We enjoyed a wonderful weekend with old friends, and there are a precious few remaining.

Mountainair is a lovely little town of some two or three thousand people located at the foot of the scenic Manzano mountains. It was once the bean capital of the world, but today, they only raise those good Pinto beans in the irrigated regions, chiefly around Estancia, which is the county seat of Torrance.

There are many ancient ruins within 8 or 10 miles of Mountainair which are very interesting to see.

My main interest in visiting this place was due to the fact that I was married to Charlie McCowen here when I was twenty-one years old.

I remember taking a train from Coleman on the evening of April 10, 1922 bound for Mountainair, New Mexico. I had never been very far from home, so I cried awhile after Papa tarried inside the train with me. He remained with me as long as he could before the train had to depart.

As the miles began to click off, my tears dried as I realized that at the end of the journey was the beginning of happiness with the man I had come so far to marry. I was not disappointed when the train stopped and I found myself in his arms.

At this time we had no electricity, no running water, no automobile, or a lot of other things, but we had some good saddle horses, work horses, and a good covered wagon which we used quite often when we needed to travel.

Many of our friends had covered wagons and they went with us on many occasions. But, I firmly believe had we not had even this convenience, we would have been happy because we knew what we wanted and we had each other.

To my sorrow, I lost him when he went to be with the Lord, but I am looking forward to being with him again throughout the ceaseless ages.

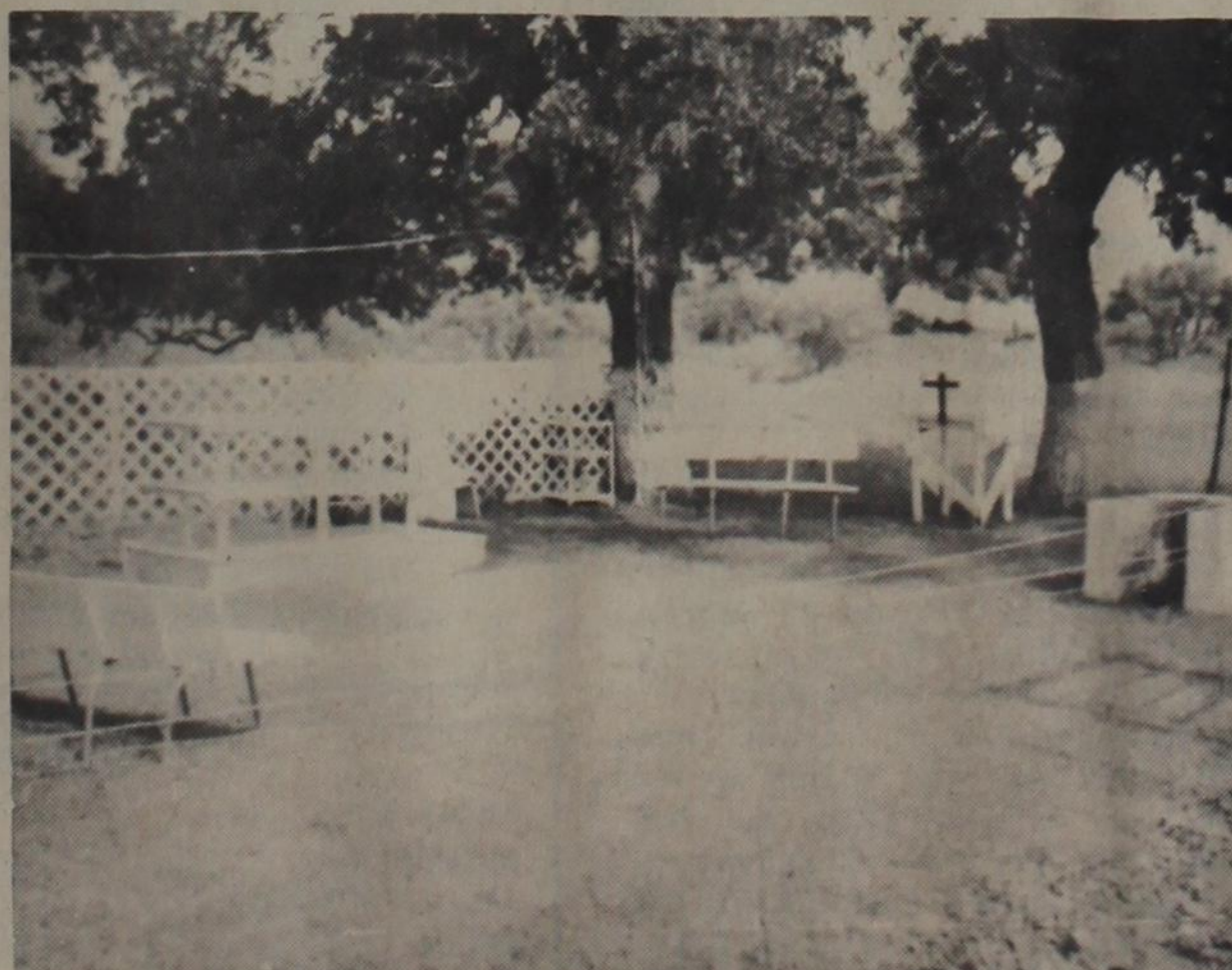

Couple Spends Most Of Time Amid Beauty

There are many beautiful yards out in the country and the one belonging to Bud and Dixie Ingram is just one of them. Their neat white house, trimmed in black, sits just back of a circle drive surrounded with large live oak trees. Everything is white washed right down to the tree trunks. Most of the yard is shaded all day and remains nice and cool.

The walk leading to the front porch is edged with monkey grass and a few type ground cover. Two porch swings give a look of complete relaxation; yet the entire place demonstrates all the hard work of the dedicated owners.

Giant zinnias in a variety of colors grow along the drive on the north, while yet another group of zinnias and castor bean plants, well over eight feet tall, add color to the south side of the yard. A circle-shaped flower bed out front was filled with verbenas.

A striking patio was built on the south side of the house by Bud and Dixie. They are extremely proud of their creation and noted that they spend most of their time in this area. Dixie said, "We have every meal out here and coffee."

The patio was filled with pot plants including several types of jews, rubber plant, cat's furr, oriental pepper, fern, ivy and moss. Flower beds along the black wrought iron fence surrounding the patio were accented with yellow and gold marigolds, pinks, red, salmon and fuchsia geraniums, orchid colored petunias, and monkey grass with purple blooms. Iris plants stand tall in the background.

Dixie remarked, "You might say we have an animal yard considering our collection of ceramic and other type animals." They have two turkeys, one goose, one chicken, one rooster, a duck and three ducklings, two pelicans, owls, cats, squirrels, rabbits, chipmunks, frogs, one parrot, and three deer. They are used as decorative items throughout the yard and patio area.

Bud even has a hired hand and a donkey hitched to a double shovel at the edge of the drive, but he said, "I'm going to have to let him go, because he doesn't turn out any work." You'll have to see this to understand the true meaning.

They enjoy collecting bells including a cow bell that belonged to a milk cow Dixie milked when she was a kid. Hanging in the tree, it makes a great

also built this together. Similar goals and cooperation can sure get a lot done!

You can see the dutch windmill turning in the breeze from the back patio. An Indian man from De Leon built the windmill and it can be used to actually pump water.

Bud has a small truck garden which he sells peas, squash, cantaloupes, and tomatoes. The Ingrams have a personal wind chime and sounds so peaceful. Another interesting bell was purchased from a gypsy, who claimed it originated from a small plantation. They use a school bell to beckon one another from the field.

A second patio area is at the back of the house with a cement picnic table and benches. A barbecue pit is built at the end for cooking outside. The couple garden where they grow all the regular vegetables plus broccoli, cauliflower, and asparagus. They said they enjoyed experimenting with new vegetables and this year they had an unusual squash, but didn't care for the flavor. There is also a small orchard with peach, plum, apple, pear, and pecan trees.

I accidentally discovered that the couple are rattlesnake hunters. They said they became bored about 2 years ago and decided to take up a new line of work. They have caught over 700 rattlesnakes in the mountains and rocks. They explained how they wait until after the first two northers and the snakes are denned up, and then they gas them out of their dens. The rattlers crawl out in a drowsy state which makes them much easier to handle.

Bud picks them up with a catcher and Dixie opens the can while he puts them in. Snakeproof pants and boots are worn for safety. The pants are made of the same material that bulletproof vests are made. The couple enjoy the adventure and it is profitable, too.

The Ingrams have a very unique outdoor gathering place near their tank. Bud has built benches, a table with benches, a barbecue pit, and a podium for a speaker. Lattice panels are in the background and everything is shining white. It can even be lighted for after dark activities. A fancy little boat of red, white, and blue floats on the placid water.

Bro. John Swift calls this "Bud's park." Members of the Evangelical Methodist Church sometimes meet here for church and socials.

Take a little spin in the country, turn down the old gravel pit road between old and new Highway 36, and view a very charming place.

Reward Offered After Fire

A reward is being offered for information concerning the vandalism of the home of a former Cross Plains woman.

Ken Vickers, father of Vicky Odom formerly of Cross Plains, is offering a reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons who broke into the house where Ms. Odom lived located two miles north of Cross Plains on Highway 206.

Sometime between 5 and 6 a.m. on July 4, persons unknown broke into the home and gathered the woman's clothes, shoes and business records and piled it in the front and ignited the items. Nothing was burned inside

the home.

The value of the items burned were reported at over \$10,000.

No one was at home at the time of the break-in. Mr. Vickers said that his daughter no longer lives in the home, moving out just after the break-in.

Callahan County Sheriff's Department officials do have suspects in the case and several items from the crime scene were sent to a crime lab in Dallas.

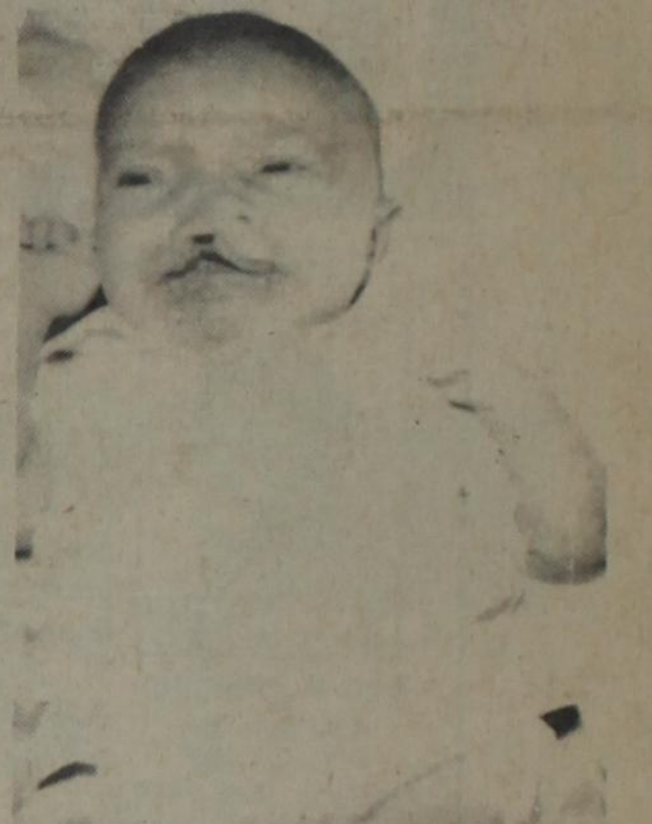
Both students qualified for the State Meet to be held in Fort Worth at Farrington Field in July.

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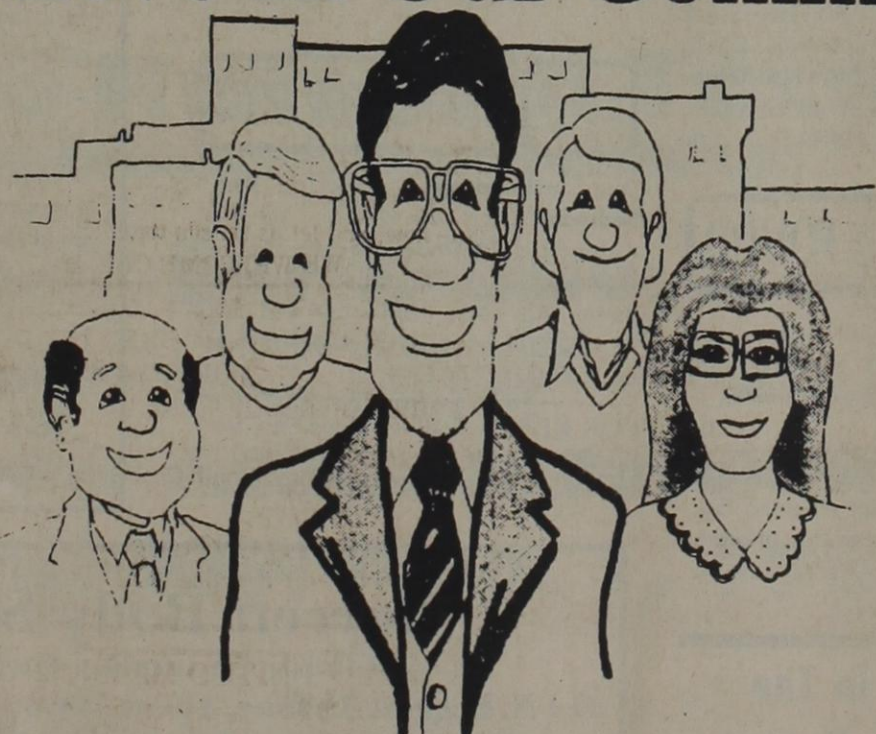
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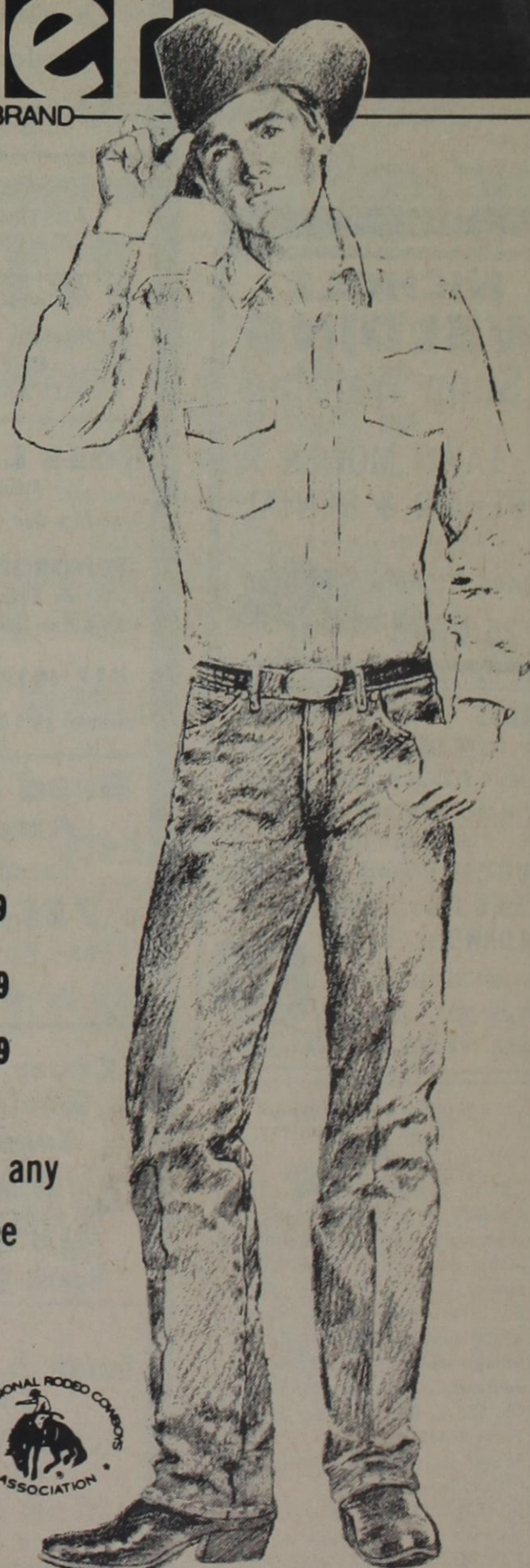

answer — on my way in, I discovered she was out on her riding mower, mowing all the way down to the highway.

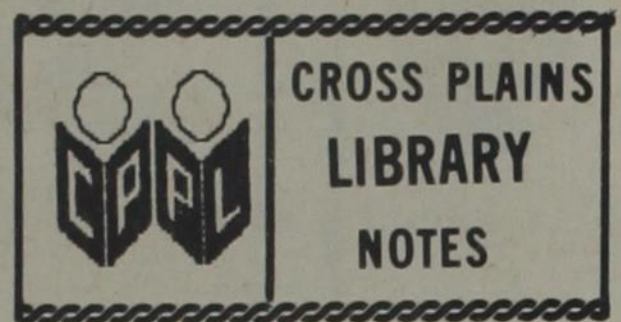
