

## Snow Covers Area Friday; Showers Fall On Monday

Weather in the Cross Plains area has ranged from nice spring weather to snow and thunder-showers during the past week. Almost shirt-sleeve weather held for a short time last Thurs-

day, followed by sleet and snow on Friday morning. A warming trend followed to be chased away again by thunder showers and cooler temperatures Monday night.

Temperatures in the high 60's or low 70's warmed this area Thursday but a northerly quickly turned that picture white as sleet and freezing rain preceded about one and one-half inches of snow Friday morning. Light sleet began about 8:30 a.m. and conditions worsened as the morning wore on, until about noon when roads, which had become hazardous started clearing.

Cross Plains Schools dismissed at 1:30 p.m., due to the road conditions, although by that

time most roads had cleared of snow and ice.

Temperature plunged to about 15 degrees early Saturday morning, but southerly winds brought the mercury back into the sixties and seventies by Monday afternoon.

Another cool front triggered spring-like thundershowers Monday night.

Moisture from the sleet and snow was light, and most gauges in this area measured about .50 of an inch of rain Tuesday morning. Area residents reported the following totals: Cross Plains .50 to .60, Cottonwood .70; Pioneer .40, Atwell .50, Sabanno .50, Rowden .30 and Cross Cut estimated .25.

## Local Church To Show Johnny Cash Movie

The story is old, but the perspective is up-dated and brought into sharp focus by the film "The Gospel Road" to be shown Saturday and Sunday, March 11 and 12, at Cross Plains United Methodist Church. Showings will begin at 7 p.m. each day.

## Opposition To Canal Treaty Forming Here

Petition To Our Senators and Congressmen

We, citizens of the United States of America, present this petition to our elected representatives of our constitutional form of government to register our opposition to the ratification of the recent treaties regarding the U. S. Canal in Panama, for the following reasons. The ratification would be:

(1) voting against the will of the people, since the great majority of citizens (shown by surveys and news items, are against the treaties (the people of Panama voted; the people of the U. S. should be given the chance to vote);

(2) surrendering our sovereignty over an extremely important strategic commercial and military international waterway necessary for the protection of our hemisphere (intense interest is being shown by the Communist world);

(3) another act of appeasement and giving in to the international communist ideology, the Torrijos regime being Marxist dictatorship;

(4) denying the U. S. the right to negotiate with any countries other than Panama for the construction of any interoceanic canal;

(5) giving Panama sovereignty over the U. S. Canal Zone that we bought at a price higher than the total price we paid for the Louisiana Purchase, Arizona,

and Alaska combined;

(6) very costly to the American taxpayer, the U. S. agreeing to pay Panama \$60 to \$75 million dollars a year; and

(7) prohibiting the U. S. after 22 years, from any action whatsoever to defend our right to transit the Canal and insure its neutrality.

For these and other reasons we are against the giving up of sovereignty of the Canal to Panama.

last Wednesday, and a flurry of filings for places on the Board of Education made races for all three places on the directorate.

There were no filings in the city council vote, and there is no opposition for three places to be filled.

Three persons now seek the one-year unexpired term on the Board of Trustees. The place became vacant when Dr. Carl J. Sohns, a 17-year veteran board member, resigned early last month. Drawing held at the superintendent's office at the local school Tuesday at 2:15 p.m. resulted in the following order:

Payne had previously announced, but Ames and Franke filed during last few days. All are seeking a first term on the board.

Exact site and time for the service is being coordinated and will be announced later.

Next meeting of the ministers will be at the Pioneer Revival Center Tuesday, March 14, at 7:30 p.m.

Harris and Watson had officially filed for the posts earlier, but late filings came from Wilson, Glover and Stover.

Wilson and Harris are incumbents, both having won places on the board last year. They were elected for one-year unexpired terms then. Watson, Stover and Glover are newcomers to school board elections.

In the balloting for city council incumbent Mayor O. B. Edmondson drew no opposition. He is asking a first full-two-year

tenure, having won an uncontested vote last year for an unexpired one-year term.

Drawing for positions on the ballot for two city aldermen's seats, which is not contested, had the following results:

McCoy is the incumbent, having been appointed a few months ago to the unexpired term of Alvin Hutchins who resigned when he moved outside the city limits. Le May is asking a first term in his first venture into local politics. Other incumbent T. T. (Nick) Nichols, who has served several terms, did not choose to run again.

Both elections are scheduled to be held in the City Hall on April 1 with polls to be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Absentee balloting is slated to start Monday, March 13, pending arrival of bilingual ballots from the printers. It will end March 28. Mrs. Maurine McCuin will handle absentee balloting for the school at her office (School Tax Office) on Main Street. City Secretary Nancy Wagner will supervise absentee balloting in the city election. Ballots will be available at the City Hall.

Alton E. Hornsby will serve as election judge for the school vote, and Mrs. Bill (Katy) Kilgore will be judge for the city balloting.

Holdover members of the Board of Education include Joe E. Hanke, Jr., Roberta Conlee, John D. Montgomery and Randy Foster.

Remaining members of the Cross Plains City Council are Aldermen Frank Robertson, Raymond Franke and Bob Lane.

## Burleson Notes Bill On Farm Payments

Congressman Omar Burleson announced that on March 1 the Committee on Ways and Means of the U. S. House of Representatives, approved a bill, H. R. 11055, concerning the tax treatment of certain federal farm payments.

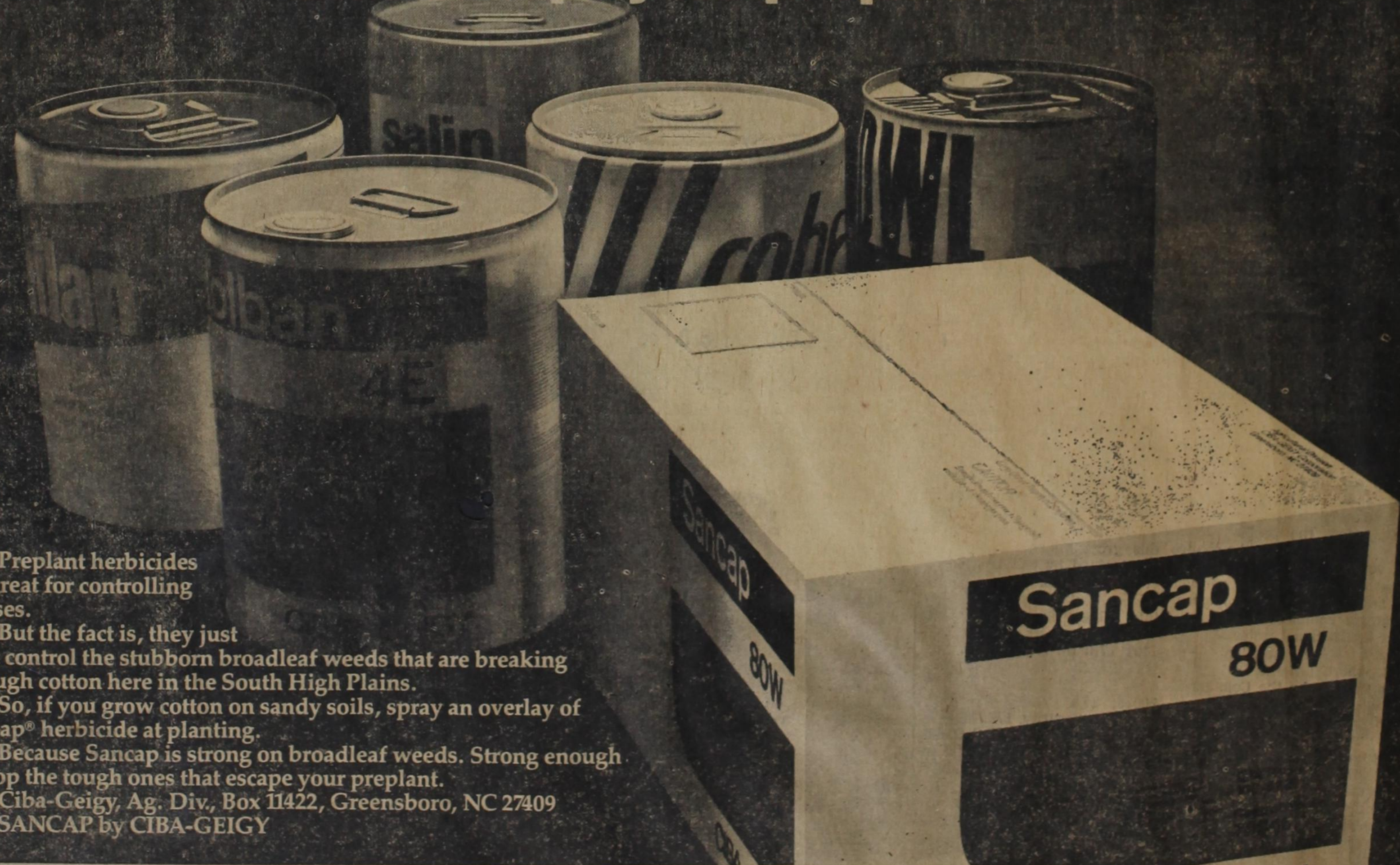
The tremendous backlog of administrative paperwork caused by the drought of 1976-1977 has delayed the mailing of many 1977 disaster and deficiency payments until 1978. Payments which ordinarily would be received as income in 1977 are arriving in 1978 and are being included for tax purposes with the income of that year. This bill is designed to prevent the unavoidable bunching of income for tax purposes.

Although no date has been set for consideration by the House of Representatives, Congressman Burleson is hopeful that action can be taken prior to the April 15 income tax filing deadline.

## Some SS Recipients Must File Report

If you worked and earned over \$3,000 in 1977 and received some social security benefits for 1977, you are required to report your earnings to the Social Security Administration before April 15, 1978, according to Glyn Hammons, district manager of the Abilene Social Security Office.

Even if a person files an income tax return, he must still file a report of his earnings with Social Security before April 15, 1978, or he could be subject to a penalty up to one full month's benefit and in some cases even more.

"This report is called the Annual Report and it is a report made to Social Security separate from any made to Internal Revenue," Hammons stressed.

Also it is very important for a person to estimate what his earnings will be for 1978 so we may withhold his benefits while he is working.

In 1978 Social Security will withhold \$1.00 in benefits for every \$2.00 earned over \$3,240 for people under age 65 throughout the year. Hammons said that Congress has just recently increased the amount not subject to any deductions to \$4,000 in 1978 for people who are over 65 or will be age 65 in 1978.

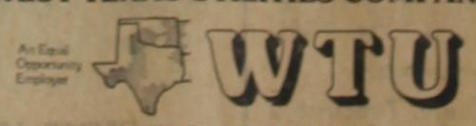
