardiness, insubordination, or poor attitude; fire him promptly upon the next occurrence of such behavior.

Dear B.B.: I suggest your form be clearly designated as a warning, reprimand, or disciplinary action at the top. It should have a space for the date and several lines for a detailed description of the infraction. In a separate paragraph you should specify what corrective action is expected and what the results of failing to take corrective action will be.

There should be a space for the employer's signature and the employee's signature. Under the employee's signature line I suggest you have a statement similar to this: "I acknowledge receipt of this warning and understand that it will be placed in my personnel file. Any disagreement I may have with the contents of this warning is set forth on the back of the form."
