## We're Not Used To Violence

We're not used to it.
Violence is something that happens in
the cities, in the ghettos, someplace

We're not accustomed to having to lock our doors, even when we'll be gone for only a short time. We're not accustomed to having to leave an outside light on at night. We're not accustomed to our hearts skipping a beat when we hear something go "bump" in the night. We're not accustomed to being afraid.

But this violence is happening in our home towns, against our property, and against our people.

An elderly Cross Plains woman is beaten by an intruder in her home. An elderly Rising Star woman is raped and killed. Houses are entered in Clyde in broad daylight while their occupants are away for only a few minutes.

Other elderly women have received threatening phone calls and notes left in their mailboxes.

Now, elderly women all over town are leaving their lights on at night, almost afraid to even doze off. Their friends and relatives are anxious about their welfare, checking on them much more than before.

Now, neighborhoods in Clyde are forming "watches" where neighbor looks after neighbor, periodically checking property and jotting down license numbers of any strange vehicles.

The victims of most of these crimes — these attacks on both person and property — are elderly people, retired people who have more than paid their dues, raised their families and now should have the right to sit back and enjoy a little bit of life.

But somebody is not willing to let them do it. Maybe it's jealousy, maybe these criminals can't stand to see anyone enjoy a tranquil life.

But we have the right, don't we?

# Buckle Run Starts At Roping Club



# Attack Here May Be Linked to Death in Rising Star

Violence is all around us, but when it strikes in a small community such as Cross Plains, that is too close for comfort.

On July 5 an elderly Cross Plains woman was the victim of such an attack. An intruder entered her home through a window. She was severely beaten in the face and left in a state of unconsciousness. The attacker exited the house through the back door.

There was no evidence of theft and the lady was not sexually assaulted. However, the mental anguish she experienced is immeasurable.

The Sheriff's Departments in Callahan and Eastland counties are investigating, as there may be a connection to the death of an elderly Rising Star lady recently.






#### Treasures Of Truth



Payroll Deductions/What is Legal?

Dear Commissioner Nabers: I work for a well known hamburger chain. The store manager has a policy of deducting amounts of money from your paycheck if she thinks that you haven't done your job as good as you should.

None of the employees can ever count on a certain amount to be in their paychecks, based on the whims of the manager.

My question, is all of this

Dear Hard Worker: Based upon the circumstances as you describe them, your manager's actions are not legal. An employer cannot dock an employee's pay strictly as a disciplinary measure for unsatisfactory performance.

There are some situations in which an employer may legally dock pay. Cash register shortages may be deducted from a cashier's paycheck. Employees may be required to pay for equipment or supply breakage out of their checks if the breakage was their

fault. In other words, an employer does have the right to be compensated for actual loss it suffers as a result of employee carelessness or malfeasance.

An employer who reserves the right to dock pay under legally permissible circumstances should have this policy in writing and should distribute it to all employees.

An employee who has a legitimate wage dispute may file a complaint with the Texas Department of Labor and Standards. They will try to resolve the problem for you.

Dear Commissioner: My company is interested in instituting

drug testing. Do you know if the number of companies doing such testings is increasing? How would you suggest we go about implementing a drug testing procedure?

-F.T. Houston, Texas

Dear F.T.: From my contact with the business community and my weekly experience with contested claims for unemployment insurance, it does appear to me that drug testing is on the increase.

Any advice I can give your company on drug testing is strictly my own personal opinion and does not necessarily reflect the views of the Commission as a whole. The Texas Employment Commission has no official stance on drug testing, either pro or con.

I would suggest that your company do the following:

- 1. Get some legal advice prior to starting any drug testing program.
- 2. Educate yourself on the subject. Contact laboratories

and drug testing services that will give you information and assistance.

3. Solicit the support of your work force.

4. Design a clear, written company policy and publicize it extensively.

Lastly, keep in mind that good employees are valuable assets to any business. Your company may wish to provide employee assistance services or progressive discipline to first offenders in lieu of automatic termination.






