I tried, Mrs. Bennett, I really did, but I just couldn't do it.

A few days ago, Frances Bennett, widow of Bromo Bennett, who was the mayor of Clyde at the time of his death, brought in a letter, and I mean A LETTER, which had apparently been sent to a number of mayors over the country.

Chemical Co.

Goode has served as foreman and has been employed by the Co-op for 11 years.

Bailey has served two three-year terms on the board of directors. Upon his acceptance of the foreman position, he was no longer eligible for a director. The directors elected Danny Hutton to complete his term which expires August 29.

Reggy Stover, Lester King, C.W. Richter, and Kenneth Montford are currently serving as directors for the Pioneer Farmers Co-op.

Goode stated, "We would like for all our customers to know that we will continue to stock the same chemicals, seed, and fertilizer, and the drying and handling of peanuts will remain the same."

If you are planning a controlled fire, please notify the Fire Department. This will eliminate unnecessary fire calls being reported by neighbors or a passer-by.

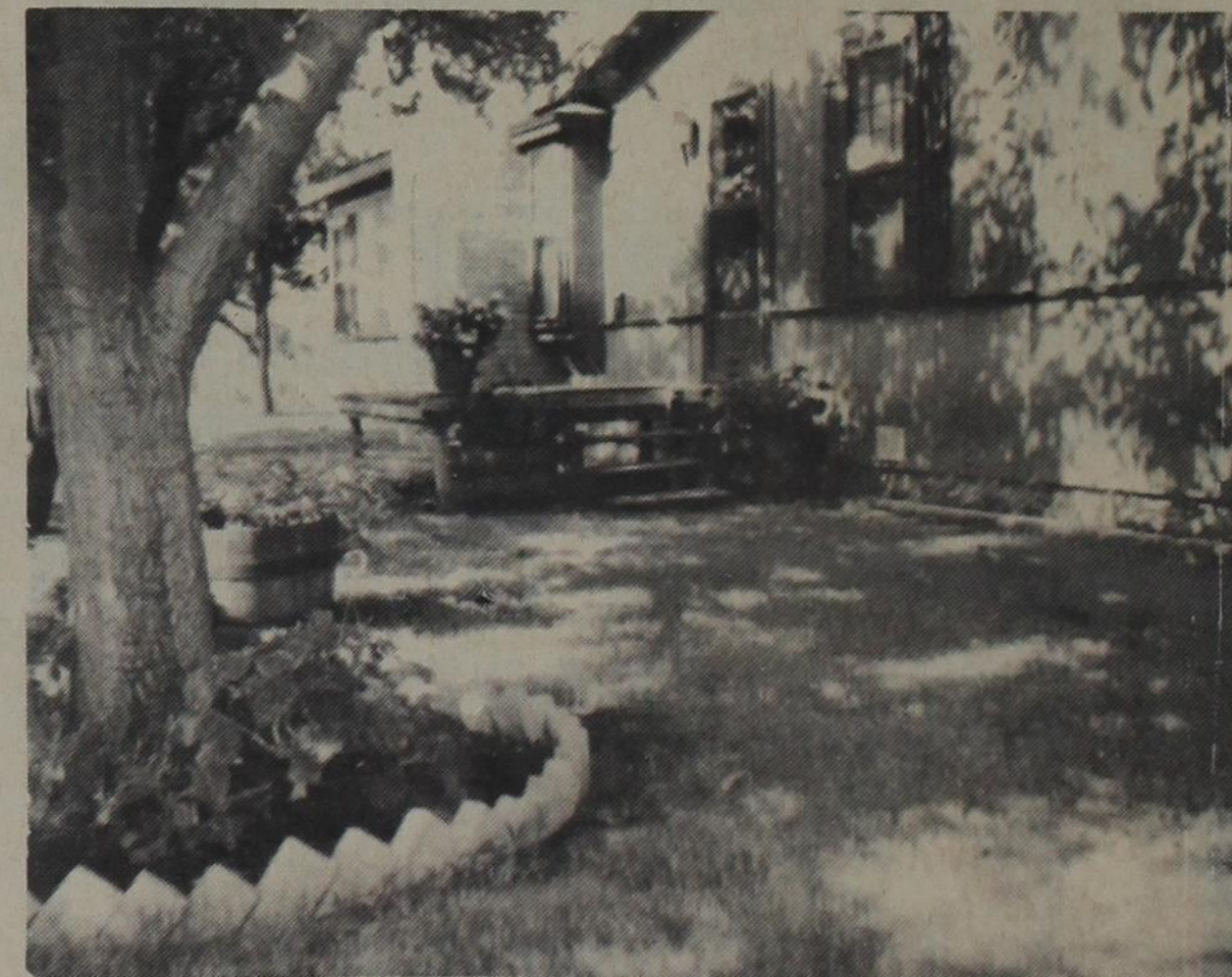
Recent fire calls reported a grass fire July 21 on the south side of town at 1st and Avenue G. Two trucks answered the call.

**THREE DOLLAR BILL ...**  
The Republic of Texas issued its first money, in the form of promissory notes, during the fall of 1837. It became known as "Star Money" because of the five-pointed star printed on the front of each note. Although the Republic of Texas Congress provided for the issue of coins, none were ever minted. The denominations of the paper money were \$1, \$2, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100, \$500 and a \$3 bill.

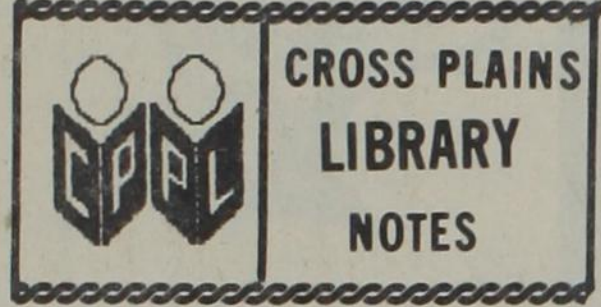
Sally and Bobby Roady have been busy working in their garden. They visit regularly with his mother and her

### GARDEN TIPS FROM THE Cross Plains Garden Club

#### Tips For August

Now that gardens are winding down, it is time to gather and store seed. Select mature seed pods from healthy plants of non-hybrid varieties. Store seed in air tight jars in freezer or refrigerator. Small seed are easily stored in plastic bags. Cans like those used to package 35mm film make excellent containers.

This is the month to plant fall gardens if moisture permits. Beans, peas, squash, potatoes, lettuce, and radishes should make before frost. Turnips should be planted the latter part of the month.

Remember, as you are busy gardening, be sure to protect yourself from the sun. Take a tip from the pioneers. Women once all wore sunbonnets, and hats still offer reliable protection for the face.

Sunscreen lotions offer excellent overall protection ranging from minimal to "ultra" (15 and above), so choose one based on how easily you burn. Children need special attention. Dermatologists point out that over 80% of skin damage from the sun occurs before a person turns 20.

## Treasures Of Truth

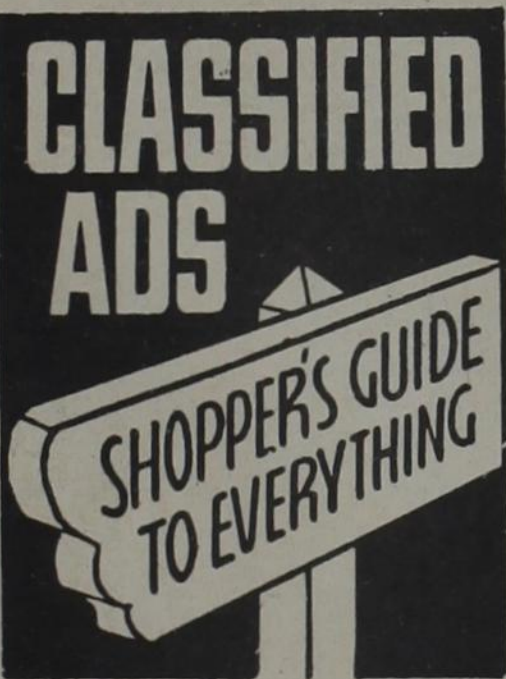
Because it seems to be bothering some folks considerably, and for their benefit and the record, I wish to explain — who I really am should be of little concern.


