Spider Bites in Common

Ora Breeding, Harold Strahan, and Donald Strahan were attending a meeting of the Cottonwood Historical Society when they realized how rare it was that they had all been bitten by brown recluse spiders and suffered the effects.

Ora was bitten on her arm several years ago and experienced a terrible ordeal. Harold reported that he was bitten when he was about 11 years old, and would have had more serious complications if Dr. Powell hadn't lanced it 10 minutes after the bite. He said it still took 6 months to 1 year to heal.

Donald was bitten on the foot and has had ten or more surgeries due to the

Brown recluse venom is not too different from snake venom. However, the fiddleback's venom is said to be 18 times more poisonous than a rattlesnake. It is mostly enzyme proteins, which destroy tissue and lead to inflammation.

Local reaction is confined to the site of the bite and causes swelling, inflammation, and a blister.

The blister then become dark reddish-purple then a dark red spreading lesion. The central part forms an ulcer and the skin is obviously dead. The bite develops a craterlike appearance; ranging from the size of a dime to a half-dollar and can extend into the muscle.

The trio would like to make everyone aware of the danger this little creature possesses. The spider is about the size of a quarter and ranges from light yellowish-tan to dark brown. Older specimens are almost black. The most distinctive physical features are six eyes arranged in a semicircle of three pairs on the front of the head, and the black, fiddle-shaped marking on the back.

If you are bitten by a spider, it would be wise to take the specimen with you to the doctor's office for positive identi-

nausea, vomiting, shortness of breath, hives and dizziness. In severe cases, patients have required temporary kidney dialysis.

It is estimated that 50 to 100 people experience serious bites in Texas each year. There are occasional reports of death or loss of a limb from a brown recluse spider bite. Very young and elderly people usually suffer the most serious consequences. The medical resulting from a bite disorder Loxosceles reclusa, can be unpleasant, painful and disfiguring.





Beginning May 9, a new 65-mph speed limit went into effect on rural Interstate highways in Texas.

"The public is excited about this," said Byron Blaschke, deputy engineerdirector of the highway department, and we are doing all we can to make a smooth transition to the new speed limit. Last Friday, the highway commission established the new maximum speed limit of 65 mph for cars and light trucks on rural Interstate highways. In this context, "rural" means outside urban areas of 50,000 or more people. The governor concurred Wednesday with the new speed limit which becomes effective at 12:01 a.m. Saturday, May 9, where signs are posted. Some rural Interstate sections will continue with speed limits posted lower than 65 mph for traffic and engineering reasons. These reduced speed zones existed before the 1974 federally mandated reduction to 55 mph. The department will examine each of these areas and determine the need to continue or discontinue the lower speeds. Blaschke emphasized that the new limits apply only to rural highways with Interstate designation. The speed limit on all other roadways, including urban

Interstate, remains 55 mph.

The department was working Saturday to put up the new signs.

City Tax Report

City sales tax collections reported May 6 still show the depressed economic activity in Callahan County with collections unning 19.11 percent behind last year countywide. Statewide, collection of the one percent city sales tax is 7.18 percent lower than last year.

Cross Plains is showing the largest decrease in collection, 36.37 percent behind 1986. Collection so far in 1987 have amounted to \$17,065.35, while collections in 1986 had totaled \$26,818.06. The town received a payment for the month of April for \$4,952.63. The same payment the year before was \$7,110.45.

Clyde is reporting collections of \$33,004.05, which is 11.91 percent lower than sales tax of \$37,466.60 reported in 1986. The town's payment for the month was \$9,940.33. The check for the same month last year was \$11,285.86.

Baird is showing payments 11.06 behind last year. Collections so far this year are \$13,899.95 and payments during the same time period last year amounted to \$15,628.80.

The town of Putnam has collections of \$4,582.74 so far this year, an amount 5.25 percent lower than the \$4,836.69 figure reported in 1986. The town's check for the month of April was \$1,132.56, which is slightly higher than the April 1986 check for \$1,032.52. Checks made to the towns during May represent taxes collected on sales made in March and reported to the state comptroller by April 20. as possible," Blaschke said.







Hords Creek Lake was named "Project of the Year" by the Southwestern Division U.S. Army Corps of Engineers this month. The division governs more than 140 lakes over an eight-state region.

Tommy Halfmann, lake manager, and his staff were cited by the Corps for nproving the parks and making Hords Creek, located in Coleman, more attractive. The lake is now entered in the national contest and the winner will be announced later this year.

"I believe if you give visitors a quality product, they'll take care of it and will come to the lake again and again," Halfmann said. Hords Creek had more than 400,000 people come to the reservoir last year.

Hords Creek Lake was completed in 1948 to provide flood control and water for Coleman, but little foresight was given to recreational facilities.

Inadequate park facilities combined with increasing visitation in the 1980s led to deterioration of project land. The Hords Creek staff decided to put new life into an old lake.

The Hords Creek staff completely revamped their three parks (Lakeside, Friendship and Flat Rock). No swimming beaches existed, picnic tables were randomly scattered, boat ramps didn't extend into the lake and some water fountains were as far as one-half mile from the nearest table.

Extensive improvements were made. The only sandy swimming beach near Coleman is in Friendship Park. Picnic tables are placed under shade trees closer to the lake. Boat ramps have been extended to allow usage at all elevations which are safe for boating. Large group shelters and new restrooms have been added. Native one-ton rocks, quarried during the construction of Hords Creek Lake, line the roads, thus keeping vehicles off park land.

"I thought using these rocks would be more appealing instead of cabling off the parks," Halfmann said. "People can still use the parks as they always have, but they can't drive their cars onto the grounds. Grass and trees can be scarce around this part of the country."

Swimming and fishing are popular at Hords Creek, but hundreds of hunters boys in the last two years and requests from the public have made this hunt an annual event. The project received the Presidential Take Pride in America award for their role in the hunt.

A nature trail in Lakeside Park creates hiking adventures for local Boy Scouts and the Chisolm Trail Council of the Boy Scouts have cleaned the lake as part of their scouting jamborees held at the reservoir in 1984 and 1986.


The lake, which is operated by the Fort Worth District Corps of Engineers, is about eleven feet below conservation level. However, that represents about a 14-foot increase from this time last year. With the approaching Texas summer. Hords Creek will be a welcome relief for thousands of recreationists.







AUSTIN-The compromise tax agreement blew up in the legislative leadership's face after only a few days' life, and at last week's end, no popular solution was in sight.

The House, in fact, dashed hopes of raising a few quick dollars by crushing a bill allowing Texas voters to decide whether to create a state lottery.

That action leaves the beleaguered budget in conference committee where the House and Senate have about two more weeks to hammer out a compromise spending figure that appears, the way things are going, to be unacceptable to the governor.

It was Gov. Bill Clements' apparent reversal on enlarging the tax base to create new revenue that killed the Big Four compromise. What actually happened may never be known.

Some parties, Gov. Clements, for one, said the agreement was never there in the first place. He said the press distorted his role, making it seem he had caved in to

They were on the brink of losing the main issue of their comeback: no new taxes.

It was the first time in a long while that one can remember Texas Republicans breaking ranks to leave one of their own stranded in an awkward position, much less a governor.

Clements took the chastisement, ripped the press a bit, and then cancelled his weekly news conferences for the balance of the session.

Annual Sessions

The Senate passed and sent to the House a proposal that the Legislature meet once a year instead of every two years.

The constitutional amendment, if voters approve, would add a 60-day session in even-numbered years to consider only fiscal issues.

Supporters argued that in reality Texas already has annual sessions, citing 17 special sessions in the last 11 bienniums.

In other action, the Senate gave final passage to bills outlawing fishing for striped bass, tarpon and snook in the Gulf and allowing counties to collect a fee for hot check writers.

The House targeted violent of fenders with a life sentence without parole, and outlawed the wearing of masks by the Klu Klux Klan and other secret societies.

Also, a House committee advanced a bill to validate the current school finance system, which opponents charge is an attempt to undermine the "Robin Hood" school finance lawsuit.

House sponsors put together a tort reform package tougher than the version sent over from the Senate, despite warnings it could sink the entire issue, and passed it through committee.
